JANUARY 31 DEADLINE FOR POLL TAX PAYMENT

Only six more days remain in which to qualify for the right to vote in this election year of 1952.

January 31 is the last day when poll taxes may be paid and the voting right established, warns Sheriff J. S. Nance, tax assessor and collector. "The right to vote in the elections for precinct, county, district, state and national officials, to the president, will be sacrificed", Sheriff Nance continued, "unless taxes are paid before the deadline."

Poll tax payments are lagging behind expected totals at this time in the tax period with only 479 poll tax receipts issued to date.

Terrell County taxpayers are also reminded that January 31 is the deadline for the payment of property taxes without interest which will be attached with penalties to unpaid taxes on February 1.

Returned Veteran Speaker at Rotary Club Wednesday

Sgt. Braulio M. Gutierrez, who has been serving with the Marine Corps in Korea for the past year, was the speaker of the day at the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club here Wednesday noon.

Sgt. Gutierrez told of his experiences and his observations at the front. He was a truck driver there and saw much of the active fighting by the ground troops.

"Don't let anyone tell you that is a cold war or a police action," the sergeant said, "when men are killed by the thousands and others with frostbitten hands and feet are hauled back in trucks like stovewood, it is a real war."

The sergeant is home with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. M. Gutierrez, Sr., and family while on rotation leave. He has served in the F. F. A. on two different missions and does not now know what his next assignment will be. About twenty Rotarians were present to hear Gutierrez's talk.

Scabies Situation In West Texas Demands Closer Scrutiny

Bruce Taff, local inspector for the State Livestock Sanitary Commission, attended a meeting of inspectors in San Angelo last week, when the commission leaders discussed the ways and means of controlling the widespread infection of scabies.

Several West Texas ranches are now under quarantine and all the sales yards and stock pens are under quarantine pending a general cleanup of the infection.

Inspector Taff stated that the commission is anxious for the ranchers to familiarize themselves with the quarantine regulations set forth in the proclamation of the Governor which gives the commission power to enforce the quarantine laws.

Below is a copy of the Proclamation by Governor Shivers:

WHEREAS, it has been determined by investigation and inspections made by regularly employed representatives of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas that sheep scabies, Psoroptes Communis Ovis, a serious, contagious and infectious disease of sheep, exists in the State of Texas, and

WHEREAS, sheep infected with or exposed to scabies, Psoroptes Communis Ovis, are being assembled at Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Stockyards for sale, trade and barter as a result of which the disease, Psoroptes Communis Ovis, is being disseminated to the farms and ranches of this State with serious consequences to the economy of the sheep industry; and

WHEREAS, it is imperative that control measures be instituted to protect the sheep industry of Texas from the ravages of this disease,

THEREFORE, for the purpose of preventing the spread of this disease the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in it by law, hereby declares that all Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Public Stockyards in the State of Texas are classed as infected with, or exposed to, sheep scabies, Psoroptes Communis Ovis and are hereby quarantined.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas has adopted the following regulations governing the removal of sheep from said quarantined Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Public Stockyards

No sheep shall be moved intrastate therefrom (except for immediate slaughter purposes) without first having been dipped one time in a wettable Benzene Hexachloride solution containing a gamma isomer concentration of not less than 0.06 per cent, under the supervision of a representative of this Commission or of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry and accompanied by written permit or certificate, issued by a representative of the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry.

At the time of dipping, all sheep shall be counted and paint branded for the purpose of identification and shall be held separate and apart, in non-infectious pens from sheep that have not been dipped.

It is further provided that sheep shall be removed within ten days following the date of dipping.

Sheep sold for immediate slaughter purposes, and consigned directly to slaughtering establishments, maintaining Federal or Municipal post mortem veterinary inspection, shall be exempt from this regulation.

It shall be the duty of the owners, operators or managers of Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Stockyards to provide necessary dipping vats or pens, together with dipping fluid and materials for dipping said sheep, and to provide sufficient help in order that sheep required to be dipped under this regulation, may be dipped in a manner calculated to eradicate infection or exposure as the case may be.

It is also provided that owners, operators or managers of Community Sales Rings, Public Auction Sales and Stockyards are to clean and refill vats when deemed necessary by the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas or its

Local Clubs To Aid Drive For 'Dimes'

Mrs. J. W. McKee, chairman of public affairs in the Sanderson Culture Club, has appointed block chairmen to assist her in the collection of contributions for the local March of Dimes drive. The club voted at the Thursday meeting to publish the letter from the president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and give their support to her appeal.

