CRANE BOY KILLED IN FALL FROM CLIFF ON PECOS RIVER

Ray Fred Omo, 16, a Crane High School student, died late Saturday night on the Charley Chandler ranch in the eastern part of Terrell County after he had plunged over a 175 foot cliff. The accident occurred about 7:45 Saturday night and the youth died about two hours later after frantic efforts on the part of his three companions to obtain the services of a physician.

A physician from Iraan arrived at the ranch and pronounced the boy dead. Omo, with Delane Schoenover, James Hobson and Marquis Starkey, had made the trip to the Chandler ranch to fish in the Pecos River that runs through the ranch and is a short distance from the ranch house. The boys accompanying Omo said that they had climbed a mountain late Saturday night and that two of the boys started on across the mountain while Omo and his companion started down the other side. It is thought that Omo lost his footing on loose gravel and fell over a steep cliff estimated at 150 or 200 feet high. Neither of the boys actually saw Omo fall. Omo had internal injuries, a dislocated left ankle, compound fractures of the right leg and a possible neck fracture. The youth is survived by his mother, Crane, two brothers and one sister. Funeral services were held in Crane Tuesday afternoon from the Crane Baptist Church and burial was made in that city.

EAGLE NINE SPLITS TWIN BILL WITH BRACKETTVILLE

The Sanderson Eagles split a pair of baseball games this week end at Sanderson, winning Friday's game from Brackettville 19-12, and losing Saturday's game 13-8. Friday's game was featured by some lusty clouting by Saenz, Silvas and Bustos of the Eagles, each of whom collected 3 hits. A big 4th inning of 10 runs put the game on ice for the local boys. Sanderson collected 17 hits off an assortment of Brackettville pitchers, while Brackettville did almost as well by collecting 16. The big difference was in the defensive play. Both teams showed a lack of sharpness in their fielding ability Friday, but the Brackettville team lost complete control of their defensive play. Saturday the Eagles led for 5 innings, 4 to 3, but pitcher Bustos tired and the infield blew up in his face and Brackettville scored 9 runs in the 6th stanza. Highlight of the game was Zepeda's home run with the bases loaded in the last inning. Saturday's game was well played by both teams, except for the one bad inning for the Eagles. Coach Barry said that he was well pleased with the progress of the Eagles and promises to give Alpine a run for their money in the first conference game of the season to be played there Tuesday, March 28.

Noted Artist Exhibits Works In High School Here Tuesday

Students of the Sanderson High School, local art enthusiasts and interested citizens were honored Tuesday afternoon by a visit of Artist Charles Michel, a native of Belgium, who with his wife, was enroute to California to exhibit 23 of his paintings and was delayed here because of car trouble. In an interview with Mr. Michel, he stated that the paintings which he placed on exhibit in the library of the high school building, were painted in Italy, Belgium and Mexico. He was very modest in his statements of his art and works and it was learned that his subjects had included some of the royalty of Europe. He has painted two portraits of King Albert of Belgium, one of the King's mo-

ther and other notables of the European continent.

Mr. Michel had on exhibit at the high school a self-portrait to bring out the fact that detail and true likeness were the efforts of his endeavors in portraying a chosen subject in oil.

The self-portrait was evidence of the fact that his brush yielded true effects to the eye-image.

The Michels have been residents of Mexico City for the past three years and they met and married there. They have visas entitling them to spend three months in the United States and they plan to spend most of their time in Los Angeles but promised local citizens another visit on their return trip to Mexico.

Among the subjects he had on exhibition were landscapes, seascapes, a portrait of his wife, a self-portrait, character studies, and paintings of noted edifices in and around Mexico City and Italy and Belgium. Subdued but sharp colorings and excellent detail were noted in all of the pictures.

It was interesting to note in conversation with Mr. Michel that it seemed an honor to be permitted to show his works rather than it being the privilege of Sandersonians to view them. He and his wife expressed deep gratitude to the people of Sanderson who had been so gracious in making his stay here very pleasant. He was loud in his praise for the kindness shown by the people of West Texas and stated that definitely they were the most gracious people with whom he had ever been in contact.

