Vehicle Inspection Period Extended To September 7

Austin, Jan. 15 — Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the period for securing initial motor vehicle inspections in Texas had been officially extended until midnight, September 6, 1952. As originally specified, all vehicles would have been required to pass inspection before they could be registered on April 1st.

Garrison made the statement following an opinion issued by the office of Attorney General Price Daniel which ruled that the Safety Department might legally extend the inspection date, and that no inspection certificate would be necessary for 1952 registration.

Director Garrison had pointed out in his request for a ruling by the Attorney General that it would be impossible to complete an inspection of the nearly 3 1/2 million vehicles in the state by April 1.

Effect of the new action will mean, according to Garrison, that all motor vehicles in Texas must be inspected and bear an approved sticker prior to next September 7th. Following that, a second inspection will be required after September 7 but prior to April 1, 1953, before vehicles can be registered for 1953.

George W. Busby, chief of the department's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, stated that he had, today, issued the 1000th license to official inspection stations and another 1,500 are currently in the process of being approved.

Two Hurt in Train Accident East of Here

Two men were injured Wednesday of last week when a Southern Pacific train parted, then rammed together east of Sanderson.

Public School Week Set March 2 - 8

Thousands of Texas adults will go back to school during the week of March 2 - 8 in observance of the Second Annual Public Schools Week, which has as its theme "Democracy in Action."

Governor Allan Shivers this week proclaimed March 2 - 8 as Public Schools Week in Texas. In his proclamation the Governor said:

"One of the basic institutions upon which we rely for the furtherance of our American ideals is the public school system. Public schools, by enabling every child to gain a liberal education regardless of station in life, promote recognition of the responsibilities of citizenship and constitute a major bulwark against subversive doctrines."

"We in Texas are proud of the school system that has been developed in our state. Its success has been due to many factors — the interest of mothers and fathers in their children, the cooperative efforts of state and local officials, and the energy and determination of those public spirited men and women who are devoting their lives to the teaching of our children."

"The continued progress of our school system required increased public understanding and the importance of education and the greatest possible encouragement and support of our teachers."

Governor Shivers' proclamation follows a resolution adopted last summer by the Texas State Board of Education designating the week of March 2 - 8 as Public Schools Week. The resolution urged that every citizen visit a public school during the period to become personally acquainted with the programs and accomplishments of the state's system of public schools.

The Texas Education Agency has requested local public school officials throughout the state to invite the citizens of their respective communities to visit classrooms and to plan programs with the purpose of giving the pupils and the citizens a better understanding of the school program.

Public Schools Week was observed officially for the first time in Texas last March. In hundreds of communities thousands of citizens visited their public schools in groups. Many visitors had not been inside schools in years.

Statistics compiled by the Texas Citizens Committee on Public Schools Week program revealed a great awakening on the part of the public to the problems of their local public schools.

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'Highway Safety' Goal of Texas Newspaper Men

The saving of 10,000 lives and the prevention of at least 150,000 injuries this year is the goal of more than 8,000 newspapers all over the United States, including the members of the Texas Press Association, who have joined in a coast-to-coast campaign to halt the mounting horror of motor vehicle accidents on America's streets and highways.

Confronted by a staggering total of more than 1,000,000,000 traffic deaths, with 35,000,000 other men, women and children injured, many of them crippled for life, in a mere 52 years of reckless motoring, the press of the nation has adopted a common program to attack this

annual national calamity on three fronts:

1. Intensive education of drivers.
 2. Intensive education of pedestrians.
 3. Intensive insistence upon strict enforcement of traffic laws.
- Assisting this and the other newspapers in presenting the facts about traffic accidents, and how they can be prevented, will be the famed accident prevention department of the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, which first introduced safe driver education to the high schools, wrote and published the first textbook on that subject, and maintains staffs of safety specialists in New York, Chicago and San Francisco to study constantly the trends and needs of traffic conditions on a countrywide basis.

"Reducing traffic fatalities by 10,000 and personal injuries by 250,000 this year is a real possibility," said Thomas N. Boate, ac-

ting manager of that nationally recognized safety organization. "It will take the full and continued cooperation of the press, of state and municipal officials, of safety organizations, and of the people. We can count on the first three. The public, which has most at stake, is the unknown quantity. If they read and heed, this campaign will be a success; if they don't it will fail.

"That should be a terrifying prospect to every man, woman and child in the country when you remember that, if the toll keeps up at its present rate of increase, it will not be long before every person in the country must steel himself or herself to the fact that sooner or later they will be hit by an automobile — hit hard enough to be either injured or killed. It has been 10 years since we had less than 1,000,000 persons injured in traffic accidents in any one year. It only took us 52 years to pile up the horrible toll of 1,000,000 traffic dead, but the second million may well be reached in half that time, at the rate we are going.

"As a starting point toward the goal of fewer accidents, what is needed most is immediate state and local action against moron drivers and unsafe driving habits of normal Americans who now kill more than 100 people a day, or die themselves in the accidents they cause while violating traffic laws. Last year more than 1,200,000 persons were injured by automobiles. The vast majority of these accidents were caused by carelessness. A great many of them were caused by calloused indifference to traffic laws. Obviously, fullest law observance and enforcement on the highways should become the immediate objective of all states and cities."

The newspapers' 1952 traffic safety campaign, which has the full endorsement of all of the state press and publishers' organizations will seek to educate both drivers and pedestrians in the causes of accidents. The No. 1 target will be speeding drivers, whose violations of traffic laws cause half of the automobile deaths in a number of states. All safety organizations are urging stringent action against speeders. Another primary target will be the drinking drivers, who also kill thousands of Americans each year and often escape punishment with "slap-on-the-wrist" fines that merely encourage sim-

ilar violations, according to Mr. Boate.

DON'T WAIT! . . . INSULATE! There's no need to live in a refrigerator or in an oven.

Weather-protecting a house by installation of insulation and weatherstripping can reduce the heating requirement in winter by as much as 50 per cent. In summer, rooms will be cooler because insulation retards the flow of heat into the house just as it retards its exit in the winter. Weather-protection consists of insulation plus weatherstripping, and in extreme climates, the use of storm sash. The need for complete "weatherproofing" is greater than ever today because our houses are less compact and more rambling, as is evidenced by the popular ranch style, which is not only spread out, but has a low pitched roof, fewer interior partitions, larger windows, and often a slab foundation. All of these elements call for insulation. By all means, insulate when you are building a new home, and if your home is already built, insulation will add to its comfort and value.

Even the most solidly built house needs insulation

Principal Types of Insulating Materials. Loose Fill: A mass of mineral wool, wood fibers, etc. Flexible: Made in blankets or batts from mineral wool, wood fibers, etc. Rigid Board: Made from wood or vegetable fibers. Reflective: This type of insulation usually made from aluminum foil reflects heat into or away from house.
