...from the Korean front... to be everything but good for "Little Joe". As the U. S. forces push the Reds back they taking a heavy toll in casualties. All the world is rejoicing as forces representing the peace-loving nations take the offensive and put the aggressors on the event of importance second to the war in Korea is soon to take place in this country — November election. And if it is any portent, about the eligible voters will stay on election day. It that happens it will mean that the best and most aggressive minority can impose its will upon the majority.

...the government becomes ever more powerful the more the people become greater. Regardless of the party label of the administration, politicians will try to get in office. As the activities of the government expand, the proportion expands in direct proportion. Pressure is being brought to bear in a thousand ways upon larger and larger groups of voters.

...locally, there seems to be little concern in the possibilities of outcome of the November election since there will be no option to the nominees of the parties, but throughout the country it is a grave and serious matter and should not be cast too lightly.

...more than a decade ago a forty billion dollar federal debt considered to be ruinous. The fact that the country has "prospered" far beyond this point the wheels keep turning raising the question of how far the debt can climb without resulting in economic collapse.  
Many people are no longer content simply because the debt soared to astronomical levels with no apparent ill effect. How they would do well to consider the warning of Frederick Wood, vice president of the University of California. "Unfortunately," says Mr. Greenwood, "there is no mathematical formula to define at just what point in an ordinary spiral we pass the point of no return." Deficit financing almost inevitably means inflation because the government to finance the deficits either printing money or selling government obligations to the banks, both of which increase in the supply of goods and services, we will have inflation, which means cheap prices.  
The reason we have no mathematical formula for determining the point along this road we can travel without disastrous consequences is that we are dealing with the changing and unpredictable climate of public opinion. 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#### EDITORIAL

A wreck Wednesday night involving two cars here in Sanderson should cause motorists to have a care about their driving as well as the other fellow's way of handling his car.

Fortunately there were no casualties in the Wednesday night wreck—only one man was slightly injured. There were only three persons in the two cars. It might have been serious. There might have been a fatality.

We are not going to place the blame for the accident, that is the job for the law enforcement officers and not the press. We do take the stand there where Sanderson has been fortunate in not having more casualties in so many accidents it can't go on forever without someone being killed.

According to Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of public safety, there was a record last year of 2,450 killed and \$8,750 injured with \$164,000,000 in property damage and doctor bills. That is a tragedy in any land.

Something must be done to curb this threat to those law-abiding citizens who want to use the highways of the state. There must be a stricter licensing system and the courts must tighten up on convictions if we are to reduce the hazards of driving.

### Instruments Ready For Atom War In Texas

Austin, September 29.—At least four different types of radioactive detection instruments and computers are available for measuring radiation particles if and when an atomic bomb is ever exploded over a Texas community.

This encouraging bit of information was revealed by the state's chief health official, Dr. George W. Cox. He is state director of health and emergency medical services, part of the Texas civic defense set-up.

Radiation is one of three principal harmful effects of atomic explosions. Others are blast damage and burns. Using RADIAC instruments, it is possible to know what areas are safe from the colorless, tasteless and odorless radioactive particles.

All RADIAC instruments are de-

signed for use by radiation monitoring squads. Squad members might be soldiers or they could be civilians trained by the State Health Department's radiological division. In either case they would be trained for immediate action in atomic disasters.

"Planning emergency medical and health services in an atomic disaster has been one big mess of confusion," Dr. Cox admitted. "But we're beginning to see light now. Our radiology division is going to go right to work, now that we have it set up.

Film badges are a permanent

record of the exposure to which the monitors have been subjected. Dr. Cox says they show whether or not the wearer has received the "maximum allowable lifetime dosage."

Pocket dosimeters, like the film badges are for the protection of the monitors. They look like fountain pens, and gauge on-the-spot amounts of radiation.

Film badges can be pinned onto the lapel, strapped onto the wrist, worn in a ring, etc. They consist of a piece of photographic film, and are used to show the amount of radiation to which the monitor has

been exposed. Radiation particles affect the film light light. Dozens of "tracks" are visible when the film comes in contact with heavy concentrations of radiation.

Geiger counters and ionization chambers actually count the num-

ber of radiation particles—gamma rays, and alpha and beta particles present in an area. So sensitive is the Geiger counter that it could be wired to a by his footsteps could be heard distinctly.

