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#### State Health Dept. Aids Health By Birth, Death Records

It is the statutory duty of the Texas State Department of Health through its Bureau of Vital Statistics to provide for the registration of the births and deaths occurring in Texas.

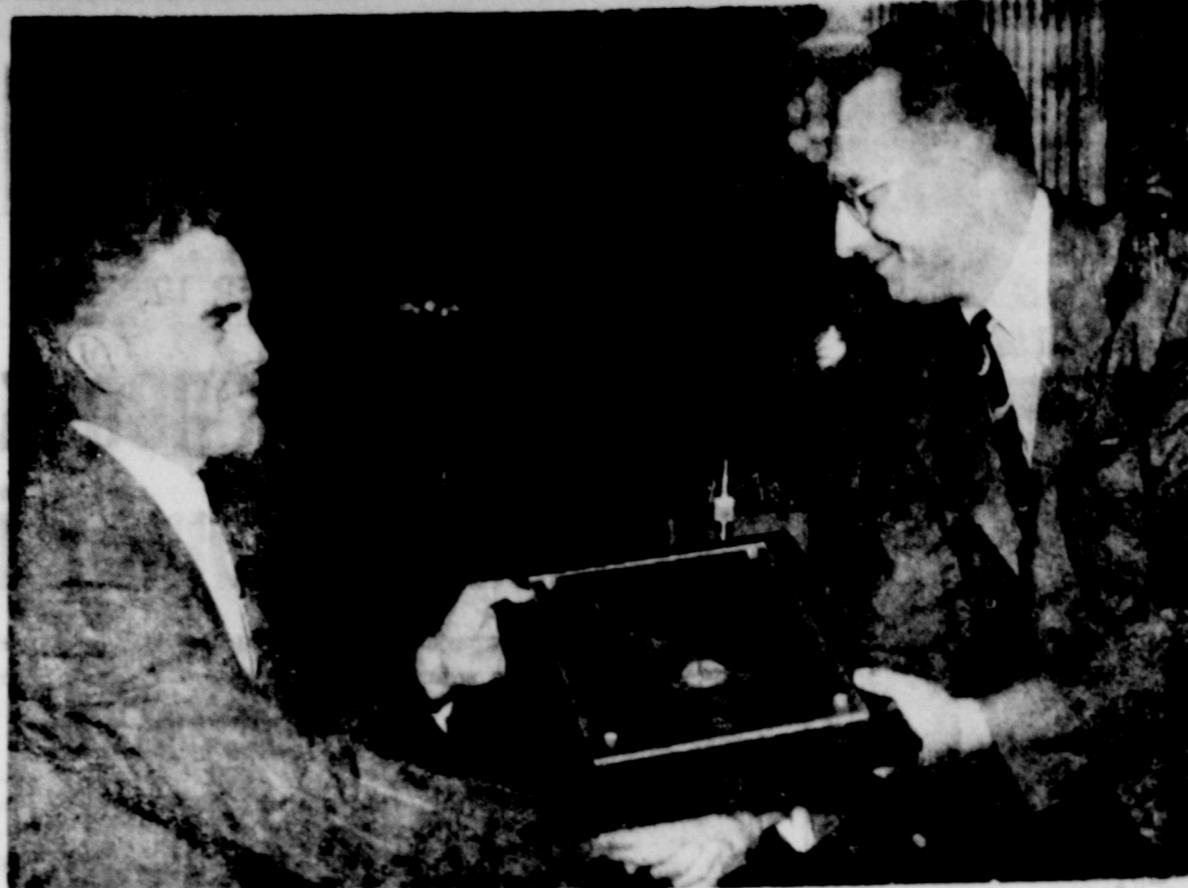
On the statistics made from the vital records much of the planning for the welfare of the people of Texas is done. The number of births credited to the county or city of the residence of the mother can be used in planning hospitals and medical care. The medical certification of the birth record furnishes the Division of Maternal and Child Health with a list of children who may need additional care, because of prematurity, congenital malformations or birth injuries. The birth certificates are used in establishing dependency

benefits for veterans or members of the armed forces. They are also used in providing relationship in settlement of insurance claims and inheritance matters.

