LISTEN TO LUKE

Warm weather has started in and that brings up a subject that we have to discuss every year at this time. All the papers are beginning to preach the same old story about clean-up programs. We have no city government to proclaim a definite time for clean-up week — but we do have the civic pride to act voluntarily and to the job without anyone designating certain days for the project.

We hope to see every citizen of Sanderson begin now to put their premises in order to make this a clean town and a town as free as possible from fire hazards. Some houses are badly in need of paint — some are getting it, some of the cafes in Sanderson has announced that re-decorating has begun, other have finished recently and another has a re-decorating job planned for the near future. These will add greatly to the impression on tourists who patronize those places.

The local railroad yards are getting a going-over. The work of strengthening the siding for long trains has been completed and will accommodate trains of over 100 cars. This work is being done in Alpine, Marfa and other towns where trains must go on a siding. Work on the spreader dams to divert water from the yards when it rains will be of great help in following the water on down the canyon.

School is about to come to a close for another summer and many of the pupils in the class will soon learn the reason for the term "commencement." That is where they commence to begin to learn some of the things that many people have been calling "nuts crazy for knowing for any years."

The people of Sanderson are proud that they can afford the opportunity to the youth of today being able to graduate from well-rounded educational institution and curriculum as is being offered to the school children of our county and state today. We feel that the school, the faculty and the knowledge available has been a definite asset to the town.

Another car wreck where all occupants came out alive! We wonder how long that record can be sustained with so many mistakes. Last Saturday afternoon two cars were involved in a collision at a street intersection. Both cars were badly damaged but no one seriously hurt.

If we knew what to say to cause more precaution we would sit up all night to write it before there are more fatalities. There must always be, in the minds of drivers, the realization that there might be someone else driving while they are on the streets, and that pedestrians at times must go in the streets if accidents are to be prevented. Drivers should never forget that another car, a child or an adult might be around the corner which they cannot see around and that they too use the streets and highways.

We are not attempting to place any blame for this or any other accident — that is the responsibility of other parties — all we attempt to do is point out the danger involved in driving a car.

EAGLES CLOSE YEAR WITH .500 AVERAGE ON GAMES PLAYED

The Sanderson High School baseball team closed the season last week with their 23-11 win over Marfa, the leaders of District 7-B, and their win over the runners-up, Alpine, by a score of 15-4. This is the first year that the local high school has entered baseball competition and their record of games won and lost bespeaks the fact that they made a good showing of themselves in district competition. It has been expressed in some circles that outside of pitching material, the Eagles ended the season with probably the strongest team in the league.

In non-conference competition, the Eagles defeated Iraan twice, won one and lost three to Brackettville. In the district games they won six; four from Marathon, and one each from Marfa and Alpine; and lost six, three each to Marfa and Alpine. They ran up a total of 255 runs against their opponents' 160 in 17 games with an average of 15 runs per game to 9-plus for their opponents.

Nine lettermen will return for competition next year, and the Eagles will probably be the pre-season favorites to win the district flag.

The team was coached this year by J. G. Barry and G. E. Luckenbach.

He has served in the capacity of County Attorney of Val Verde County, City Attorney for the City of Del Rio, and Attorney for the Del Rio Independent School District, and the past two years as district attorney.

Newton emphasized that the time is short between now and the primary election and that he might not be able to contact each voter personally, as he would like to and, therefore, he will certainly appreciate the influence and support exercised by his friends in his behalf.

Local Rail Yards Being Renovated For Diesel Service

Work is yet incomplete in the local rail yards that will make for better accommodations for diesel or long trains coming into Sanderson and increase the efficiency as well as speed up service. Track number 2 has been extended to hold 100 or more cars and 13-inch water line has been run the length of the tracks to service the long trains on either end, speeding up the moving of trains through the local tracks, according to A. C. Smith, agent.

Heavy equipment is working at present building up the embankment between the tracks and the canyon to the south to keep water out of the local yards during a rise in the canyon as a result of rain. This will also protect the yard equipment.

Mr. Smith stated that this work was brought about by necessity since the influx of diesel service through Sanderson and that the installations were not temporary or put in just to take care of a present situation.

Wallace To Head Local Legion Post

Monte Wallace, World War I veteran and Terrell County ranchman, was elected as commander of the Clarence Hallie Mulkey Post No. 160 of the American Legion for the coming year. The election was held at a well-attended regular meeting of the post here last Thursday night at the Legion Hall.

Troy Druse is the out-going commander and Wilton Dishman served as finance officer for the past two years.

A committee on constitution and by-laws was named by the commander to submit any recommendations to submit to the members at the next regular meeting any recommendations for proposed amendments.

CENSUS FIGURES SHOW GAIN OF 219 IN TERRELL COUNTY

Census figures for Terrell County received Thursday morning by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson show Terrell County has gained in population from 2,952 in 1940 to 3,171, an increase of 219, according to early figures released by the U. S. Bureau of Census.