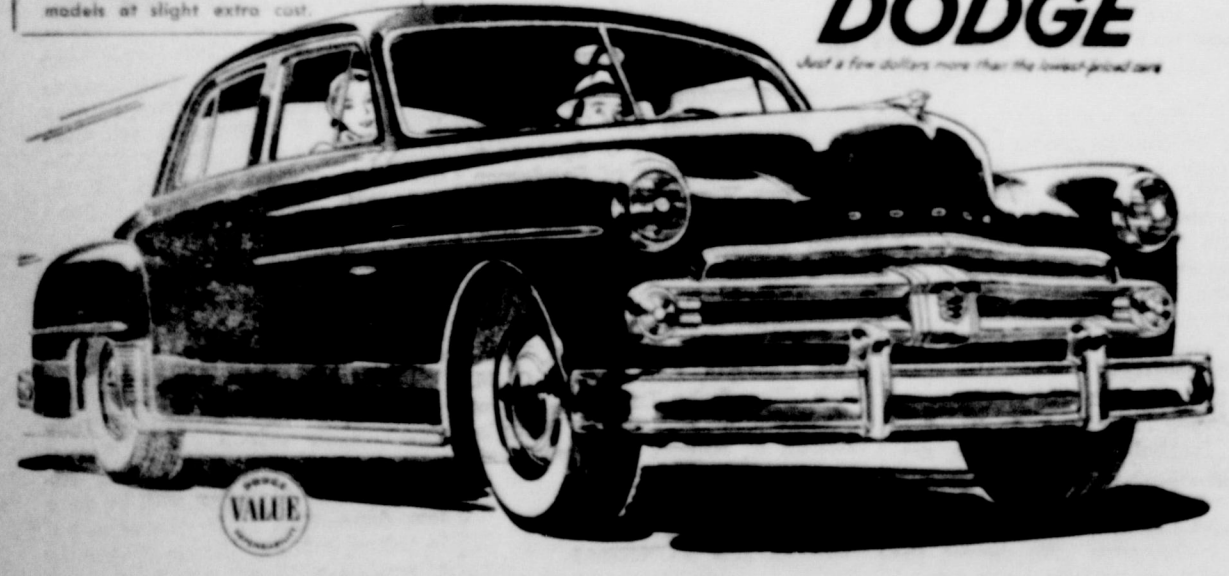

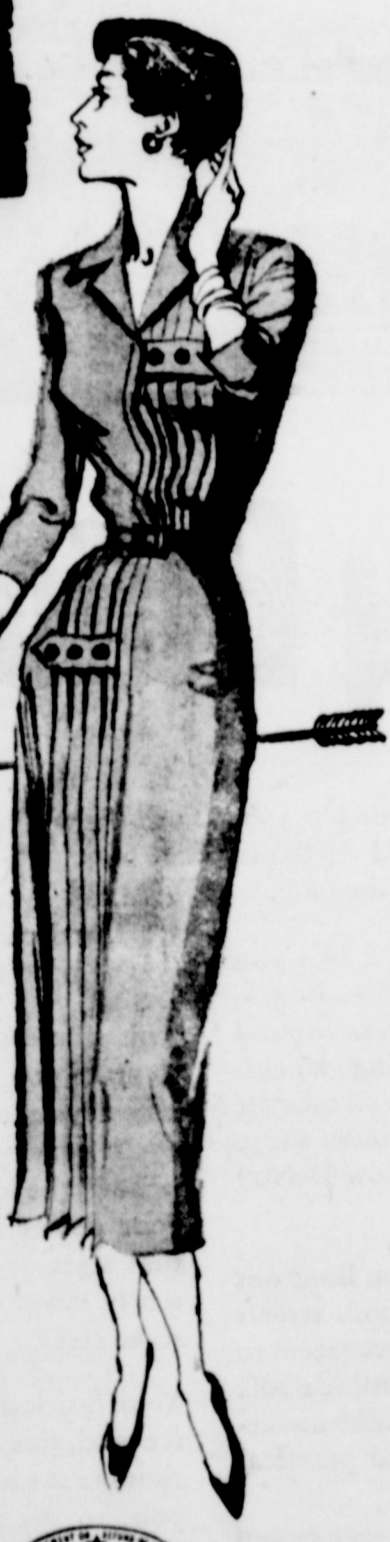
**Week of Prayer Observed By Baptist W. M. S.**
