LISTEN TO LUKE

Excitement over the possibility of the terminal move from Sanderson has just about taken the attention of Terrell County citizens away from the political issues. Sanderson and Terrell County have been built up around a home terminal of the T&NO. The local payroll and taxes of the company have played an integral part in the development of this community. Now it is a well-founded rumor that a move is being contemplated which will abandon Sanderson and Valentine as terminal points. If this move were made, Sanderson and Valentine will be losers. Alpine would stand to gain twenty or twenty-five families. The railroads have agreed to help fight and keep the home terminal here. They are willing to work along with other citizens to halt the move. All kinds of elements will enter into the fight before it is closed. Legal assistance is being sought by the committee named to carry on the fight. Nothing can be done while we are in this fight. Community unity is evident on every corner.

A couple of years ago or more ago was threatening law suits against the company and all but threatened every hog-head on the street for blowing their whistles when they entered or left the city limits. Now they are jubilant over the prospects of the move. Well, Sanderson has always welcomed the whistle and the citizenship of this town has always been glad to welcome employees who came to make their home and raise their children.

This column cannot predict the outcome of the move started by the railroad but we can assure you that we will all be in there whistling to the last whistle to keep things as they are.

Along with some bad news this week this column has a very bright side. The rains that have fallen in almost every part of the county have been something to be about. We have never seen a drier year than the one that has just passed. The rains that have brought them around where they will have a smile on their face, buy or drink a cup of coffee and tell a yarn without cursing the drought.

Room for rent" signs may be seen at any time now and the Nance boarding house will be advertising. Sheriff Nance had a fishing business for some time. The available space on the top of the courthouse leads us to believe there is room to spare.

Recent of the "boarders" were ladies(?) who were clad in play suits (so I am told). One of the town "sweaters" which it would be charitable for them to go up the stairs and play cards or something with the boarders but the sheriff never would open the doors.

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson presented this week with a motion signed by 60 qualified voters of Terrell County Common School District No. 1, asking that election be called to determine whether a majority of the taxpayers of the school district favor an increase of the school tax rate not to exceed \$1.75 on the valuation of taxable property in the district. The total tax of the district is now \$1.50 on \$100 valuation. Since the present rate does not exceed \$1.75 per \$100 valuation, the tax rate would be increased and could be lowered by Commissioners' Court without election in future years if the majority arise when the total tax rate would not be needed for successful operation of the school district. Bill 371, which has just been signed by the Governor, has made it possible for the people in school district to vote on the issue of the rate since the minimum tax rate that could have been voted in the district under the law was \$1.50.

The only possible way that more money could be raised for the schools of the county with the \$1.50 now in force is by the raising of the county valuations by the

TERMINAL MOVE PROPOSED

Good Rains Over County Continue; Some Hail Damage

The period of unsettled weather that has prevailed over the county for the past two weeks continues and with it, rain and showers continue to come to various sections of the county relieving a drought situation that was causing much concern to the ranchers.

Wednesday evening 1.05 inches of rain fell in Sanderson and general rains were reported all the way to Fort Stockton and to the southwest and east, including the Dryden county.

Some hail damage was reported from the ranchers of the area last week. Bill Holland reported losing several lambs. Hail damage to the roof of the Herbert Brown ranch house and the resulting water damage to the house furnishings has not been estimated. Tommy Stewart reported much hail and wind damage to his house.

There were reports of heavy rains and hail damage at Marfa and Alpine Wednesday evening. There was considerable hail damage at the Baptist Paisano Encampment buildings particularly to the new tabernacle, completed last year.

MASS CHEST X-RAY SURVEY JUNE 28-29

Plans are going forward for the mass chest x-ray to be held here June 28 and 29, according to Mrs. James Word, general chairman of the survey, which is being conducted by special arrangement by the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association with the State Department of Public Health in Austin.

An effort will be made to have every person in the county fifteen years of age and over to have an x-ray picture made. Even persons who are apparently in good health may be victims of tuberculosis and those who have lived to a ripe old age may also have tuberculosis. The fact that a person had an x-ray a year ago and had a negative test does not make it any less necessary and important that he have an x-ray again this year.

The excuse "I do not have time" is not acceptable for the failure to have an x-ray picture made as it requires only a few seconds, minutes at the most, and the person does not have to take off any of his clothing to have the picture made.

The x-rays are made free of charge and the results are sent to the doctor named by the individual at the time of the x-ray if the result is positive.

CLUB PREXY TO CONVENTION OF ROTARY IN NEW JERSEY

Herbert A. Smith, president of the Sanderson Rotary Club, and Mrs. Smith, left Wednesday afternoon to attend the Rotary International Convention in Atlantic City. The Smiths will go directly from San Antonio on a special train for the convention city.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith plan to be gone for about ten days.

