THEME OF DEATH MARKS MEXICO'S ALL-SAINTS' DAY, NOVEMBER 1-2

Mexicans have lived close to death so long, it is said, that they seldom fear it, but treat it as the inevitable part of everyday life.

Perhaps that is one reason for the unusual and almost fantastic celebration of "El Dia del Muerte" the "Day of the Dead" actually two days which takes place each Nov. 1 and 2 under circumstances found nowhere else in the world.

Here All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, as they are known in the United States and other countries, are something different. The observance here might be described as a combination of Halloween and Thanksgiving, mourning and merry-making, religious observance and paganistic roasting, with a Memorial Day theme uppermost.

In the rural Indian neighborhoods the more colorful ceremonies can be seen. In city regions there are religious rites, decorating of the tombs and attending the "Don Juan Tenorio" play presented to give a lesson of good triumphing over evil.

Nov. 1 is the "day of the little dead", dedicated to memories of dead children. Favorite toys and other personal effects are arranged around a picture of the dead child usually in the favorite room of the left one. Flowers are gathered from the special plants to decorate the shrine and line a path to the front door, to invite the spirit to return Nov. 1. Families begin visiting during the day and favorite food of the children is taken from the shrine and exchanged along with toys.

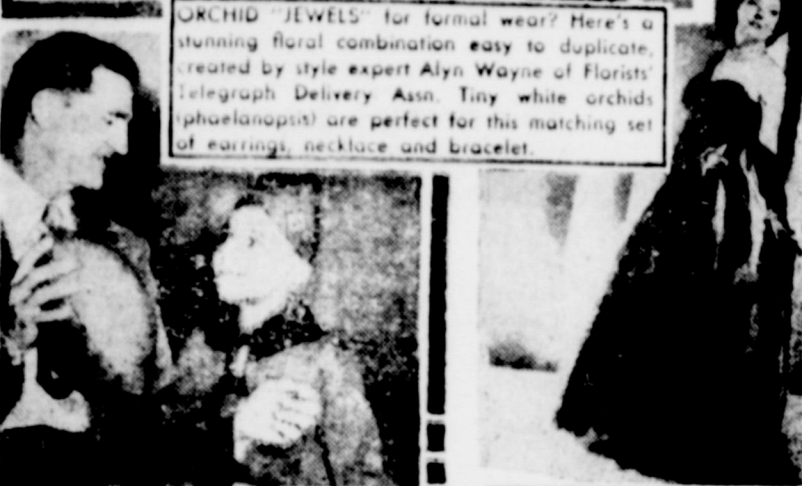

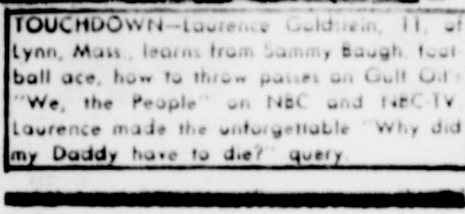

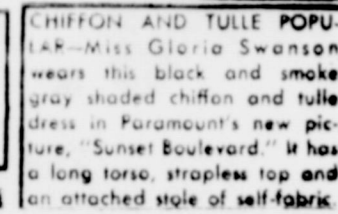

HOW TO JUDGE RANGE GRASSES IS EXPLAINED BY A & M EXTENSION HEAD

College Station, November 1 — Texas stockmen can boast of being good livestock judges because the quality of their stock indicates that they have done a good job in breed improvement. But as judges of pasture condition, of vegetation — especially grass — too many ranchmen do not know just what to look for.

The importance of learning what to look for in a good pasture grass is emphasized by A. H. Walker, range management specialist for the Texas A. & M. Extension Service. He says that 75 to 80 per cent of the forage consumed by livestock in Texas is roughage in the form of native grass. Grass is the cheapest feed available, and Walker states that knowing the vegetation, primarily grass, is a fundamental in the livestock business as knowing livestock.

In some respects judging livestock and judging grass are very similar in many respects and certain characteristics are looked for in the animal's head. Grasses also show different characteristics in the head. In fact, the grass family is broken down into various groups on the basis of differences in the seed head.

On a horse you want a good trim middle with a short coupling and fairly level croup. The middle of the grass — that is the leafy part — should be abundant, produce over a long season and cure out well.

