In 1882 Robert Koch, a German bacteriologist, discovered and identified the specific germ which causes tuberculesis. With the germ causing the disease finally identified, Koch himself launched into a search for an immunizing agent to counteract the germ. Other scientists likewise sought an immunizing agent.

The first hint of success came in 1923 when two French scientists, Albert Calmette and Camille Guerin, developed a vaccine now known as BCG. This has been the most widely used immunizing agent against tuberculosis, BCG is prepared from a species of cattle tuberculosis germ, grown and regrown until its power to produce disease is lost. It is believed that when a person who has never been infected with tuberculosis germs is given an injection of BCG his body reacts by producing antibodies which will protect him against exposure to TB at a future time.

There are still a number of questions concerning BCG, however, to which we need an answer. It is not yet known, for instance, the best way of admistering BCG. the "life span" of the prepared vaccine, or the length of time BCG is effective after injection. and more important, how effective it really is. In an effort to find the answers to these and other questions, however, several way in this country.

Until more is known about BCG medical section of the Nati Tuberculosis Association, doe not advocate vaccination of the general population in this coun try.
