Candidate Cites Need For Experience To Curb Crime

Clifford O. Lawrence, a candidate for the office of District Attorney of the 63rd Judicial District of Texas, the present County Attorney of Kinney County, recently made a talk to the Rotarians at Brackettville which reflected that he possesses a wide range of experience and a broad knowledge in the field of law enforcement, gained through nine years of service with the F. B. I., in the middle '30's, and in various Intelligence and Criminal Investigation Division assignments in the Army during World War II, in which service and assignments he has participated in the investigation of cases involving the subjects of John Dillinger, "Baby Face" Nelson, "Pretty Boy" Floyd, Kate Barker and her sons, and Alvin Karpis and many other underworld characters of the past, both in this country and in Europe, to include the Kroenberg Jewel Case in Frankfurt, Germany, during the last war.

Lawrence points out that the number of people in our district, to include the itinerants of this country and those from Mexico, who move about within the district demand an experienced team consisting of local peace officers in the respective counties of the district, supported by the district attorney, in order to provide adequate law enforcement within our district.

It is imperative that this team consist of men thoroughly trained and experienced in the modern methods of crime detection and prevention. These modern methods require a thorough knowledge and ability to locate or recognize and assemble evidence with which to reconstruct a crime at the scene of the incident and preserve the evidence for the purpose of determining the identity of those committing the crime, prove their guilt or innocence and obtain a conviction of the guilty. This reconstruction of a crime entails the knowledge of what evidence is and what should be done with it once it is located, with a view of handing it properly in order that it will not be destroyed. It must be properly identified and processed so that the evidence, regardless of how minute it may be, will produce the most information with which to determine the identity of the person that is assumed guilty and reconstruct the crime.

The preservation of this evidence requires a knowledge of the use of photography, montage, plaster casts, etc., incidental to preserving immovable evidence, such as foot prints, tire tracks, tool marks on window and door jams and the like. In this connection a knowledge of developing and lifting latent fingerprints is imperative.

In so far as the preservation and handling of moveable evidence is concerned, the use of a criminal laboratory is often necessary. The routine for obtaining such facilities and knowing what would be good material for laboratory analysis is also imperative. Once a suspect or suspects in any given crime are located it is necessary to prove that he or they have committed the crime in question, and often under the vigorous denials of the suspect or suspects. To do this requires a thorough knowledge of the art of interrogation, which entails a knowledge of a detailed proven and often used system, coupled with a knowledge of human nature and the ability to understand people.

The use of technical equipment is frequently necessary in this connection such as the use of the aid of polygraph, or lie detector, and microphones. Likewise the knowledge of the use of informants, and the conduct of a surveillance of the suspects is useful. A district attorney is not required to be a detective, however, he is part of a law-enforcement team and his knowledge of the various modern methods in existence and the facilities available today and used in crime prevention and detection are imperative in preparing his case for trial and in the actual experience and extensive training in this field of endeavor.

NOTICE...

Effective June 1st the Community House is closed, and reverts back to the owner of the property for private use. It is with regret that we take this step; we are making use of this means of informing the public of the circumstances surrounding our decision to abandon the project.

The Community House was opened in March, 1948, by the Sanderson Garden Club. It was intended for use by the general public as a meeting place for organizations, and for private parties and gatherings. The building was leased by the Garden Club from the owner at the rate of \$1.00 (one dollar) per year. Extensive interior alterations and repairs were done at club expense. Roofing and exterior painting were done at owner's expense. Total debt incurred by the Garden Club in its program of redecorating, repair, alteration, and refurnishing was \$1122.50. Friends and members of the club made numerous loans of furniture and fixtures.

During the first year and one-half of operation, the Community House ran at a profit. As a result of hard work on the part of the members and excellent cooperation from the public, the club has cut the \$1122.50 debt down to \$65.90. Sale of remaining furniture will wipe out this deficit. At no time during the two years has the club membership exceeded 22; average membership has been 20.

For the past few months, however, the general public has not been making use of the Community House as it did in the past. For that reason, the house has been showing a small deficit each month. Certain fixed expenses such as electricity and water bills must be met each month; receipts from rent of the building to groups and individuals since Christmas have fallen short of these expenses.

The Lions and Rotary Clubs of Sanderson made a generous offer to underwrite our expenses and retire our debt for us if we would continue to operate the Community House. We declined the offer, however, feeling that under our operation the project would continue to run at a loss. We felt that if the two men's clubs would take over the building it would pay its own way, because we believed these clubs would have enjoyed fuller cooperation from the public. We wish to thank the Lions and Rotary Clubs publicly for their kind offer of assistance, and we take this means of explaining and justifying our action in turning it down.

During the two years of operation of the Community House we have accumulated a library of more than 150 books. These we are saving against the possibility of a public library at some time in the future, at which time they will be returned to public use. All items we have borrowed are being returned. The young people of the Baptist Church have bought our china and glassware. Today at 2:00 p. m. (Friday, June 2) we will offer for sale all our remaining items of furniture and household goods. A price list of these items appears in another advertisement in this paper. The public is invited to attend this sale.

We close expressing our gratitude to the people of Sanderson and to the club's many friends for their cooperation and assistance during the past two years. We regret that we cannot continue to operate the Community House, for we feel that there is a definite need in Sanderson for a project of this type. We sincerely hope that at some time in the future the citizens of Sanderson and Terrell County will see the need for a modern Community Center, and will work together toward successful operation of such a project.

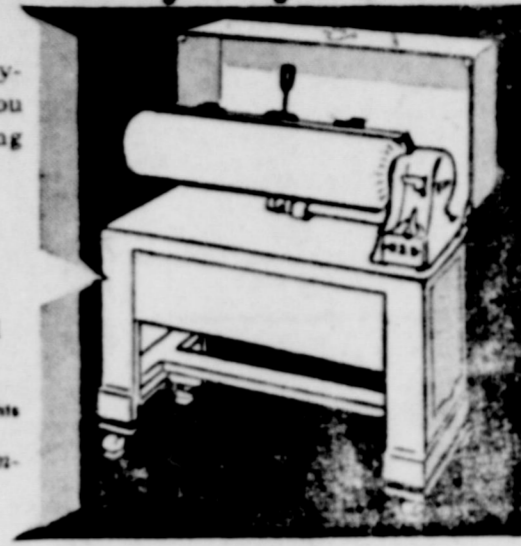
