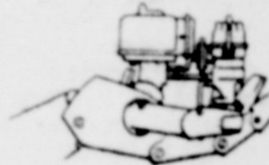

STATE SOIL CONSERVATION BOARD OF TEXAS

Notice of hearing upon organization of proposed Rio Grande-Pecos River (237) Soil Conservation District, embracing land lying in Terrell, Brewster and Pecos Counties, Texas.

WHEREAS, on the 27 day of November, 1950, there was duly filed in the office of the State Soil Conservation Board, at Temple, Texas, a petition signed by fifty or a majority of land owners pursuant to the provisions of the State Soil Conservation Law, as enacted by the 47th Legislature, known as House Bill No. 444, requesting the establishment of Rio Grande-Pecos River (237) Soil Conservation District; and

WHEREAS, the lands described by said petition, and other lands which will be considered for inclusion in said district, are located in Terrell, Brewster and Pecos Counties, described substantially as follows: The point of beginning is the intersection of the Pecos River and the southeast corner of the Trans-Pecos Soil Conservation District; thence generally south along the Pecos River to the intersection with the northwest corner of the Devil's River Soil Conservation District; thence south along the west boundary of the Devil's River Soil Conservation District, to the intersection with the Rio Grande River; thence generally west along the Rio Grande River to the intersection with the southeast corner of the Big Bend Soil Conservation District; thence generally north and west along the east boundary of the Big Bend Soil Conservation District to the intersection with the southwest corner of the Trans-Pecos Soil Conservation District; thence generally north and east along

the south boundary of the Trans-Pecos Soil Conservation District to the intersection with the Pecos River, the point of beginning.

Now, therefore, notice is hereby given, that a public hearing will be held pursuant to the said petition, on the question of the desirability and necessity of the creation of such district; on the question of boundaries to be assigned to such district; upon the propriety of the petition, and of proceedings taken under the said Act. The said public hearing will be held by the State Soil Conservation Board on the 10 day of January, 1951, beginning at 10:00 o'clock a. m., at Court House, Sanderson, Texas, in the county of Terrell.

All interested parties are invited to attend and will be given opportunity to be heard at the time and place hereinbefore specified.

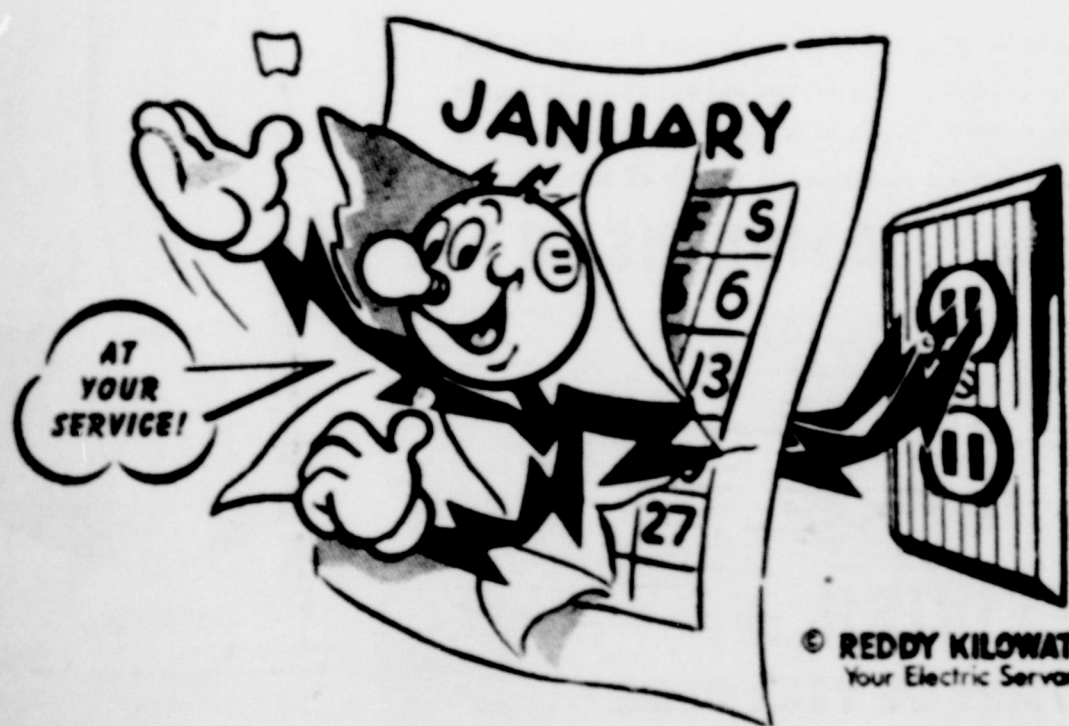
