A family of five thus was paying an average of \$19.40 a year in all forms of Federal taxes. Today that's hard to believe. On the basis of the present Federal budget, the bite placed on each citizen is averaging \$477 a year; and a family of five, \$2,375. That's an increase since 1900 of 12,200 per cent in the cost of Federal Gov-

ernment to the individual citizen! In 1900, after a period of the greatest economic progress a people had ever known, the nation's lebt was only \$1,263,000,000 amounting to a mere \$15 per peron for the 76,000,000 population of that day, or \$75 for a family of five. Thus, in these 1900 figures on the per capita debt (\$15) and cost of government (\$3.88 a year), we see that the activities of the Federal Government were small. an insignificant factor in national progress. A growing nation, a progressing nation was scarcely aware of the existence of a Federal Government, That's an important fact to remember.

In contrast today, our Federal Government is a great sprawling dominating bureaucracy - interceding in everybody's business, it seems; getting in everybody's nair; holding a hand in everybody' pocketbook; smothering out local self-government and citizen independence. In 50 years we have gone a long way into governmen regimentation bit by bit. As a peo ple, we have made economic pro gress but the sound portion of this progress has been made in spite of and not because of the growth and big spending of the Federal Government

Today our future economic progress is seriously jeopardized. With the expenditure of the present 1952 budget of \$71,594,000,000, the national debt will be \$260,222,000,000 averaging \$1,733 per person. When we consider this together with the verage yearly tax of \$477 per person, we see in true light how the present income and future income of every family is being crippled by big spending government

It is true of course, that quite bit of spending in recent years has been due to war and the threat of war. It is also true that dishonesty, graft and waste on a huge scale has been uncovered. The fact is apparent that with honesty good management and common sense in handling of public funds in half. We, as citizens must take wasteful spending of the Federal before them. self-preservation.

#### How Accurate Sould Your Watch Be?

In the U.S. Observatory a Washington there are several Riefler clocks which have been built and installed at a great expense.

These clocks have been mountwives, doctors, lawyers and candle- citizens - were paying an aver- ed on concrete piers sunk deep in the earth to avoid vibration. They are housed in a room which is kept always at a certain temperatureff Every 28 seconds they are automatically wound by electricity. They run by vacuum. Yet, in spite of all precautions which human ingenuity can devise, these clocks do not keep perfect time.

The fixed stars are nature's own time keepers. They alone are absolutely accurate. Through nighty observations of the stars, corrections are made in the variations of these clocks so that the nation may have its time as nearly correct as numaniv possible

The public, or ....arily unaware that the keeping of perfect time a mechanical impossibility, grieveously errs in expecting absolute accuracy from a watch. Bumped and rattled about, subject to extreme variations of temperatures and positions, wound at any time or not at all, and allowed to run with the accumulated dirt of years and the absence of any trace of oil, a watch which keeps approximately good time is indeed marvelous machine.

Pocket watch accuracy should not be expected or demanded from a wrist watch because its smaller mainspring does not possess the power to drive the mechanism with the same continuous uniformity. Consider that one minute variation a day means only one beat variation out of 1440, or a deviation from perfection of less than (-10,000, therefore the foilowing may be accepted as defining the time-keeping accuracy to be expected from a wrist watch:

One-hair minuate a day is very good time. One minute a day is good time. Two minutes a day is standard government time required of a large strap watch.
