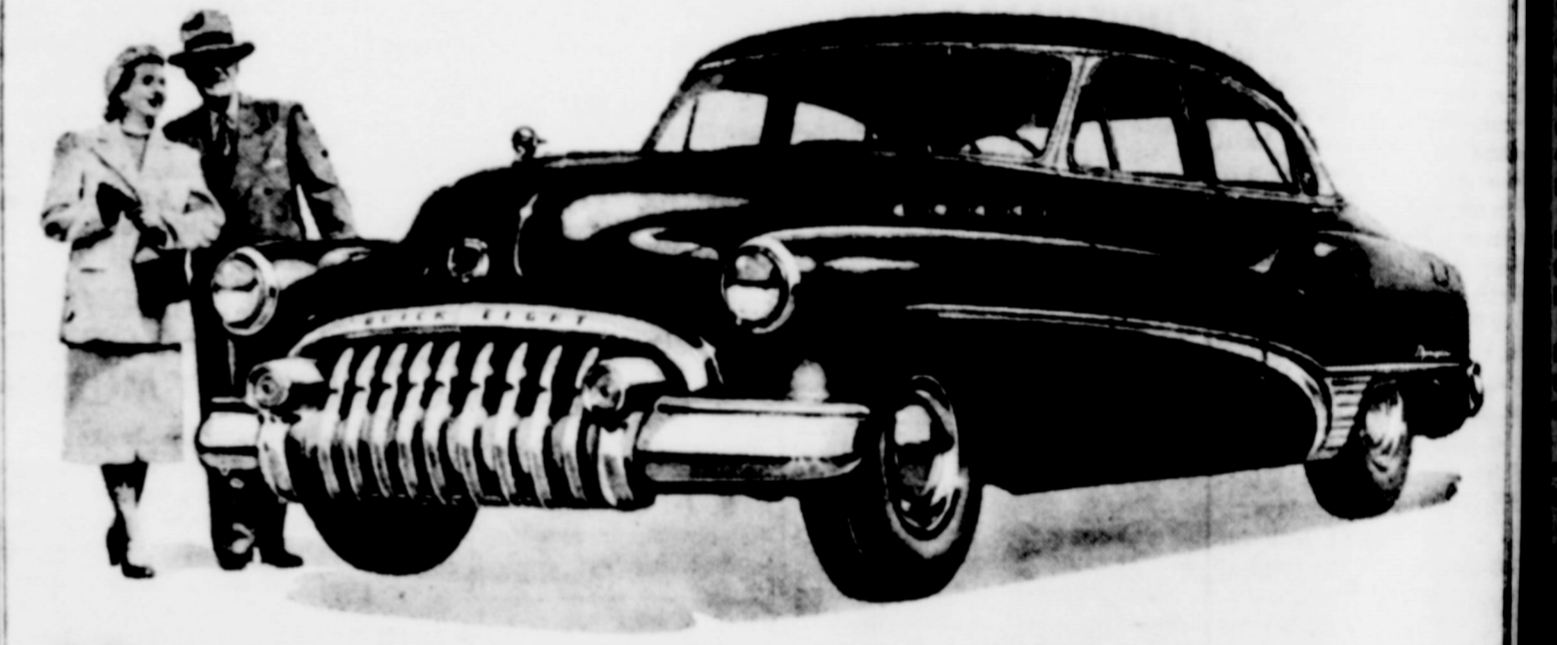

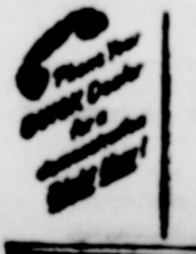

Prizes were awarded to David Stanley and Barbara Cates, winners of the game when the children attempted to pin the tail on the donkey.

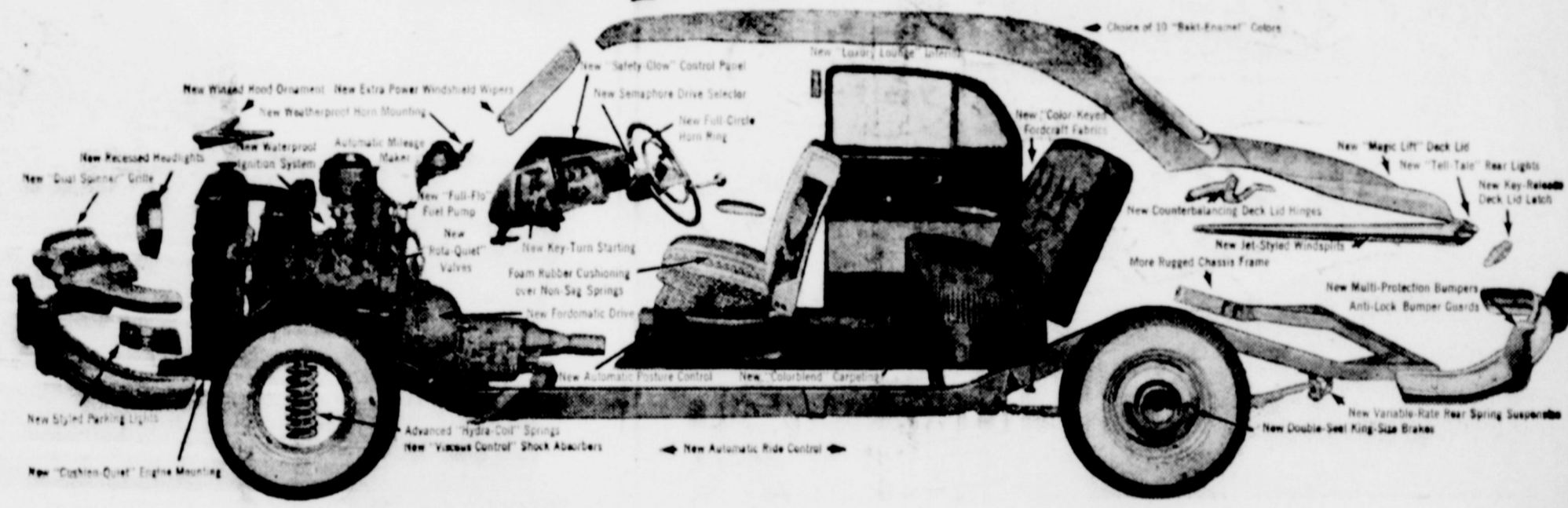
