Regan Favors Cut In Excise Taxes

Representative Ken Regan, Congressman serving the vast 16th District, this week advised the Sanderson Times that in keeping with his views favoring reduction in Federal expenditures, less centralization of power in the national government, and return to the American system of free enterprise and individual initiative, he also favors a reduction in current excise taxes as a stimulant to business.

While it would not be feasible to reduce taxes drastically at this time, he feels that it is vital to the domestic economy to reduce excise taxes which are resulting in buyer resistance and are thereby crippling business.

Reduction of these taxes will have the tendency to stimulate business, he stated, and this, with curtailment of overlapping functions of government, would bring about a more nearly balanced federal budget, thus giving our people a more optimistic outlook for the future prosperity of the country, Mr. Regan writes.

Previously the West Texas session had expressed positive opposition to any type of legislation leading to socialized medicine.
