## LISTEN TO LUKE

An awakened public opinion among men and women in all walks of life, gives new hope for the restoration of our economic freedom.

In Texas various groups who have been on the rectifying end of some of the government's handouts have gone on record as favoring the curtailment of all subsidies in an effort to halt the inevitable inflation that has been snowing just around the corner.

Last week the New York State Farm Bureau Federation wisely and courageously called for an end of federal handouts to farmers men of such things as lime, fertilizer, etc. These aid programs were set into effect when farming was in a severe depression. Now, however, the farmers and ranchmen feel that their enterprises can and should stand on its own feet. They believe that all groups should put country ahead of self-interest, and they are prepared to back up this sentiment by example.

Moreover, the farmers and ranchers, by and large, are firmly opposed to the controls which are the inevitable price of subsidies.

The State Conference Board of Farm Organizations representing the major state-wide organizations, has time and again expressed its firm stand against socialistic schemes and for free institutions, including free markets, free enterprise, and those basic individual freedoms which have made American farms and American life the best and most fruitful on earth. As we interpret this united voice stands for the very fundamentals that our forefathers stood for and fought for when they built this nation. It is, in one word, the voice of freedom. It is the voice of patriotism.

Only 15 per cent of our people are in pressure groups receiving direct payments from the treasury or placed on islands of special privilege have any chance of profiting from inflation, and only those will suffer serious loss if inflation occurs. But 85 per cent of every 100 citizens entered to vote stand to lose heavily their dollar, worth, 100c in 1941, 50c now, shrinks during the year ahead to a 25c value. Every government department, bureau, commission, and board is larded with unnecessary executives, clerks, stenographers, messengers and assorted political drones and pensioners.

As for that part of the budget that is done by the military — the waste passes all bounds in this present defense effort. The bung has really been added afresh. We are all for a swift rearming, but there is no reason why generals and admirals should not give some measure of value received. There is no reason for wasteful spending save to down the spending.

## Sanderson Splits Junior - Senior Dual Track Meet Tuesday

The Sanderson Eagles track team split a dual meet in Fort Stockton Tuesday afternoon, winning the junior division and losing the senior division.

In the senior division Jack Lambert placed second and Kosena, Silvas placed third in the 100-yard dash. In the 440-yard dash Juan Olivares placed second with a time of 58.9. Willie Wolfe ran the 880-yard run in 2:15.6 for a first place. In the broad jump Talbot placed first with 17' 6 1/2". Gary Vashbinder was third with 15' 8 1/2". Gene Chandler placed first in the pole vault event with 8' and David Mitchell was third in the high jump with 4'10". David Flores ran the low hurdles in 26.7 to place second. Willie Wolfe hurled the discus 88' 1 1/2" for third place in the discus throw. Sanderson won both the 440 relay and the mile relay events. Running the 440 relay were Olivares, Silvas, Chandler and Talbot with a time of 52.4. In the mile relay were Olivares, Flores, Mitchell and Wolfe with a time of 4:4.8.

Fort Stockton stacked up 53 points to 45 for Sanderson.

In the junior division Calzada won the 50-yard dash with a time of 5.8. Martinez placed third. Calzada also won the 100-yard dash with a time of 10.5, with Martinez second and Flores third. In the 440-yard relay Sanderson took first place with the team composed of Flores, Martinez, George Flores and Calzada. Their time was 51. George Flores won third in the shot put event with a distance of 28'5". Calzada was first in broad jump with 16'11". Sanderson garnered 29 points to 26 for Fort Stockton.

## RED CROSS MAKES APPEAL TO CITIZENS FOR CONTRIBUTIONS

R. V. Spears, chairman for the fund raising drive for the American Red Cross in Terrell County, appealed to all county citizens this week to send in their contributions to the drive as soon as possible. He stated that the drive ended March 31, but the committee would continue to receive and report all contributions made after that time.

Of the letters mailed out last week only thirty-three contributions have been received totaling \$157.00. Mr. Spears added that the quota for the county this year is \$1,107.00. The national goal is set at \$85,990,000.

This figure, established by the board of governors after consultation with representative chapter leaders, was based on three assumptions: 1. That the size of the armed forces would average 2,500,000 men during the fiscal year of 1951-52. 2. That active fighting in Korea would be over by June 30, 1951. 3. That there would not be the greatly expanded services to the armed forces overseas that have since been necessary.

Since November the national and world crisis has deepened. Plans for minimum defense needs have been repeatedly revised upward.

Each increase in the size of the armed forces is directly reflected in increased Red Cross expenditures.

It was brought out that the goal as set by the national organization did not take into consideration the possible expansion of the armed forces to the proposed 4-million now under consideration or even to the presently authorized 3,500,000 men.

The local committee emphasized the local need for their one-half of the money raised by stating that funds in the local treasury were lower now than for several years, with the increasing need of financial assistance that must be given to service men during an emergency.

"We need your contribution today," Mrs. Jettie Peavy, secretary-treasurer of the local chapter announced. "By receiving the request for contributions with the full understanding of the needs and of the aims of the American Red Cross, the drive can meet its local quota and Terrell County can do its part in supporting this worthwhile organization."
