COMES the day when you're particularly busy, toss this recipe together to make a Skillet Dinner. Saves dishwashing, time and energy. Melt 2 tbsps. fat in skillet, add 1 cup chopped onion, 1/2 lb. ground beef. Cook until brown, about 10 mins. Add 1 cup sliced carrots, 4 ozs. med. noodles, 1 qt. water. Cover, simmer over low flame 45 mins. Add 2 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce, 1 tbsps. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper. Mix lightly. Serves 4.

Timely check: The filter on your gas furnace is bound to clog with dust from the air. About twice a year remove the filter and replace it because a clogged filter cuts heating efficiency.

A clove of garlic in olive oil, mix in 1/2 tsp. paprika, let set for five minutes. Then brush over thick steak. Slide into broiler 3" from flame. Out of this world for flavor and crusty finish!

If it's washday in your home and you need plenty of hot water, don't worry about the 15 gals. of hot water your man uses up for his morning shower because your automatic gas water heater immediately starts to replace hot water as it is used.

Gentle reminder: Tepid soapy water and a cloth wipe up spilled food in your gas refrigerator more easily than if you wait for the food to harden.

Butterscotch toast: Spread toast with butter or margarine, sprinkle with brown sugar. Keep under broiler about 4" from the flame until it bubbles.

### Doors

that say, "Step Right In"

Your front door makes the first and last impressions on visitors to your home. Make sure that it says what you want it to say.

Inside and out, the right doors add convenience and comfort to your home

Properly chosen doors give your house personality, increased utility and comfort. Doors are made in so many designs that you can find your precise preference among many stock patterns.

Choose doors which harmonize with the style of your house, then be sure you have doors of the right width, hinged to swing in the proper direction. Below are listed some of the doors from which you can choose.

- PANEL DOORS**  
Most familiar door is the hinged door with raised or recessed panels. Raised panel type is usually used for exterior doors.
- SLAB DOORS**  
The slab or flush door is a modern development. It consists of a frame or core surfaced with plywood to give an unbroken surface.
- DUTCH DOORS**  
Dutch doors are built in two sections so that you can open the top while the bottom stays closed. Tops can be paneled or glazed.
- FRENCH DOORS**  
Are doors in pairs to close openings 5' or more wide. Best used to open onto a porch or terrace, to tie the outdoors with the indoors.
- LOUVERED DOORS**  
Are slatted like window shutters and provide excellent cross ventilation. Usually made to order, they are fairly expensive.
- SLIDING DOORS**  
Are hung on overhead tracks to slide over each other or into a recess in wall. Fine for closets and to save wall space. Use the best hardware.

**SOME NEW IDEAS FOR SCREEN DOORS**

Here are 3 suggestions for dressing up your screen doors to make them more attractive. Starting from this you can think of others.

- NEW LOOK**  
Crisp cross wire inside and outside through screw-eyes set on each side of door.
- PRIVACY**  
Set vertical fins or louvers in frame and attach to screen for light, air, and privacy.
- BAMBOO**  
Decorate your screen with bands of bamboo blinds cut in strips and placed against screen.
- ACCORDION DOORS**  
Modern closing for large openings between rooms. Usually made of fabric or imitation leather hung on ceiling tracks.
- SWINGING DOORS**  
Swing both ways, usually between kitchen and dining room. Small window or opening is important to avoid opening hazard.

Sally Says:  
I checked up on the lighting in my house and found that we were not using enough. A 100- to 150-watt bulb should be used for reading. 300-watts are proper for lamps. 100-watts for wall brackets. Clean fixtures and bulbs often. Get rid of lampshades that scatter light or fail to eliminate glare. Remove her bare or glaring bulbs are dangerous to eyes. Shade them.

Johnny Says:  
When you want to adjust the blades of your lawnmower, rub coarse chalk or crayon along one blade. Then when you spin the blades it's easy to see if it is touching another bar at all points.

When you want to decide what nails to use, a good rule to follow is that nails should be about 1 time as long as the board being nailed is thick.

When you clinch nails, bend them with the grain for smoothness, against the grain if you want maximum strength.

If you want to reduce the danger of splitting, BLUNT the nail. Don't sharpen it.

Both nails and screws will go more easily if you rub them with beeswax or paraffin.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide care for persons of some residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years, needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes; providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) limitation upon expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditures from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws, to provide assistance to and provide care for persons of some residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds for such assistance; provided that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the amount of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an appropriation hereinto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendments to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditures from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 43, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of the State, providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III, providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 43, which shall read as follows: "Section 43. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of the State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize, provided that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said choices on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments therein.

In Texas today there are such agents working in 252 of our 254 counties. That first demonstration of methods to combat the boll weevil, which was threatening to wipe out Texas cotton, was successful. (The merchants of Terrell had put up a \$1,000 bond to protect the landowner in case it failed.) The federal government took over the work in 1904 and started the expansion which has developed into one of the most successful adult education programs in the world.
