Estimated Income Should Be Filed By January 15

Frank Schofield, collector of internal revenue for the First Texas District, with headquarters at Austin, today reminded ranchmen in his district of the necessity of filing declarations of estimated tax for the calendar year of 1950.

Collector Schofield advised that the law provides that any person who derives at least two-thirds of his income from farming and makes his return on a calendar year basis may postpone the filing of his declaration of estimated tax for 1950 on Form 1040-ES (1950) until January 15, 1951. However, if a ranchman so desires, he may file his income tax return for the calendar year 1950 on Form 1040 on or before January 31, 1951, with payment in full at that time of the amount of tax due. If a rancher elects to file his final return on Form 1040 by January 31, 1951, he will not be required to file a declaration of estimated tax for 1950 by January 15, 1951.

Collector Schofield requested that ranchers who desire to file a declaration of estimated tax for 1950 secure Form 1040-ES for 1950 and Form 1040F, schedule of farming, from the office of the deputy collector of internal revenue at Austin. If, however, it is the desire of a farmer to file a final return on Form 1040 by January 31, 1951, instead of filing a declaration of estimated tax, he should request Forms 1040 and 1040F. Compliance with these instructions with reference to special filing requirements for ranchers will prevent assessment of penalties for failure to file a declaration of estimated tax.

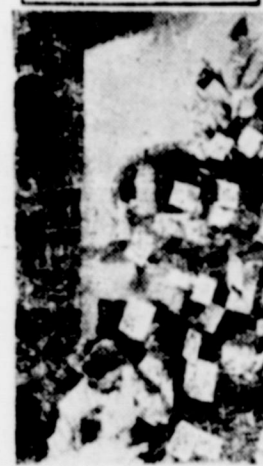

Blood Program of Red Cross Explained

Following congressional hearings on Defense Department appropriations involving the Red Cross Blood Program, misleading impressions were created by stories appearing in the press throughout the nation this week. To clarify the situation, the Defense Department with Red Cross concurrence released the following story:

"The Secretary of Defense, General G. C. Marshall, today announced that a contract had been signed by the Department of Defense and the American National Red Cross by which the Department of Defense, through the Armed Services Medical Procurement Agency, will provide financial assistance for the Red Cross to expand its facilities rapidly for furnishing blood to the armed forces.

"The funds advanced by the Defense Department are to be expended solely for the new plasma stockpiling program and for the collection and handling of whole blood for overseas shipment for the armed forces. None of the funds, it was emphasized, is paying for the blood itself which is contributed by volunteer donors. No part of the funds will be used for the Red Cross civilian blood program.

"The agreement is a major step in the joint efforts of the Department of Defense and the Red Cross to establish a comprehensive program for meeting military needs for whole blood and blood plasma. Following development of a Department of Defense blood program early this year under the director of medical services, Dr. Richard L. Meiling, the Red Cross at the request of the Secretary of Defense accepted responsibility for furnishing blood to meet the need of the armed forces.

"While the Red Cross has the basic organization and experience necessary to handle this new task, the new and greatly expanded program of the armed forces requires additional funds beyond the planned budgetary estimates of the Red Cross.

"The Secretary of Defense pointed out that all costs incident to the collection and shipment of blood for the armed forces since the beginning of hostilities in Korea up to December 1, 1950, have been paid by the American Red Cross."

Growth of Schools Foreseen For 1960

Austin, December 19 — The rapid growth in the school population of Texas is reflected in a study just released by the Texas State Teachers Association. Texas will have at least 1,950,000 children of school age by 1960 if the present migration and birthrate trends continue, according to E. L. Galyean, director of research of the association.

Such an increase will bring about further demands upon the public school system of Texas. Based upon an average daily attendance of 26 pupils per teacher, Texas will need more than 11,000 additional teachers in the next ten year period, Galyean stated.

Based on a prediction for the next five years on the trend of the past few years, Galyean predicts that by 1955 there will be 1,750,000 school age children in Texas, requiring more than 5,000 teachers above the present 54,000. With the increased enrollment due to better enforcement of the compulsory attendance law together with the continuous increase of birthrate during the past few years, it is predicted that the school attendance will require more than \$100,000,000 additional capital outlay to the building program, which is far short of needs at the present time.