At a meeting of approximately 425 Sanderson, Terrell County, Valentine and Del Rio citizens in the high school auditorium Tuesday night, the group voted unanimously to oppose the proposed movement of the T&NO terminal from Sanderson. The opposition was turned over to a committee of Terrell County men who would use all of the resources at hand, both physical and financial, to voice their actions to the railroad company and to the chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

SCHOOL TAX RAISE OKED BY SHIVERS; COUNTY TO VOTE

Word was received Monday that Governor Allan Shivers had signed Senate Bill 371, authored by Hill Hudson of Pecos, authorizing the smaller counties of Texas to levy a \$1.75 school tax instead of \$1.50 with the consent of the voters.

A petition was circulated Tuesday for the signatures of qualified voters asking the commissioners to call an election on the issue. If granted by the voters the schools of the county will receive 25c more per \$100 valuation for the maintenance of the local schools.

School officials have expressed a desire for the proposal to be voted on early in June so that the law will become effective in time for additional monies to be available for school maintenance next year.

Other taxes will not be affected by the raise in taxes for the schools if the proposal gets a majority vote.

Carolyn Courtney To Graduate From Baptist Nursing School

Miss Carolyn Courtney, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. P. Courtney, of Sanderson, will graduate from the Baptist Memorial Hospital School of Nursing on May 25.

Several social events are scheduled honoring the graduate nurses. Mr. and Mrs. Courtney and son, Toby, left Thursday for San Antonio to attend the graduation exercises. Mrs. Courtney's mother, Mrs. P. V. Casanova, of New Orleans, will join them there.

The meeting was brought about after several local railroad employees, who are representatives of the various brotherhoods of railroad employees, had received letters from legal representatives and liaison representatives of the brotherhoods notifying the local organizations of the proposed movement of the terminal facilities and asking for the opinions and reactions of the brotherhood members concerning the proposal.

Telephone conversation with T. E. Spence, an official of the T&NO Railroad, confirmed the proposed movement by the company.

Following the meeting Tuesday night, the committee sent telegrams to Railroad Commissioner Olin Culberson and to Mr. Spence, notifying them of the plans of opposition and requested that Mr. Culberson notify O. T. Sudduth, chairman of the committee, of any and all plans of the railroad company as regards request for a hearing before the commission. It was brought out that it would be necessary for the railroad company to request a hearing before the commission and be granted permission before the move could be made.

Further plans and activities of the committee will be made public as soon as they are available.

It was brought out at the meeting that such a move, if developed, would mean the abolishment of approximately a like number of jobs as are now in action by the company in Sanderson. It was also learned that the movement would make Alpine the turn-around terminal for crews working out of Del Rio and El Paso, and that very few of the local families, if any, would be transferred to Alpine.

Testimony from the superintendent of the Valentine schools revealed that approximately 80 per cent of the students of that unit were children of railroad employees working out of that terminal and that his records showed that there would be probably three students remaining in a 2-year-old \$70,000 high school unit in that town.

The representatives from Del Rio were here to express their concern in opposition to the proposal and to offer any aid they may be able to give in the fight now under way.

Officials of the Brotherhoods represented in the Sanderson terminal reported that their organizations had gone on record as being opposed to the move and sent telegrams to Mr. Culberson and to the railroad officials to substantiate their actions.

The committee representing the citizens of the county in the fight is headed by O. T. Sudduth, and includes Joe Kerr, Jr., James Caroline, Herbert A. Smith, H. C. Rock, carman, W. H. Savage, conductor, F. H. Talbot, fireman, G. H. Mayfield, engineer, and Sam Underwood, telegrapher.

Joe T. Steadham of Austin, representing all of the transportation brotherhoods, urged the immediate action at the meeting Tuesday night and informed those present of the attitude of the employees over the state.

Commissioners' Court. In doing so everyone would have to pay more county and state taxes along with the tax increase in school tax. But if the additional rate of \$25 on the \$100 valuation is voted and the present valuations remain the same, then only the school tax will be increased and the amount of money paid for county and state taxes will be the same.

The election will be ordered to be held early in June.

If the election carries, part of the additional revenue to be derived will be used to supplement the state salary schedule of the local teachers for the coming year so that the teachers' salaries can be kept in line with the increased costs of living. Many school districts in the state have already been given cost-of-living increases in salaries, and others are planning to do so for next year. It will be very difficult for the local district to keep and employ excellent teachers if salaries here are not kept in line with salaries paid in other districts.

Because of the continuing increase in the costs of operating a school plant, the district has been operating with a deficit for the past two years. Therefore, part of the additional tax money will be used to take care of the deficit.
