FFA Lambs Show Good Gain After Month's Feeding

The sixty-three lambs and six bucks being fed as projects by the members of the FFA chapter in the Sanderson High School were weighed Monday by R. M. Turner, local vocational agriculture teacher, to note the weight they had gained during the past month.

The weights based on the expected gain of ten pounds per lamb showed the greatest gain where only a few lambs are being fed. The two lambs being fed by Gary Vasbinder showed the best gain, an average of 14 pounds. Cy Banner's three lambs averaged 9 2-3 pounds; Joe Albert Nessmith's two lambs eleven pounds; Bob Wilkinson's six lambs, eight pounds; Willie Wolfe's three lambs, twelve and two-thirds pounds; Glenn Chandler's six lambs, seven and 1-6 pounds; Tommy Mansfield's three lambs, eight and 2-3 pounds; David Mitchell's six lambs, ten and 1-3 pounds; Charles Stegall's six lambs, twelve pounds; Jim Turner's three lambs, seven and 2-3 pounds.

The lambs being fed on the ranch by Don Kocian, Marion Powers and Odell Carruthers were not weighed Monday. The cooperative project of twenty lambs being fed by the class showed a gain of ten and 1-3 pounds.

Another project in which six boys are particularly interested is the raising of chickens. Two hundred day-old chickens have been bought by the class members to date. The atmosphere of the barnyard is in evidence in the classroom where seventy-five chickens are in brooders made by three boys with the assistance of Mr. Turner. The boys, Pablo Flores, Manuel Maldonado and Joe Vasquez of Dryden did not have facilities at home for their chicks and hence the project was brought to the classroom.

Experience in caponizing will be obtained through the roosters raised and they will be later used for fryers and the pullets will form the basis for an egg-producing flock.

Douglas Attaway and Jimmy Caroline have fifty chicks at home and Nicky Hahn has twenty-five.

New School Bus Delivered Tuesday

KERR HOTEL, OLD LANDMARK, NOW TURNER HOTEL

The name of the Kerr Hotel, an old landmark in Sanderson, was changed this week to the Turner Hotel after the purchase of the building last week by George Turner, local groceryman and locker plant operator. J. W. Downum, the former owner, had operated the hotel for seventeen years, purchasing it from the Joe Kerr estate three years ago.

Built in 1919 by the late Joe Kerr, Sr., at a cost of \$80,000, the Kerr Hotel has long held a unique and prominent place in the history of Sanderson. It replaced a two-story building of frame structure which occupied the same place and served as a hotel for a number of years previously. At the time of the construction of the present hotel, the main street of Sanderson was the street just north of the T&NO depot, and so the hotel was built to face the main street and the incoming tourists on the railroad, the principal means of travel at that time. A park, complete with shrubs and cactus gardens, occupied the lot just south of the hotel until a short time ago.

With the construction of Highway 90 in later years and the spread of businesses along the street east of the hotel and along the highway, the back of the hotel was left facing the highway, a fact often calling for an explanation by local resident to travelers and newcomers to town.

The two-story hotel has thirty-two guest rooms, a coffee shop and banquet room. It also houses a flower shop, doctor's office, barber shop and the postoffice. The hotel also serves as the bus depot and meeting place for the Sanderson Rotary and Lions Clubs.

Mr. and Mrs. Turner assumed active management of the hotel November 15 and have rearranged the lobby furnishings, adding several new pieces of furniture. They plan future improvements to make the hotel an attractive place worthy of its slogan, "Your home away from home."

'Fires For Freedom' To Burn In Texas Towns December 7

"Fires of Freedom" will burn brightly in more than 605 Texas communities on the night of Thursday, December 7, as the climax of the one-day series of programs of "operation Democracy," to keep the fires of freedom burning forever in the hearts and minds of Texans.

In Austin at 7 p. m., Governor Allan Shivers will light the first fire that will be the signal for the simultaneous state-wide ceremonies. Bill Elkins, state Legion commander, has announced. The Austin "Fire of Freedom" will be set off on the Capitol grounds.

"Casting a glow over much of the Texas sky, the simultaneous burning of 600 lights of liberty across the state will shine as a beacon of America's hope to penetrate the darkness behind the iron curtain," the commander said in his announcement.

On the night of December 6, the program will be launched by the thousands of church-goers as Texas pastors, priests and rabbis share the conviction that faith in God and faith in Democracy are irrevocably linked if fires of freedom are to be rekindled throughout the world.

Thursday To Be Thanksgiving Locally

The schools of Terrell County closed Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock with five days for the holidays in observance of Thanksgiving. Classes will resume Monday morning.

Local business houses, with the exception of the cafes, will be closed all day Thursday to observe Thanksgiving Day.