The exhibit was arranged and sponsored by the Evening Study Club and club members served as hostesses from two to four p. m.

Four Houston Youths Apprehended Here Charged With Theft

COAST-TO-COAST MEASURING PROJECT REVEALS DISTANCE ALONG RIO GRANDE

The measuring device recently devised by Max Kimble, area foreman of range riders in the BAI's foot-and-mouth disease border quarantine project, has recently computed the length of the Rio Grande River from its mouth to El Paso and measured the distance to be 1490.6 miles.

The area along the border of which Kimble is foreman, from Pump Canyon near Langtry to San Francisco Canyon, was measured as 80.5 miles.

The mechanical device, which consists of an odometer or mileage meter, mounted on the hub

of a bicycle wheel with two long hollow steel shafts attached, making it possible to be drawn by a man on horseback, gave the answer to the long-sought question of just how far it is along the border river between specified locations.

Work was recently completed on the entire distance from the mouth of the Rio Grande to the Pacific coast. It was found that from Brownsville to Del Rio is 914.8 miles; from Del Rio to El Paso, 575.8 miles; from El Paso to the Pacific coast along the border is 817.5 miles.

Preston Smith Enters Race For Lt. Governor

Preston Smith, 38-year-old Lubbock business man, entered the political arena this week by announcing his candidacy for Lieutenant Governor. Smith has been a resident of Lubbock for 18 years.

He is a three-term veteran of the Texas House of Representatives. He was first elected in 1944 to represent District 119.

During his service in the House, Smith has been for four years a member of the appropriations committee. He has also served as chairman of the subcommittee on higher education. He is a firm believer in the application of sound business methods in the operation of the state government.

Much of his career in the House has been devoted to championing the cause of Texas' rural people. He was author of the rural hospital bill and co-author of the rural telephone bill, and also has been active in the fight for farm-to-market roads and soil conservation. He has been a supporter of all veteran legislation.

Commenting on his race for Lieutenant Governor, Smith said, "Much of Texas' population is centered in rural areas and small communities. Unless you have lived on a farm or in one of the very small towns, of which there are many in the state, you can't realize how much is needed in the way of worthwhile legislation for the rural areas. Texas needs the services which the rural population provides. The rural population needs better facilities for day-to-day living. As Lieutenant Governor, I will continue my efforts to see that this important segment of our population receives as many needed improvements as possible, along with other necessary and important legislation."

Smith also authorized the bill, in the House, which would require all boards, bureaus and state agencies that spend state tax money to hold open meetings and to advise the press in writing of such meetings. The measure passed the House but did not get by the Senate.

Excellent Lamb Crop Is Predicted For County

Ranchers To Get Census Blanks

A. J. Hahn, Jr., crew chief for the Federal Census in Terrell County, announced this week that the agricultural questionnaires will be mailed to all ranchers before the census begins on April 1. Ranchers will have to consult their records to obtain the information requested and he stated that it would be appreciated if ranchers will fill in all of the information possible before the enumerator arrives.

Mr. Hahn further stated that these records will be kept absolutely confidential and will be examined only by an employee of the Bureau of Federal Census who will be subject to a heavy fine and imprisonment if he discloses any of the information given. The records cannot be examined by the Department of Internal Revenue, not even by the F. B. I.

Six persons took the aptitude test here Monday for the job of enumerator, three of whom will be employed for the taking of the census in Terrell County. A school for enumerators will be held here for five days next week beginning Monday.

According to reports from ranchmen of the area this week, the lamb crop for this county will range near the 100% mark for an average for all ranches.

Ranchmen who have finished marking their spring lambs have reported in every case that they have marked over 100 percent with the lambs from yearling ewes and the number of twins being phenomenal. Many of the flocks are still lambing and some of the stockmen are now in the process of marking. Those reports are yet incomplete from the majority of the ranches, but the consensus of the outcome tallies with the reports of those who have the figures available.

