## VETERANS BOW TO LIONS; FIREMEN BEAT LEGIONNAIRES

Last Friday night the Lions Club softball team won roughshod over the young VFW aggregation in a 12-1 tilt. G. Flores started for the youngsters and was relieved by P. Flores to try and stop the scoring Lions.

Huffman led the service club players in individual batting when he got two safeties for two trips. Nance and Gilbreath each batted a .750. Nance has batted a perfect record in the only preceding game which him an .875 for the highest individual percentage shown where a player has been in more than one game.

The Lions have split the two games played by losing one and winning the other, while the VFW had have lost their two games played.

## Early Recognition Of Diabetes Pays, Says Health Head

Austin, June 10 — Diabetes is among the first ten reported causes of death in Texas. There are many people receiving treatment for this disease. Probably there are hundreds of undiscovered cases in the state, says Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Early recognition of diabetes pays. In the experience of doctors, those discovered early before they had complications lived three times as long as those discovered after some blighting affliction drove them to a doctor. If you are the relative of a diabetic, or if you are approaching the fair, fat and forty era of life, go to a doctor before you get sick and find out if you have diabetes. If you do have it, control the disease in season and out of season. It pays.

Don't be caught napping. Find out if you have diabetes! If you do have it, make it an asset! Prove that you can live longer with it than without it. Then you will be helping not yourself alone, but also other diabetics.

What is diabetes? When a person has diabetes, his body has lost some of its ability to turn the sugar in food into heat and energy. The sugar which should be used by the body goes into the bloodstream until there is so much sugar in the blood that the sugar overflows into the urine. Because a lot of the sugar is not used various bodily organs such as heart, liver, kidneys and eyes do not get good nourishment.

The person whose diabetes is not treated may get cataracts, and other eye disease, kidney trouble, hardening of the arteries, or gangrene. Be sure to consult your family physician.

## June 17 Last Date To File For County And Precinct Office

Prospective candidates for county and precinct offices have until June 17 to file for a spot on the election ballot.

The following Monday, the Terrell County Democratic Executive Committee will meet to assess proportionate costs for each candidate filing. Under this system the cost of the election is estimated, and the total split among campaigners according to the importance of the office and the number of candidates running.

Filers will be notified of their assessment immediately, and they will have until Saturday, June 24, to make payment. Those failing to comply with the ruling will be left off the ballot.

Although many candidates are unopposed, costs will not be higher than in the past, according to W. W. Sudduth, County Democratic chairman.

## ANNUAL JULY 4TH BARBECUE, DANCE PLANNED BY LEGION

The local post of the American Legion has committees working for the consummation of plans for the annual July 4th celebration in Sanderson. As has been the custom in the past, the Legion post here will sponsor the big free barbecue on the courthouse lawn at noon and will give away a \$500 bond, a purebred Hereford bull calf, donated by N. M. Mitchell, and a 270 calibre Winchester rifle. These prizes will be awarded from tickets given to those who have donated to the celebration.

At nine o'clock that night the public is invited to a dance sponsored by the American Legion. The music will be furnished by Andy Schroeder and his band, the committee has announced.

## Law Enforcement In Hands of Voters, Candidate Says

The majority of the people of our country are indifferent to law enforcement until some criminal incident occurs which affects them personally. They then realize and understand the necessity of having fully qualified men in office to enforce our laws; and they also realize that one inexperienced law enforcement officer holder can be responsible for a complete breakdown in the chain of events incidental to the successful prosecution of a case. People then fully understand the futility of voting for an unqualified candidate for any law enforcement office; unless he possesses the ability and experience to adequately dispose of the duties of the office he seeks.

Ineffective law enforcement for any reason, presents a dangerous situation to the community affected; in that it encourages the criminal element to raise their heads and move about unafraid and unnoticed among our law abiding citizens, and commit every felony known in our state, and very often wreck the lives of their victims and their families to say nothing of the useless expenses incurred and the loss of the lives of good and capable peace officers and law abiding citizens, nor to mention the fact that the offender is released back into the community, often inadequately punished, or not punished at all, with less respect for the law, and absolutely none for our courts and our peace officers.

Qualified law enforcement officials are as necessary to our district as an army is to our country, and adequate security can easily be provided by thinking law abiding citizens by their voting for qualified and experienced candidates for public law enforcement offices.

Clifford O. Lawrence, candidate for the office of District Attorney, 3rd Judicial District, urges the people of this district to realize the necessity of electing to offices capable men in the interest of enjoying adequate law enforcement within the district.

## COMMISSION TO HEAR HIGHWAY GROUP JUNE 30

The Texas State Highway Commission will hear a group of Terrell County citizens in Austin at 9 o'clock Friday, June 30, according to word received here this week.

The hearing was requested recently by local citizens who are endeavoring to get funds authorized for the completion of new paving started two years ago. The old paving in Terrell County extends from about 8 miles east of Sanderson to about 10 miles east of Dryden. This gap of the highway is the roughest stretch between El Paso and San Antonio and has several dangerous curves where numerous accidents have occurred in recent months.

Photos of the curves and descriptions of the various accidents are being assembled for the information of the commission members to show the need for the asked improvement.

Interested citizens who can make the trek to Austin on that date are urged to do so in order that a good representation may appear and impress the need for the improved highway.

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson received word from the commission that the Terrell County group would be the second on the calendar for the June 30 hearing.

## Huge Figs Grown By Mrs. Joe Kerr

Mrs. Joe Kerr, Sr., brought four huge figs to the Times office Saturday to show the size of the curdinal crop of figs on her trees. The frost, hail or wind usually destroys the first crop of figs before they mature, according to Mrs. Kerr, but if the figs reach maturity, while the crop may be small, usually very large figs are found.

The four figs were weighed and averaged about three ounces each, the four weighing twelve ounces.

of mohair at those prices. These prices, it has been stated are the highest in the history of the industry and bring out an increased interest on the part of mohair growers over recent years' prices ranging at near 35c. The lowest price in the industry was 6c for grown hair, and that was so long ago that few, if any, will remember.

The market remains "hot" after two weeks on 45c higher prices than was encountered last year and some sources are of the opinion that the price rise might soon halt since many growers were declining to accept the offers, in lieu of possibly higher prices. Some expected the price to climb so high that the firms now seeking this fiber would find West Texas mohair "too high" and pull out of the market altogether. If this were to happen, it is an expressed opinion that it would leave the growers in a much worse predicament than they were a year ago when the 35c was the top price being offered. The previous top price for mohair was 78c.

Williams stated that he is now handling about one-fifth the quantity of mohair that he has handled in the peak of the sales of the product and that he expects no sharp increase in the amount of mohair locally in the next year or two.

Work is progressing rapidly on the construction of the garage and band building for the school.

The courts are on the west side of the 200-foot, 4-lot space occupied by the business. They are of hollow tile and plaster construction with eight-inch walls dividing the cabins. There are two double cabins and three singles. Asphalt tile covers the floors and each cabin has a different color scheme. The furniture is of metal in walnut finish. There is a private bath with a shower and a closet in each room. The windows of each cabin have Venetian blinds.

Cement walks have been laid in front of the cabins and also surrounding Mrs. Turner's home which is in the center of the space. The Turners plan at some future date to build five more cabins across the back of the lots.