The figures show only the population for the county and it is not known whether or not figures will be released showing population of Sanderson and Dryden.

Ramsey Announces For Lt.-Governor

Austin, May 10 — Ben Ramsey, San Augustine, who has a long record of service in both houses of Legislature, today formally announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor of Texas.

The East Texan resigned this spring as secretary of state in order to prepare to make the state race. He was appointed secretary of state in January, 1949, by the late Gov. Beauford H. Jester and continued to serve under Gov. Allan Shivers, when he took office.

Ramsey began his political career in 1930 when he was elected to the House from San Augustine County. He served in the House for four years and in 1940 was elected to the Texas Senate, where he has served eight years.

Ramsey has been a leader in the advancement of rural electrification in the state. For the past ten years he has been attorney for the Deep East Texas Electric Co-operative, and during this time this pioneering rural utility has grown into one of the largest and most financially sound in Texas.

He has been a consistent supporter of improving educational opportunities in Texas, and the farm-to-market road improvement program.

Clifford O. Lawrence Candidate For District Attorney

Clifford O. Lawrence, Brackettville attorney, is the first candidate to announce with this paper for the office of District Attorney of the 63rd Judicial District of Texas, subject to the Democratic Primary July 22.

A native of Fayette County, Texas, Mr. Lawrence was reared and educated in central Texas where he has been engaged in the general practice of law since 1938.

He entered military service immediately after the beginning of World War II and served for almost five and one-half years in the ETO in various military assignments.

He was separated from the army with the rank of major in 1946 and joined his wife and daughter in Brackettville where he established law offices and resumed his general practice of law. He was soon appointed County Attorney of Kinney County to fill a vacancy for the unexpired term of that office.

Mr. Lawrence was an unsuccessful candidate for the office of Congressman from the 87th district of Texas in 1948, the office now held by Tom Stovell of Alpine.

Mr. Lawrence stated that he would appreciate any consideration on behalf of his candidacy and would show appreciation by the proper disposition of the duties expected of a man holding the important office.

Softball Schedule Starts Play May 22 For Local League

The softball committee of the Lions Club, sponsoring organization for the local sport, has drawn up a schedule and rules governing eligibility of players for teams for the coming softball season. The official play will begin May 22. Games this year will be played on Monday and Friday nights and game time will be around 8 o'clock or about the time of darkness.

All players are asked to clip out the following for their information.

The rules are as follows:

The membership of any team shall be limited to 15 players excepting that the railroad-representative is allowed unlimited membership so long as they play only men working in this division. The membership is construed to mean that a member is not eligible until the manager has submitted in writing to the executive committee an addition and/or revision of its roster.

A player who participates in a league game (any part of as a regular player) may represent no other team for the season in league play; provided players may prior to July 1 change teams, if they have not participated in league games.

Upon arrival in town a player may be eligible to play before or after July 1 provided seven complete days have elapsed since his arrival, excepting such player may have fourteen full days to change teams if he has not participated in league play.

Postponed games will be in accordance with the rules (rule book) of the game; providing further that the next Wednesday following a game date, be set to complete or play such postponed games. Postponed games will be completed in the order in which they appear on the schedule. The changing of dates for games because of conflicting activities and funerals, etc., will be done only after notifying the executive committee and then such game will be construed as a postponed game.

The regulation game will be set forth by the executive committee after consulting team managers. An all-star game will be played July 3, the league leading (longest current lead in case of tie in equal number of games played to date, excepting that postponed games not completed cannot be counted against any team in figuring the

team percentages) team acting as host and the opponent to be composed of players from the other teams to be selected, according to ability, by the majority vote of all team managers in executive committee session.

Umpires will be appointed by the executive committee after consulting team managers. There will be a sudden-death play-off to be governed by league rules.

All other irregularities will be referred to the executive committee for consideration.

Fishing, Game Laws Noted for Sportsmen

Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, suggests that it is the time of the year for Texans to check up on any new state laws. The statewide fish license law has been in effect since late last summer but it might stand a refresher by sportsmen.

Its primary purpose is to provide one master license for fishing at a cost of \$65, thus doing away with the various special county licenses. One conspicuous provision is to permit Texans to fish free in their home counties, providing they do not use artificial bait, and to permit them to fish without license in counties adjacent to their own home counties, providing they do not use either artificial bait or live bait.

He also suggested that sportsmen check their food lockers containing game. He pointed out that the 90-day federal limit for storing migratory birds, as applied to mourning doves, expired February 12, but that the 90-day deadline for ducks and geese was not due until April 7. There is no limit to storing deer, wild turkey or quail, but locker plants are required by law to keep a record of persons keeping game in storage.