The statistics made from causes of death gathered from medical certifications on death records are used in the prevention of disease, for control of epidemics, and immunization programs for children of pre-school and school ages. Leading causes of death statistics furnish data for study and research which will lengthen life expectancy and improve health during the expected time.

Mortality statistics and the expected length of life are considered when determining insurance premium rates.

A rise in the number of deaths from diseases bred of filth can institute immediate action by the Bureau of Sanitary Engineers. Nutritional diseases can indicate a needed improvement in diet, and



school lunch programs can help guard the health of Texas' school children.

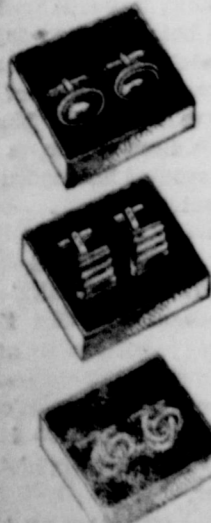
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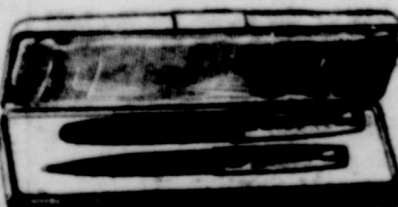

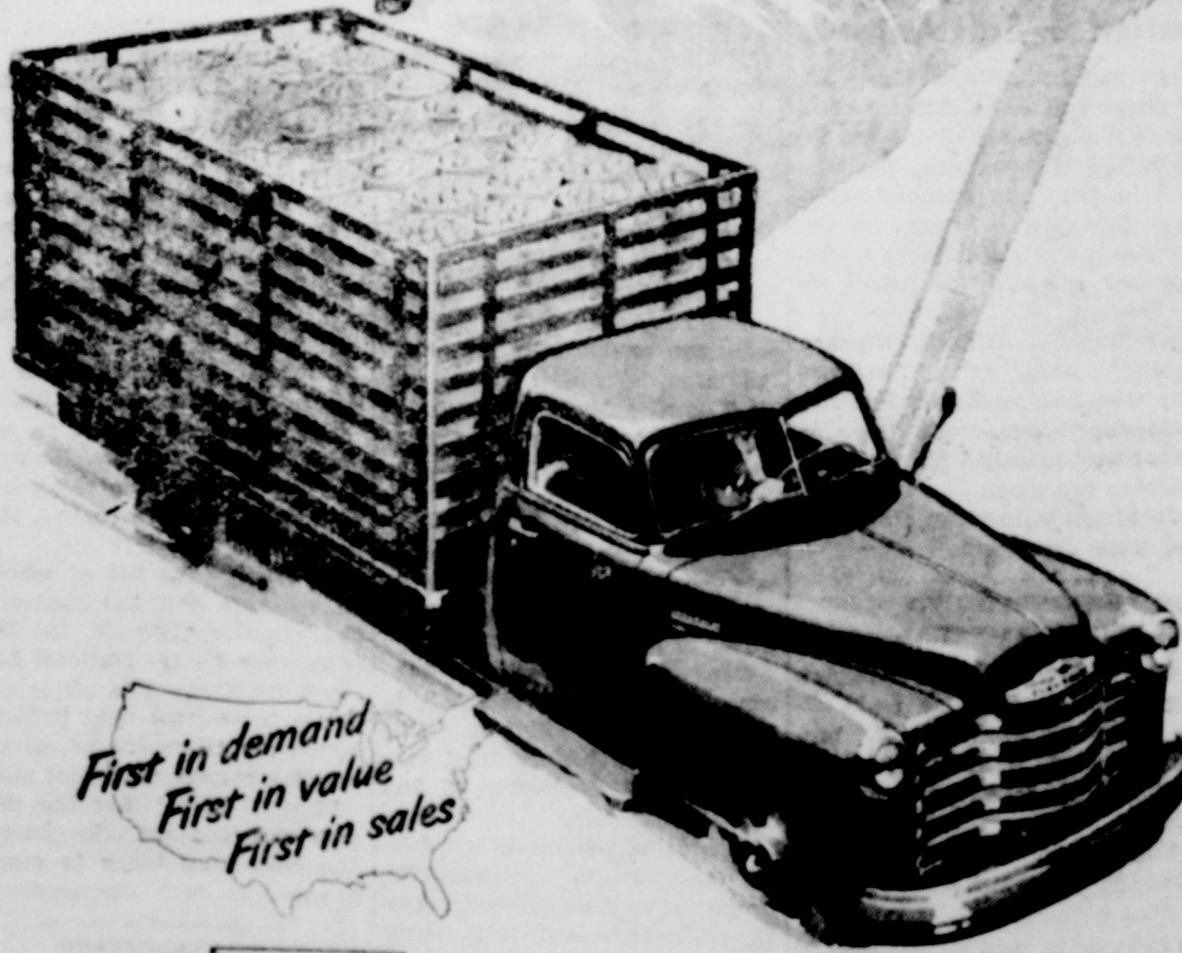

In Education • 1876-1951  
Our first state college—Texas A. and M. is now in its seventy-fifth year



Lawrence Sullivan Ross, one of the most colorful figures in early Texas, did much to establish the A. and M. College of Texas as a ranking educational institution, and put it on the way to the position it holds today. "Little Sul," as he was affectionately known to Texans of the '90s, had made his reputation as an Indian fighter, Texas Ranger, sheriff, soldier and statesman, before he came to the presidency of A. and M. Among his more noted exploits had been the recapture of Cynthia Ann Parker, his rise in the Confederate Army from private to General in four years and his effective term as Governor of the state. In the eight years from his inauguration in 1890 to his death, he enhanced the popularity and the stature of the college tremendously. The Sul Ross statue in the center of the campus is today a college shrine, while the Ross Volunteers, oldest student honor organization in the state, serve as a constant reminder of his place in the story of Texas A. and M.