Every livestock man knows that a horse must have straight, well-muscled legs with strong bones, or he will be of little value. The legs of a grass — that is the roots — are just as important and require just as much care as those on a horse. A grass plant depends on its root system for food and water for leaf growth. Unless the roots are deep and well distributed, reduced forage production results.

Walker reminds ranchers that heavy or close grazing has the effect of reducing the root system of the plant as well as the top growth. Good native grasses that are close-grazed die out and

are replaced by poorer, short-rooted grasses and weeds which require less water and produce less forage.

A good livestock man selects animals for breeding not only on the basis of their quality as individuals, but also from the standpoint of their desirability for use in the present breeding herd. Grasses, too, should be selected not as individual plants, but on the basis of their suitability for use in a balanced grazing program.

Walker says that keeping a mixture of adapted grasses which produces a maximum amount of palatable forage of high nutritive content during the major portion of the year should be the goal of every livestock man. He points out that production of more good grass per acre means more profit from the same acreage through extra pounds of meat produced.

Knowing the various grasses, their growing and seeding season and their pedigree is essential to sound pasture management, says Walker. The ease of obtaining an excellent grazing mixture will depend on the kind and amount of the various grasses that are already present. If the pasture is being invaded by poor grasses, the job of improving the quality and quantity of the grass mixture will be more difficult. Good deep-rooted grasses seeding out indicate that the pasture has been receiving proper management.

LOOKING AHEAD

WHO'LL BE NEXT

What would you do if tomorrow the Federal government were to announce a plan through which it would become your boss, setting forth the new regulations and conditions under which you would henceforth work and the standard salary or wage all people in your occupation would be paid? You wouldn't like it. You'd no doubt protest in every way you could. Most adult Americans have observed and even had some direct

contact with political management and political regimentation. Very few would want a political bureau or ward heeler to take over their occupation, business or profession.

Of course, if I'm a plumber and you're a butcher and the politicians announce they're taking over the butchers so we plumbers can have more meat to eat, and at little, if any, cost, that might be a horse of a different color — at first glance. Until I'd have time to think twice, it might get my favorable attention. The butchers wouldn't like it, but of course they're outnumbered.

Upon thinking the thing through I'd know the plan was a come-on for the Socialists; that after taking over the butchers and the livestock industry they'd have to take over the farmers and the feed mills because they're a part of the livestock industry; and the railroads and truck lines because they are necessary to transport both livestock and feedstuff; and the automobile manufacturers and the box car and locomotive foundries because they make the vehicles of transportation; and the construction industry which builds the plants to house the box car and auto production lines and — oh! oh! — the plumbers! For who else would put pipes in those manufacturing plants to make them operate.

That's what is happening in England. There the Socialist-Labor party used medicine instead of meat as the first persuasive come-on; though they also promised, as all Socialists do, fair shares of meat and bread and butter for all — without compensating effort. But the fair shares turned out to be hardly more than sustenance rations.

Before the English people had thought twice, the politicians and bureaucrats had taken over the profession of medicine and the physicians and hospitals for their compulsory health program which they said would not cost anybody much of anything. Then the Socialists went on from there. They are taking over the steel industry now because everything else they have socialized, they point out, a direct or indirect dependence upon this basic metal. A great many English people still haven't stopped to think twice. They continue

to live in a miserable Socialist austerity propped up by American dollars blindly hoping for economic miracles.

In America the political medicine men are proposing a compulsory health program which would socialize or nationalize the American medical profession. Most Americans have already thought twice on this scheme and have refused to be taken in. But the entire leftwing press and a number of influential politicians and bureaucrats are keeping up a huge flow of propaganda for the something-for-nothing Federal medicine program.

Our hypothetical butcher didn't want to become a pawn of the Socialists. Neither does the American doctor. The medical profession is fighting back. And in their fight every American citizen, young and old, has a stake — his individual freedom. If the Federal government, operating under no matter what "brand" of political philosophy, should take over the medical profession, it would only be a matter of time before every other business and profession — and every job — would fall within the grasp of the comparatively small group of planners who seek to become the ruling force in a Socialist America.

The medical profession has been slow realizing that its fight is not merely against socialized medicine but rather against Socialism itself. It realizes that fact now. The public should not be so slow in recognizing that the ultimate objective of the compulsory medicine politicians is not merely socialized medicine, but rather the full socialization (and thus the destruction) of our great nation. We must keep our professions, our business and industries — our occupations — out of the hands of politicians.