NEW TEXAS MASONIC GRAND LODGE



This magnificent building at Waco is Texas' new Masonic Memorial Grand Lodge Temple. The imposing \$2,000,000 structure has been described as the most beautiful Masonic Grand Lodge in the United States. Covering almost a city block, it houses a 3,700-seat auditorium, a library and a museum, and serves as headquarters for the governing bodies of Texas' 152,000 Masons in 902 lodges. Elaborate dedication ceremonies were among the most impressive in the history of Masonry. Cement for the building—8,750 bbls. of standard portland cement and 500 bbls. of mortar cement—was supplied by U. S. Steel's Universal Atlas Cement Company from its Waco plant. The Temple also has 729 tons of steel, 30,000 cu. feet of stone and granite and 1,500 cu. feet of marble. General contractor was A. J. Rife, Dallas. Robert Leon White, Austin, and Broad & Nelson, Dallas, were the associated architects and Walter Cooke, Jr., Waco, was resident architect.

Bank Deposits Gain Since Last Year

The April 24th statement of condition of the Sanderson State Bank, printed in last week's issue of the Times, shows slight losses in loans and discounts and time deposits of individuals over the statement of a year ago. However, an increase is noted in the total assets and resources and deposits reflecting a slight upturn in business for the county.

A year ago, total resources were \$1,512,367.33 compared with \$1,597,101.67 on April 24. Capital stock has remained at the same figure for both years but surplus has increased from \$60,000 to \$65,000, and undivided profits now are \$17,558.52.

Demand deposits have increased from \$1,153,674.72 to \$1,245,248.53 but time deposits have decreased from \$64,922.53 to \$59,997.53, a decrease of less than \$5,000.

Loans and discounts last year totaled \$504,127.60 and this year were \$473,609.33, a decrease of over \$30,000. U. S. Government obligations have almost doubled during the past year standing at the figure \$653,659.37 on April 24 and \$392,500 at the same time last year.

POSTS ERECTED AT GATE TO FOOTBALL FIELD

The concrete posts at the entrance of the football field on the west end have been erected and specifications turned over to the manufacturer for the archway to go across the top of the posts. Four posts have been built and will allow space for the entrance of two cars to the field at one time. A ticket booth will be erected between the two inside posts to house ticket sellers at the games and afford them shelter and light which are badly needed.

The steel arch being put over the entrance will contain the words "Eagle Field", the official name of the gridiron, voted by the school board at their last meeting.

Fly-Killing Time Here, Warns Cox, State Health Head

Dr. George W. Cox reports that fly infestation will be heavy this year and that housewives should arm themselves with fly swatters and fly repellent to take care of any of the pests that infiltrate into the house. His first warning, however, came against broken or torn screens on windows and doors that permit the entrance of flies into the house.

These pests love to buzz around in uncovered garbage pails, stables, privies and in homes around uncovered food. Do you have a metal garbage pail with a tight-fitting lid? Are screens on your windows and doors in good repair. Waste should be removed from stables often, for horse and sow manure are one of the chief breeding places of flies. Children can help to keep flies out of the house by keeping screen doors closed and helping swat the flies that get into the house.

Flies carry germs on their fast-moving wings, in their tube-like mouths and on their furry legs and feet. They spread fever, dysentery and tuberculosis.

Clean-up campaigns, screening and spraying with insecticides are the best methods for getting rid of flies. Special care should be used in the use of DDT, or other insecticides and directions should be followed carefully.

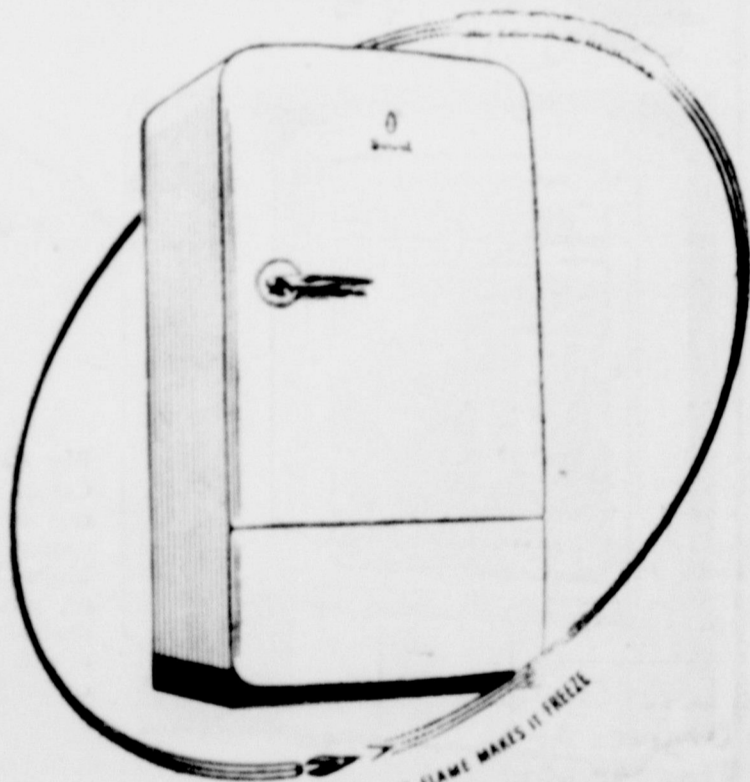