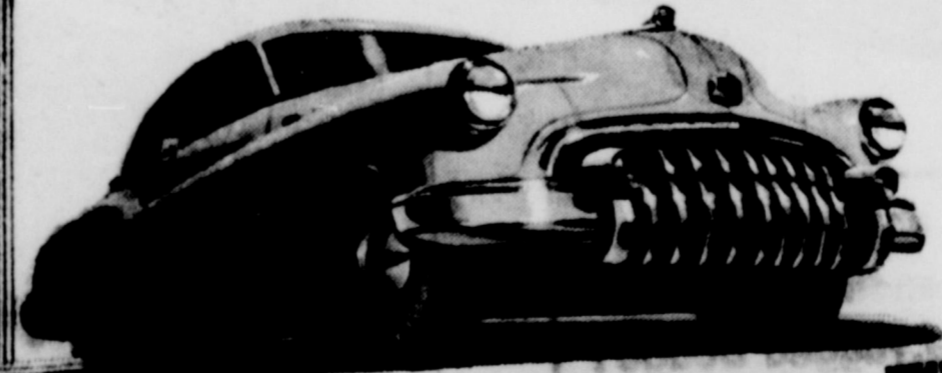

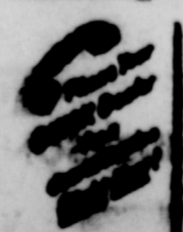

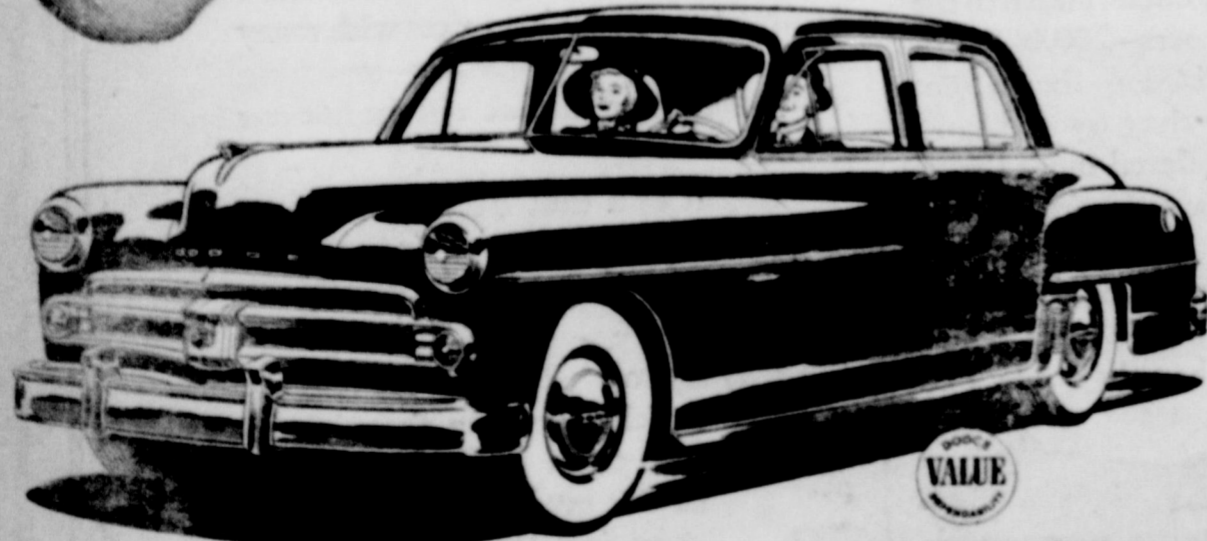

**1950 CHRISTMAS SEAL SALE TO BEGIN MONDAY**

The annual Christmas seal sale sponsored by the State Tuberculosis Association will begin here on Monday, November 20, when seals will be mailed to all of the residents in the county.

The seals were prepared for mailing this week by a committee of volunteer workers.

Children and adults alike know countless stories connected with the Christmas season, some of them handed down through the years. As one might expect, many of the stories have to do with kindness, compassion, or generosity, or a combination of the three.

Take the story of the first seal, for example—a humane idea that took root and has helped save millions of lives through providing the means to fight a dread disease, tuberculosis.

The story begins in Denmark on Christmas Eve, 1903, with a Dan-

ish postal clerk working late at his job of sorting mail. As the clerk glanced at hundreds of cancelled stamps carrying Christmas greetings, it occurred to him that Christmas stamps might do more than just carry good wishes. There could be a special stamp at Christmas time to raise funds to help the needy sick.

The Danish king enthusiastically approved the postal clerk's idea and such a stamp was sold in Denmark in 1904 and the money used to help tuberculous children.