The letter from Mrs. Van Hook Stubbs follows:

"The increase in the number of cases in Texas sounds a clarion call of challenge to the women of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs to dedicate themselves to an all-out effort to double our ranks in support of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"Texas county chapters of the National Foundation have spent \$280,000 more than was raised in the past three years to provide financial assistance for polio patients in Texas. Research, epidemic aid, public health, and professional medical education were provided with funds from March of Dimes campaigns in other states.

"WE MUST NOT ALLOW THIS TO CONTINUE" Texas can and must not only take care of its own, but also provide its share for scientific research if we are to do our part to banish fear of this disease from our homes. We all are aware of the terrible toll of lives taken by the polio epidemic in Odessa this past year. Keep in mind that your town could be next on polio's list.

"It is only fitting that the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs with its particular concern for the health and welfare of Texas, should take a more forceful role of leadership in helping meet the needs of greater numbers of polio victims while we help finance the scientific search for solution.

"We urge you to call upon your members. Please ask their increased participation in the 1952 March of Dimes. Contact your local March of Dimes director and offer your services as they may best be used in your community.

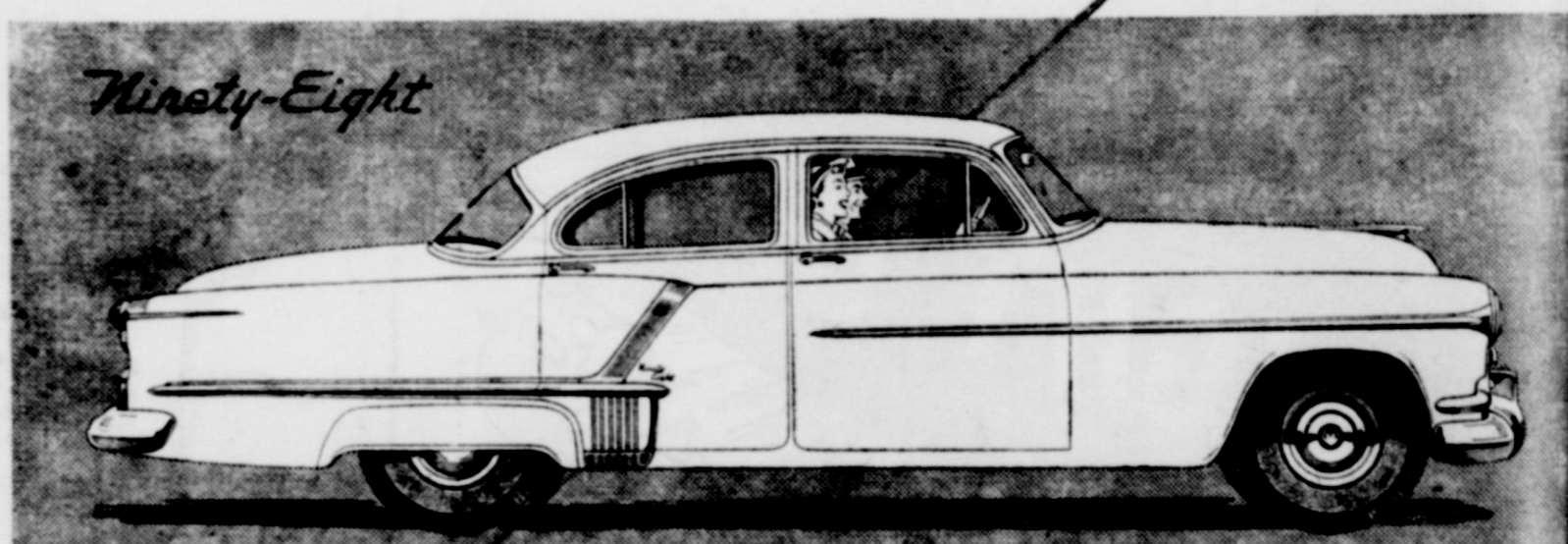

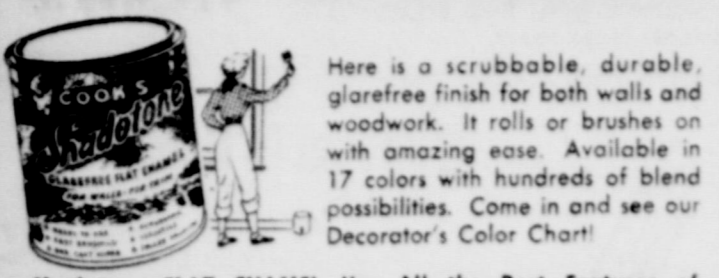