"We are trying to show what is to be expected in future attendance and needs," Galyean announced.

"Our whole purpose in this survey is to show how many school children will have to be taken care of by 1960," he added.

The number of teachers needed is based on increased population only, and does not take into consideration the need for replacements because of retirement, death and other reasons.



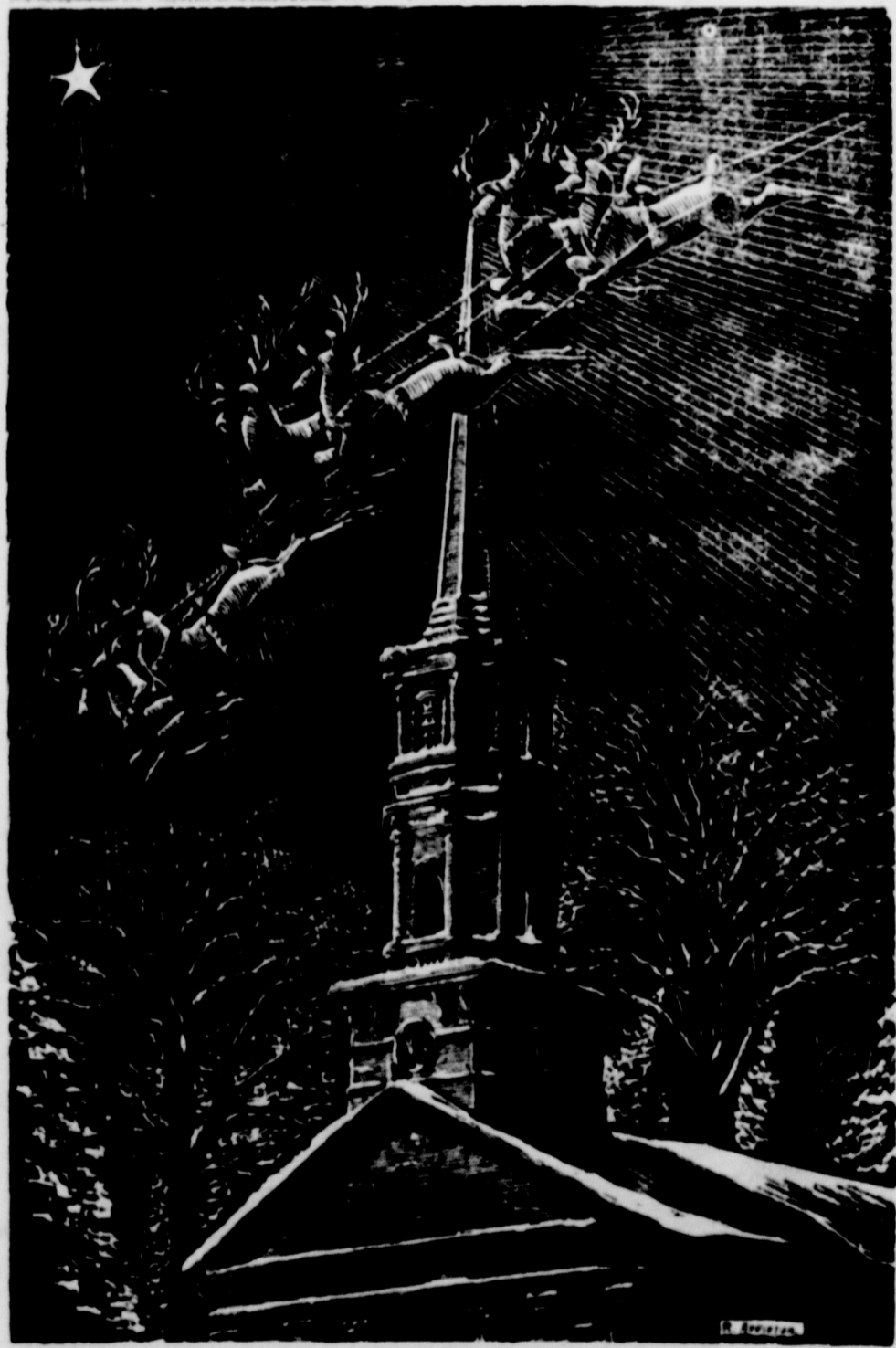

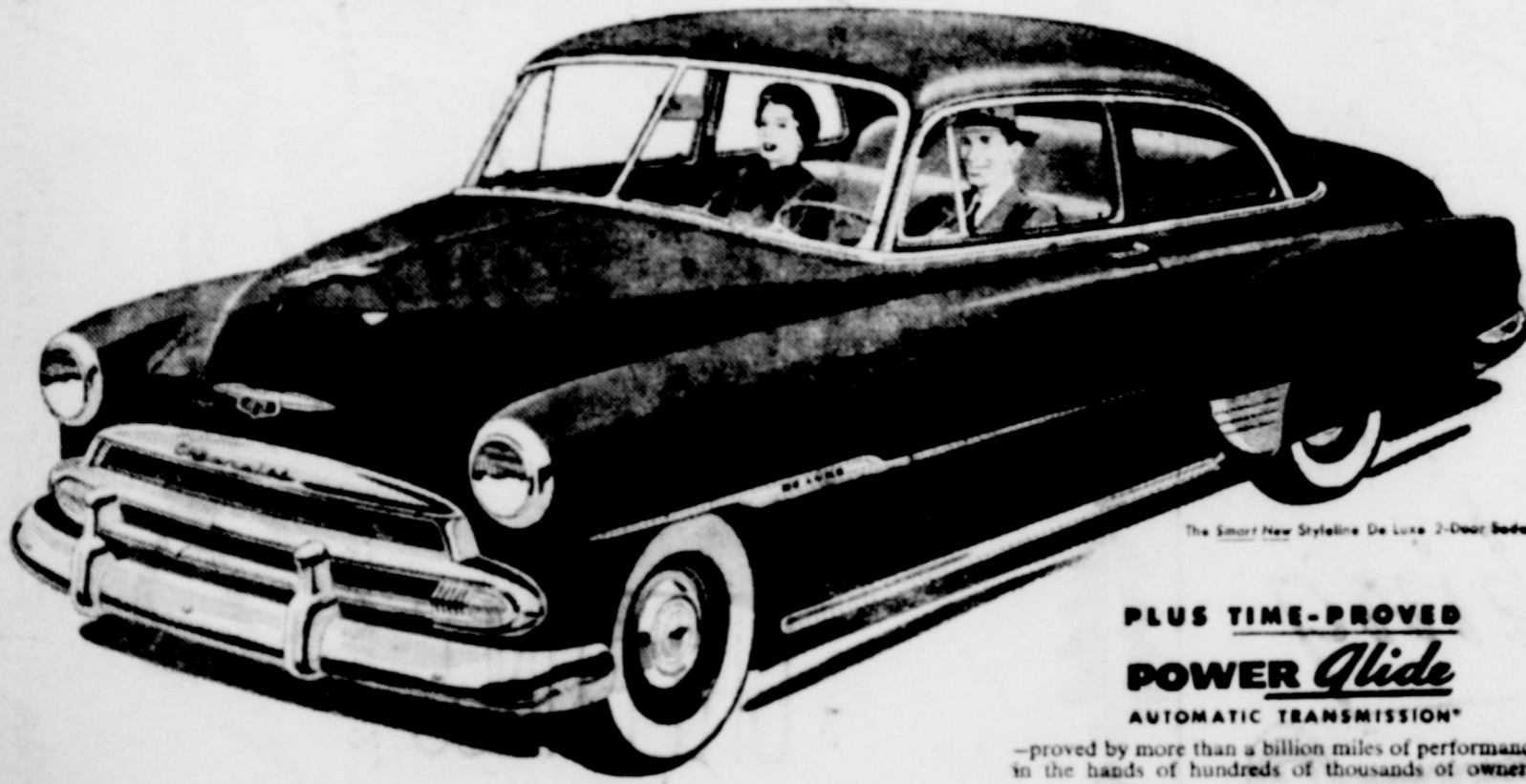
