Group of interested citizens in the county commission Monday to appeal for aid in getting some grub-guttering on the highway through Sanderson. This will be necessary before the Highway Department can authorize widening and leveling the main thoroughfare in this town. It is estimated approximately \$15,000 is required to do the necessary work together with building drainage structures on the north in order that water will be higher elevation will without overflowing the main section.

There is no improvement in town but that helps. We think this project can be carried out. It will make a much more attractive main street as well as facilitate handling traffic through town.

SCHOOL ORGANIZED FOR VET TRAINING

At a meeting Wednesday night at the Legion Hut thirteen veterans signed up for a school of training in ranch management. The school is expected to last three years and will be under the supervision of T. K. Meridith who moved here from Pecos.

Details as to the time of meetings for instruction and shop training will be worked out at a future meeting and further instructions in filing application blanks will be given next Wednesday night at the Legion hall.

Any veteran who owns or leases land and owns livestock is eligible for the school and subsistence pay will be based on the estimated earnings for 1950. The class was organized as of February 11, and any subsistence pay will be retroactive to that date, it was pointed out.

The tentative program for the rehabilitation of the veterans on ranches will take up all phases ranch management and teach shop work such as welding, cattle guard building, cement work, etc. as well as soil conservation, feeding, wool grading and related subjects.

A local office has been set up in the courthouse for Mr. Meridith, with Mrs. Ruby Duncan as secretary, and any veteran interested in enrolling in the school is urged to inquire at the office for details of eligibility.

Nance Announces For Sheriff's Job

J. S. Nance authorized the Times this week to make his formal announcement as a candidate for the position of county sheriff, tax collector and assessor. His candidacy is for re-election to the post.

Nance has held the office of sheriff of Terrell County for six terms and filled the unexpired term of Sheriff Lee Cook, following his death. B. F. Anderson has been deputy sheriff with Sheriff Nance for his complete tenure of office.

Sheriff Nance stated that in seeking re-election, he would promise the faithful fulfillment of the duties of his office to the best of his ability, as has been his endeavor in the past.

LARGE FORCE TO COUNT NOSES IN AREA 1950 CENSUS

A force of approximately 125 persons will be employed to take the 17th Decennial Census in the Odessa Census District, it is announced by District Supervisor George T. Kesler for the U. S. Bureau of Census in that city. This force will be responsible for taking the 1950 census in April in Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Ector, Glasscock, Loving, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Reagan, Terrell, Upton, Ward and Winkler Counties.

The largest segment of employees for the census in the local district consists of the enumerators of whom there will be 105. These enumerators will make the house to house calls in the work of collecting official census information regarding the population, and housing in urban areas and, additionally, agricultural activities in the rural areas. Their work in the field will be supervised and checked by a force of 10 crew leaders. At the census district office headquarters, about 10 persons will compose the staff to edit the enumerators' reports, make preliminary tabulations and perform other office work in connection with the census.

Application for the position of crew leader in the 17th Decennial Census are now being received by the Odessa office.

Selection for the crew leader positions will be made about the end of February after oral and written tests of candidates.

Qualifications required for the selection as crew leader include, as a minimum, a high school education and at least three years experience in supervising or assisting in the supervision of an office force or field crew, training of subordinates, making and reviewing reports of average difficulty and handling related assignments. In general, an applicant's record of experience must show satisfactory performance in increasingly responsible positions, college education may be counted in part in lieu of experience.

Ken Regan Opposes Socialized Medicine

Ken Regan in the House of Representatives last Thursday praised the doctors and medical profession of this country for their efforts and research in making the United States the healthiest nation in the world. He said they had relieved the country of many formerly fatal and frequent epidemics of small pox, yellow fever, typhoid, influenza and other diseases and had made rapid progress in medical science for the relief of the suffering of mankind.

The Congressman from the 16th District, in his address to the House, censured the current FBI investigation of the Texas Medical Association and said it is the apparent belief of many highly respected members of the medical profession that a political effort is being made to lessen opposition by the nation's physicians to the so-called socialized medicine proposals.

"To which," Regan continued, "I am thoroughly opposed as being against the welfare of our people, un-American, and a step toward the socialization of our country."

Regan included with his remarks the text of a resolution by the El Paso Medical Society protesting the FBI investigation.

SUPT. J. G. BARRY Elected To Hondo Superintendent Post

J. G. Barry, local superintendent, was named last week as superintendent of the Hondo Public Schools by the Board of Trustees of the Hondo Independent School District. He will continue as superintendent of the Terrell County Common School District until the expiration of his contract, July 1. Mr. Barry was elected after the Hondo board had accepted the resignation of Hons C. Richard, superintendent there for the past eight years.

Mr. Barry was formerly superintendent of the Hondo school system before the war for fourteen years.

The local board has not named Mr. Barry's successor.

In discussing his moving to Hondo, Mr. Barry stated that he and Mrs. Barry were enjoying their residence here and his school work here had been entirely satisfactory but that the Hondo board had made him an offer that he could not afford to turn down since he realized that the local board did not have the finances to afford a salary as large as that offered by the Hondo board.

