PMA Chairman Lists Practices for '51 ACP

The 1951 Agricultural Conservation Program is open to every rancher in Terrell County Those who have a conservation problem on their ranch are urged to participate in the program. Full information is available at the County Production and Marketing Admin-

istration office in Sanderson, Joe Kerr, Jr., chairman of the County PMA Committee, advised that within the limit of the funds period available, assistance is available to all ranchers who participate in the program. Conservtaion practices carried out must meet the specifications for such practices.

"It should be understood," says Mr. Kerr, "that the funds for conservation work represents the national interest in conserving soil and water in this county. The county committee is charged with the responsibility of seeing that the funds are used to get maximum conservation for each dollar spent."

The conservation practices that have been approved for national use in conserving soil and water have been drawn up by the county committee, state PMA committee, technical committees, composed of representatives of federal, state and local agricultural agencies.

Assistance under the program is intended to encourage additional conservation and not to help the ranchers with customary operations Mr Kerr states.

Practices that may be carried out in Terrell County under the

1951 program are: Drilling or digging wells for bet ter distribution of grazing range

range land Installing water lines for betterdistribution of grazing range

Construction of earthen dams or reservoirs for livestock water or erosion control

Elimination of destructive plants on non-crop pasture and range 17 Locker land. Construction of concrete or rub-

ble masonry dams or drops for livestock water or erosion control. Control of blackbrush, creosote brush and other moxious brush. Revegetation of range or pasture

land by deferred grazing Furrowing or chiseling non-crop