A union Thanksgiving service will be held Thursday morning at ten o'clock in the Methodist Church with Rev. Claude Bridges, pastor of the Sanderson Baptist Church, delivering the message. The special offering at the service will go to the building fund of the Latin-American Methodist Church in Sanderson.

The Sanderson Eagles wound up their football season here last Friday night by being defeated by the Marfa Shorthorns 3-7. This game was also the deciding tilt for the District 9-B winners.

Marfa showed superb ability in their blocking on offensive plays and were very successful with the use of their single and double wing formations. The Shorthorns utilized hard blocking and tackling tactics to whip the Eagles down to a very lagging and slow foe.

Marfa and Sanderson both were on their toes during the entire first quarter which appeared to be a good representation of the balance of the game. Sanderson made 35 yards on the ground during the first period and 1 first down as compared with 33 yards rushing by Marfa and 5 first downs.

The second period produced a score by Marfa by Jiminez, who ran across from the 2 yard line after a drive down the field. The conversion attempt failed.

Following the first Shorthorn score, football fans who attended the game probably witnessed one of the most spectacular plays possible on high school or college gridiron for many years to come. Marfa kicked off from the west end of the field to the northeast corner of the field, deep in Sanderson territory. Juan Olivares received the kickoff and rushed down the north side line behind a group of Eagles setting up a screen in front of the Shorthorn's rushing team. Olivares paused on about the 29-yard line and threw a lateral across the field to Jack Talbot, Eagle half-back, who was standing right on the south sideline. Talbot raced about 82 yards to the touchdown and his jaunt was challenged but untouched by Shorthorn players.

Gene Chandler did honors on the conversion, leaving the score at 7-6 with the Shorthorns trailing.

This play, coming when it did, immediately after the Shorthorn TD, and with Sanderson the underdogs in the game, lifted high the hopes of players and spectators alike.

The Shorthorns soon retaliated with another sustained drive down the field to allow Jiminez to cross into the rich 6-point dirt from approximately 1 foot shy of the goal. Villareal converted the extra point for the Shorthorns and left the score 13-7 at the half time.

In the third period Mendoza carried the ball over for another 6 points for Marfa culminating another steady, powerful drive down the field and Jiminez broke loose for a 45-yard run for the fourth Shorthorn score. Villareal missed the second after-TD point attempt of the third period and was successful on the first.

The weary Eagles were unable to hold the Marfans in the fourth period and allowed another downhill drive to cross the goal line. Mendoza, for Marfa, did the honors and the extra point attempt failed.

Sanderson was outdistanced on yardage gained by 169 to 315. The Shorthorns completed 4 passes for 83 yards and had one pass intercepted and held Sanderson to one completion for 9 yards out of 12 attempts and intercepted two of the Eagles' passes.

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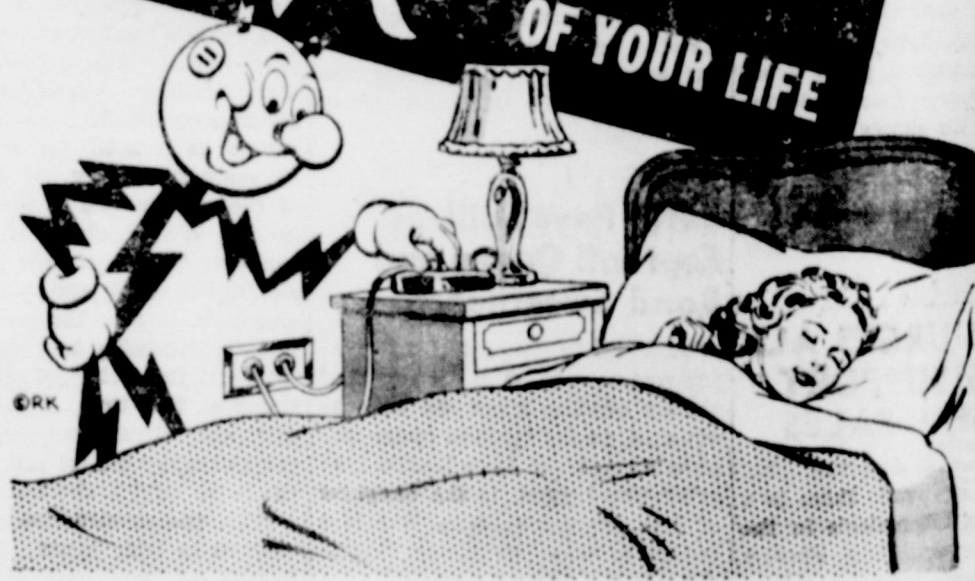

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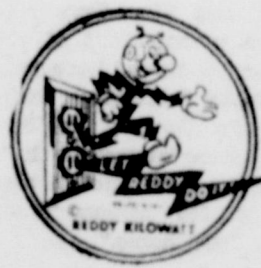


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Football Team and Coaches Honored At Dinner Saturday Night
