LARGE PANTHER KILLED SOUTH OF SANDERSON DEC. 30

One of the largest panthers seen in this part of the country was killed by Ranger Forrest G. Hardin on the John Ammons ranch 30 miles south of Sanderson late Sat-

Hardin and Game Warden W. A. Gentry set a trap for the animal after having sighted his tracks and found where he had slaughtered sheep. The cat measured eight feet and nine inches from tip to tip and weighed approximately 200 pounds. according to Hardin. He was caught in a No. 14 trap by the right hind foot.

Hardin is having the animal's hide tanned and made into a rug. Signs of other cats have been seen in that section of the country and much damage is being done by the

The supervisors of a district who are themselves landowners in the district have no power to levy taxes, and no debts incurred in the name of the district shall create a lien on any of the lands in the

district The Soil Conservation Service is a separate and distinct agency and is not to be confused with the PMA which is currently carrying on a program of assistance to the

SCS men in a district are available to assist landowners and leasing ranchmen in planning their invidual program of range conservation, furnishing technical assistance when called upon, mapping soil and grass conditions on the ranches, and recommending various conservation measures to be

As a political subdivision of the state, the Soil Conservation District is enabled to call upon various agencies of the state and federal governments for assistance in the conservation pla.n An individual ranchman or farmer is not able to do this unless he is a cooperator in a district.




