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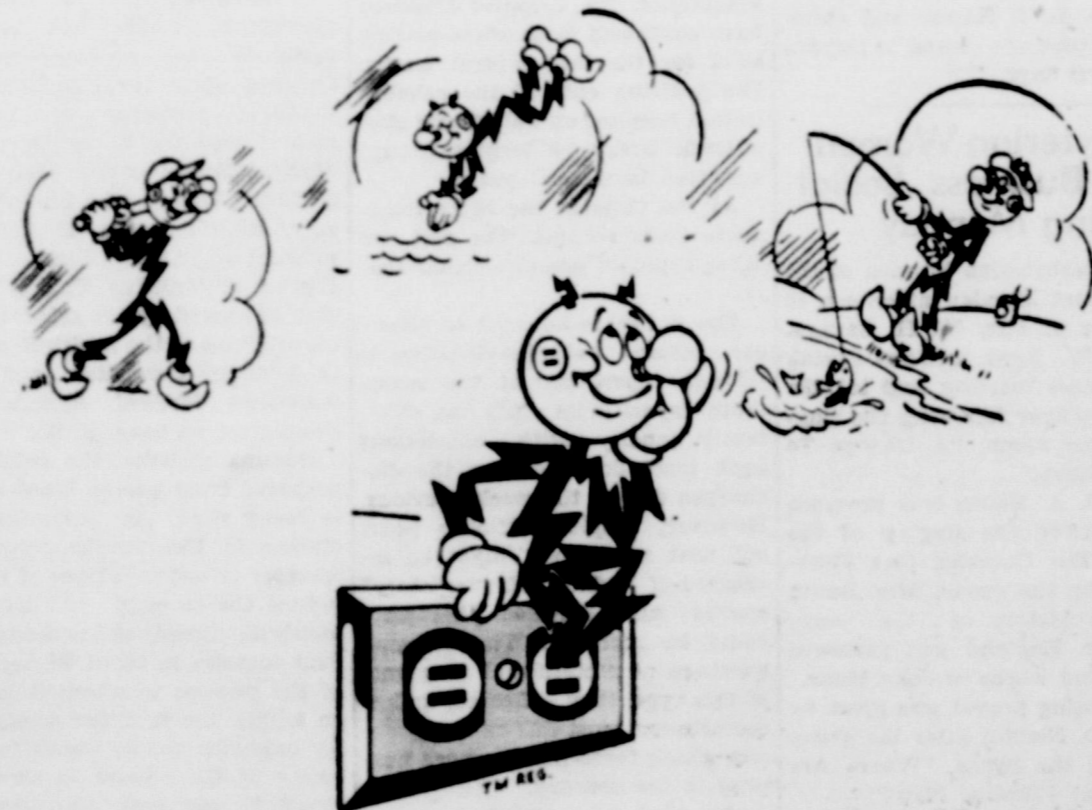

problem which we cannot evade much longer."

The four false freedoms referred to by Dr. Carlson, embrace the political formula devised and promoted by the New Deal and the Fair Deal elements in our national government to perpetuate their wasteful and completely incompetent administration over these past twenty years. Indeed, it may truly be said that it has been the New Deal-Fair Deal indoctrination of our youth and people with these four "false freedoms" that has already led to a serious degeneration of the moral and spiritual strength and standards of great masses of our American citizenry.

In the recent Democratic convention, FDR, Jr., and a few of the would-be politicians of the party spent much time in extolling the benefits derived from the past 20 years of New Deal-Fair Deal administration. It was thought that with all the manipulating going on behind the scenes of the convention the program could be worked out to the benefit of the "ins" so that the more liberal wing of the party would have to like it and would go along, but it didn't work that way. The stage is now set for Harry to push "Little Adlai" right on into the White House with the same old Socialistic platform and with much more socialism added to it. Harry's blessing on the rooky politician will do him no good. Governor Stevenson would do much better if Harry would stay out of the picture.

Action on the part of Texas Democrats will do a lot to bring Democratic beliefs back into the Democratic Party. A reader brought in a little clipping which reads: "A belief that does not express itself in action soon ceases to be even a belief." And St. Paul says: "There are, it may be, many voices, and none without significance." Voices other than those heard on the convention floor are being heard throughout the land, and you may be sure, they have significance.

Martin Dies is vindicated. Texas has stamped its approval on the man who had the intestinal fortitude and the foresight to speak his piece to the "Great White Father" in Washington.

He said, when he was cracked down on by Roosevelt: "There are some things more dear to me than the smiles of the most powerful administration in history."

That was when Mrs. Roosevelt was entertaining young Communists on the White House lawn and when the man who could do no wrong was sponsoring the treason-mongers direct from Moscow.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20
proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees, and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon for in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20
providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 61, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board which grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to provide certain restrictions and limitations in rural areas of this State, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation thereof.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members, who shall be appointed by the Governor. The board shall also establish a State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The terms 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board which grants, loans or scholarships to study medicine," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board which grants, loans or scholarships to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
