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**HEALTH FOR ALL—
Tuberculosis and BCG**

The search for an effective, safe vaccine against tuberculosis, an immunizing agent that would prevent the disease in a human being — goes back nearly 70 years. In 1882 Robert Koch, a German bacteriologist, discovered and identified the specific germ which causes tuberculosis. With the germ causing the disease finally identified, Koch himself launched into a search for an immunizing agent to counteract the germ. Other scientists likewise sought an immunizing agent.

The first hint of success came in 1923 when two French scientists, Albert Calmette and Camille Guérin, developed a vaccine now known as BCG. This has been the most widely used immunizing agent against tuberculosis. BCG is prepared from a species of cattle tuberculosis germ, grown and re-grown until its power to produce disease is lost. It is believed that when a person who has never been infected with tuberculosis germs is given an injection of BCG his body reacts by producing antibodies which will protect him against exposure to TB at a future time.

There are still a number of questions concerning BCG, however, to which we need an answer. It is not yet known, for instance, the best way of administering BCG, the "life span" of the prepared vaccine, or the length of time BCG is effective after injection and more important, how effective it really is. In an effort to find the answers to these and other questions, however, several well-planned studies are under way in this country.

Until more is known about BCG the American Trudeau Society, medical section of the National Tuberculosis Association, does not advocate vaccination of the general population in this country. But the ATS does recommend the vaccination of those unduly exposed to tuberculosis, such as doctors, nurses, medical students, and others who may be in direct contact with TB patients.

BCG has been used rather extensively in Europe and Asia, because tuberculosis became widespread in certain areas of those continents following World War II and emergency measures had to be taken in the hope that these would help to ward off its further spread.

Although BCG has been proved harmless, neither it nor any other vaccine can be considered a substitute for tried and proved methods of controlling tuberculosis.

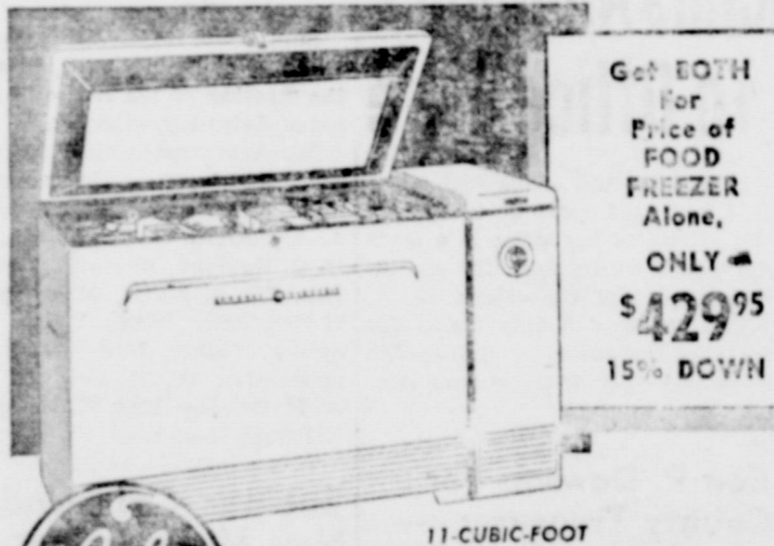

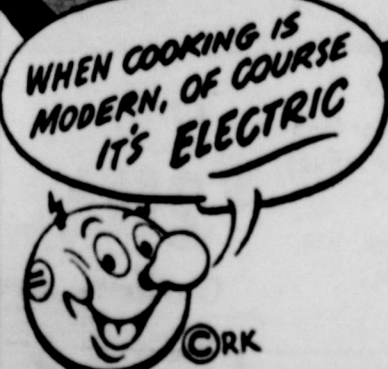
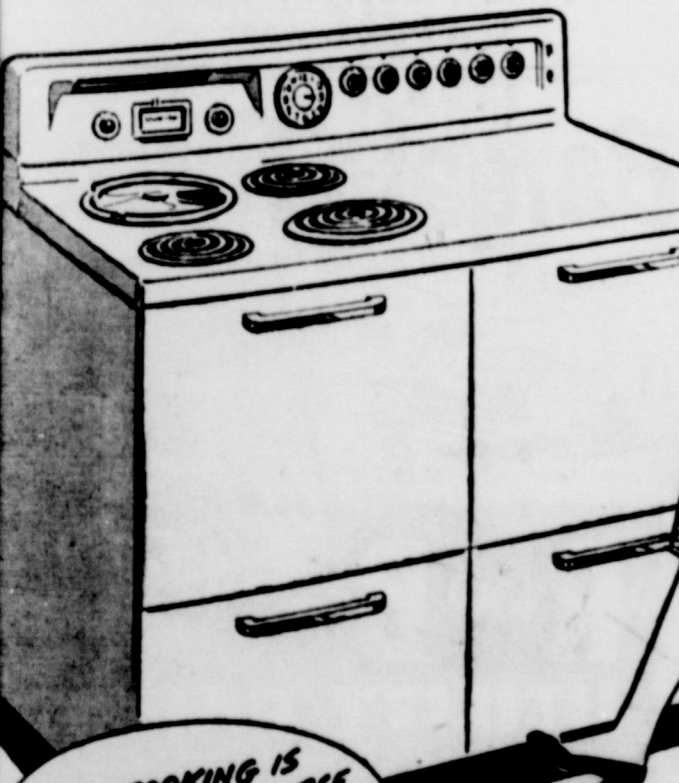