The great Danish-American philanthropist, Jacob Riis, wrote an article in 1907 about the Danish Seal and urged that something similar be done in America to raise funds to fight tuberculosis, then the leading cause of death. His article was read by Emily Bissell, a Delaware welfare worker who recalled it a few months later when she was asked to raise money for the care of some needy tuberculous patients.

Acting on Mr. Riis's suggestion Miss Bissell designed a seal and put on a Christmas Seal sale in

Delaware during the Christmas season of 1907. The people responded and Miss Bissell raised ten times the amount for which she had hoped. The following year, 1908, the Christmas Seal sale was nation-wide and has been ever since.

The Christmas Seal sale is conducted by the 3,000 volunteer associations affiliated with the National Tuberculosis Association. Proceeds of the sale are the sole support of the NTA and its affiliates. These associations are conducting year-round programs of education, case finding, rehabilitation, and medical research directed against tuberculosis, which kills more people in the United States

than all other infectious diseases combined.

Generous support of the 1950 Christmas Seal sale, which opened November 20 and will continue until Christmas, will enable these associations to continue their attack against tuberculosis next year and will bring close the day when tuberculosis will be brought under complete control.

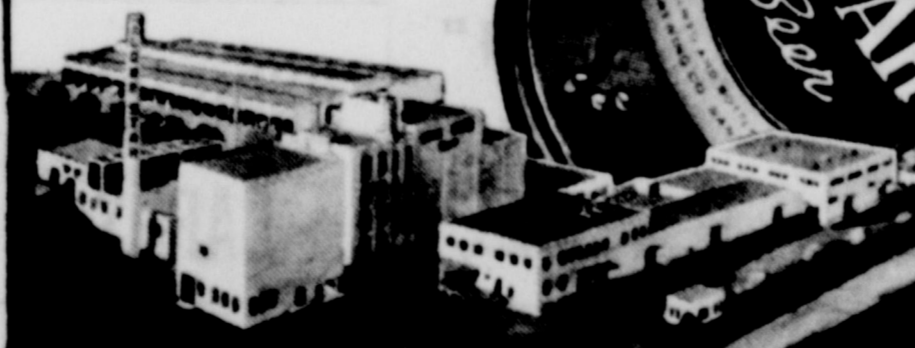