Ranchmen to the north and east have received more beneficial rains which leaves their range in fair shape but in need of rain to sustain the brush and grass that is going fast to the mouths of eyes raising single and twin lambs. Some reports of the country to the south and southwest are that the range is in bad shape and the need for rain is dire. It has been stated by some ranchmen that they will have to start feeding this month to provide sufficient feed for the ewes trying to raise the lambs.

There is no indication now as to the outcome of the market for lambs this summer but the opinion of the area are of the opinion that the prices will be good and that they will profit substantially from the large number of lambs in this year's crop.

FIRE SIREN MOVED, PAINTED THIS WEEK

The posts that supported the fire siren for the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department were moved this week to the back of the Community Public Service Co. due to the construction of the addition to the back of the James Word Service Station where the alarm was formerly located. In the process of the moving, the siren was painted with aluminum rust-preventive paint to protect the instrument.

The siren had been in its former location since the organization of the local volunteer fire fighting unit.

While the posts and siren were being moved to the new site there was no necessity for sounding the alarm and, had there been, the sirens on the trucks would have been sounded to arouse the volunteers.

Local Directors Go To Meet of TS&GRA

John T. Williams, S. L. Stumberg and Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Downie returned last week end from Lubbock where they attended a meeting of the directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association Saturday. This was their first quarterly meeting. Both Stumberg and Williams are directors of the TS&GRA.

The directors stated that some of the actions of the group were: urging the House Ways and Means Committee of Congress to delay any changes until the courts had finally construed the act now in existence; discussion of some of the provisions of state laws governing the mixing and labeling of feeds by the manufacturer; a resolution calling Secretary of Agriculture Brannan's attention to the need for extensive research in brush control was approved and that the next budget request include funds for this purpose; a resolution asking for more aid on the part of the ranchers with state trappers and hunters in predatory animal control work.

Approximately 100 persons attended the meeting.

At the close of session the directors voted to hold their next meeting in Alpine in June.

New Procedure For Issuance Of Licenses For Car Operators

After years of study aimed at better serving the motorists of this state, Texas, has pioneered in improving the style and the procedure of issuance of drivers' licenses, according to Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Under direct supervision of A. F. Temple, Chief of the Department's Drivers License Bureau, the new license has been adopted, after extensive study for greater ease of processing and with a view toward making the renewal of licenses less effort on the part of the motorists.

Effective last week, the License Division will begin issuing the new style operator, commercial and chauffeur permits to all applicants. Licenses now in effect will remain valid and will be replaced by the new form upon the next renewal by the present holder.

Complete handling of the new license will be effected by machines and the license itself will be mailed out in the form of a post card which is so arranged to permit separation to allow

for proper fitting into billfolds or card cases.

One of the more important features of the new procedure will be a recorded renewal copy of the original license which will be mailed to operators about a month prior to the expiration date of their license advising them that it is about to expire. This is expected to be a real benefit to the thousands of Texas drivers who habitually allow their license to expire because of neglect in checking the expiration date.

Holders of the old type license which has been in use for several years will not be required to execute a form when seeking renewal. All that is necessary is to tear off the renewal stub, make any corrections as to address, etc., on same, and mail it in along with a money order in the proper amount.

Cost and validation periods of the licenses will remain the same: fifty cents for operators license for two years; one dollar for commercial license for one year; and three dollars for chauffeurs license for one year.

Americana, History and Horseflesh

INDELIBLY inscribed on the minds of all interested in art, Americana or horseflesh are the names of Remington, Russell and Leigh. The latest welcome news coming to this public is a circuit of exhibits featuring a variety of paintings by W. R. Leigh that will tour the United States from coast to coast.

Besides the more or less permanent exhibitions on display at Grand Central Art Galleries, New York, Gump's Galleries in San Francisco and Frank Phillips' Woolaroc Museum in Oklahoma, an important show is to be given January 3 through 22 at The Maryland Institute, Baltimore, where Leigh, as a lad of 14 from Martinsburg, West Virginia, obtained his first instruction. Vital to American history are such canvases as "The Buffalo Drive," "The Buffalo Hunt," "Land of the Navahos" and "Open Season on Bighorn," included in this show.