HIGHWAY 285 GAP INCLUDED IN FEBRUARY JOBS

The final gap in U. S. Highway 285 from Sanderson to Fort Stockton, southeast 18,911 miles south of that city, was scheduled for letting Wednesday as a part of the February program.

Construction of the Pecos County project will be under the supervision of the Fort Stockton office of the engineer of the State Highway Department. Ten contractors have inspected the route of the proposed construction and have indicated interest in the project.

The Sanderson end of the highway has already been let and work is underway on that 10 1/2-mile stretch now.

More than half of the highway is already completed, the half in the center of the route between the two towns.

It is hoped that by next winter an unbroken stretch of new and modern pavement will connect the two Big Bend country towns allowing a north-south route of travel for tourists and area citizens, and bringing the realization of a dream of more than twenty years. A gap in an important cross-state and interstate route will be closed.

Eagle Pass is leading a movement in that area to get Highway 285's designation extended along the river and into the Lower Rio Grande Valley, via Del Rio, Eagle Pass and Laredo. Highway 285 designation now ends at Sanderson.

Funeral services were held in Del Rio last Wednesday afternoon for Walter O. Prentiss, 68-year old retired ranchman who died in Uvalde Monday morning of a heart attack.

Prentiss had lived in and around Del Rio for 46 years, at one time owning the ranch now owned by Mr. and Mrs. John Whistler near Dryden. He was also a fireman and engineer on the T&NO between Del Rio and Sanderson for many years and was well known here.

He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. D. O. Bosworth, who with Mr. Bosworth, attended the funeral services.

Rotary, Lions Warned of Chaos In Government Spending Policy By Speaker at Joint Meeting

Prefacing his remarks by the statement that he had no fault to find with the government, as such, but that he, in common with many others, was becoming alarmed over the extent to which the national tax burden is growing, J. C. Carter, executive assistant in charge of public relations for Southern Pacific Lines, gave members of Sanderson Rotary and Lions Clubs, at a joint meeting last Friday, a word picture of the tax situation as it now exists in this country.

Among other things he drew attention to the fact that, in the first 156 years of the nation's history, federal expenditures totaled \$179 billion, whereas, for the six years, 1945 to 1949, they have reached the astounding total of \$191 billion. This, he said, indicated very plainly the accelerated rate at which government is spending money, all of which must of necessity come from taxes paid by the public.

"must have money with which to carry on and direct the nation's economy as well as promote its political progress but the situation has now reached the point where there should be found ways and means of reducing this expense. To what extent such restriction can be made is problematical but at the existing rate of government spending the time is not far distant when the burden imposed on American taxpayers will exceed their ability to pay. One dollar out of every \$3.75 earned by the workers of the nation goes toward federal, state, county, and local taxes."

He called attention to the Hoover report, in the preparation of which the government spent \$750,000. This report, he said, had been in the hands of the authorities in Washington for several months, but to date, little, if anything, done to apply any of its many recommendations, this in spite of the fact that it has been hailed as one of the most valuable documents ever to be prepared for so important a specific purpose. If the recommendations made in this report were put into effect in Washington, it would result in a saving of \$112 to every family in the United States in the way of taxes.

In his talk here Mr. Carter pointed to some of the items of government expense which have contributed to the existing heavy tax burden borne by the people of the country. These expenses, he said, had been incurred as a means of bolstering the nation's economy, in that they were fostered to support the prices of many of its major farm and other commodities. However, the net result, as seen at this time, is the accumulation of not only increased government costs but surpluses of many commodities. Into these surpluses government has invested billions of dollars of tax funds and must continue to do the same in the years to come unless some other and more logical means can be found as build a foundation under the country's economy.

He drew particular attention to the government's subsidy of the nation's potato growers who are located largely in but three of the country's 48 states. At the present time, he declared, the government has invested \$224 million dollars in surplus potatoes. In one county in New York it has spent \$671,000 to support potato prices, or approximately \$32,000 to every grower. Now, with these millions of dollars spent, the government has recently condemned several million bushels of potatoes to rid the market of them before another crop is produced.

In stating these things to the Rotary and Lions members, Mr. Carter declared that he did not place all of the blame on those who represent the people in Washington. He blamed much of the present trouble on the indifference of the public toward those things which affect it in the nation's capital, as well as the seats of all state and county government. "We are not taking the proper interest in government," he said. "As a result we have found ourselves shouldering an ever increasing tax burden and one for which there must soon be found some relief, otherwise we can, with all reason, expect the spread of certain ideologies and isms. It is time the people of the country awaken to their obligations as citizens and counsel closely and wisely with those who represent them in the legislative halls of our nation if we are not to find ourselves in even greater trouble than we are at the present. Mere thinking on this subject will not suffice. There must be action and the sooner it is taken on the part of the individual citizens of this country, the better are our chances to build an enduring foundation under our democratic form of government."
