The census information obtained by the 1950 enumerators will be the most complete and comprehensive ever assembled, but it is emphasized repeatedly that information given will be absolutely confidential and that census data nevr has been, and will not be, made available to any other branches of overnment, as it affects any individual. The census dates back to George Washington, and the second article of the Constitution precribes the method of taking it.

Only totals compiled from all reports will be released at any time. Population of each community and county, agricultural data and information of the standards of living will be compiled. Ages of all persons will be asked, as well as information as to annual income, production from all types of crops

Pay is based on the number of attended persons counted - at 7c each specified extras. Each enumerator should earn from \$7 to \$8 per day, depending on luck of finding people at home, and other factors.
