Funeral services were held in Del Rio Thursday morning for Jess Baker who died in a Fort Stockton hospital Tuesday evening.

Baker, who had resided on the Herbert Holmes ranch, received serious head injuries two weeks ago in a fall from a horse while rounding up sheep on the ranch. He was taken immediately to Fort Stockton by Elton Holland and had brain surgery Tuesday.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two daughters, Sarah Joyce Baker and Mrs. Teenie Henderson of Langtry.

Four Trash Cans Put In Business District

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ONLY ONE BOX FOR RUN-OFF AUGUST 23

The only voting box for Terrell County in the run-off of the primary election scheduled for Saturday, August 23, will be at the courthouse, according to an announcement made this week by W. W. Sudduth, county democratic executive committee chairman.

The election at the one polling place will have James Caroline as the presiding judge. The polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

There will be two candidates for Place 1 on the Court of Civil Appeals, Spurgeon Bell and Frank P. Culver. With the withdrawal of John Lee Smith, second high-ranking candidate for Congressman-at-large, Martin Dies is the only name to appear on the ballot for that race.

E. B. Litton was the high candidate in the local race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1. Since his was a write-in-campaign and he did not want the office for another term, the office will have to be filled but no names will appear on the ballot. Marshall Cooke and J. W. Happie were the other two write-in candidates in the primary.

Big roping events here Saturday and Sunday are expected to bring huge crowds of out-of-town visitors to Sanderson for the week end, according to officials of the Sanderson Roping Club, sponsors for the big event.

A dance is planned for Saturday night at the Masonic Hall for the visitors. Music will be furnished by the Western Playboys of San Angelo.

The roping events for the two days will include jackpot roping, exhibition bronc riding, ribbon roping, barrel races and matched roping by some of the fastest hands in West Texas. These events have been bringing hundreds of West Texans to Sanderson and it is thought that this week end affair will be even bigger than ever.

The club has acquired some big fat calves for the contestants and there will be plenty of excitement in the arena when the chutes open.

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Plans Complete For Coming Grid Season

Coach C. W. Snowden and Assistant Coach Norman Rath have returned from a coaching school and announced this week that they have completed their plans for the coming football season beginning soon. Snowden stated that all they are waiting on now is September 1, the date for the beginning of fall practice for the squad.

The coaches stated that they will probably teach the T-formation again this year with variations of the spread, as was used in play last year. They expect a large turnout for the practice beginning date and expect to begin long and arduous workouts for the boys who will meet a pretty stiff schedule in conference play this year and even a tougher schedule in non-conference games scheduled.

The Eagles will play Marfa, Alpine and Fort Stockton this year in non-conference games. All of these schools have class A teams. They will also meet Rankin in a non-conference game.

It was also announced that this year the cost of equipping a junior football team would be defrayed in some extent by the selling of programs at each of the football games played on Eagle Field. The program blanks will be furnished by a bottled drink concern and local business will be asked to participate in advertising to be printed on the program along with the listing of the players of the two teams scheduled for each game. Pictures of the Eagle squad along with pictures of the juniors and peewees will be on the programs which will sell for 10c.

The coaches are asking for the cooperation of the businesses and football fans in making their endeavors a success this year. Much equipment will have to be bought before the junior team can be put on the practice and playing field and it is hoped that the money derived from the advertisers and sale of the programs will go far in paying for the equipment.

The coaches assured the fans of an interesting series of gridiron frays this year and have very high hopes for a successful year. Although the loss of only five lettermen from last year's team and the gaining of some players coming up from the junior ranks.

'TRIP TO CANADA' DETAILS RELATED

July 19 (third day) Having driven from just north of Denver, Colorado, we camped that night in the Jackson Lake Camping ground in Teton National Park, Wyoming. The weather was very disagreeable — raining and misting. We set up camp in a grove of trees so that our tarps could be tied to the branches. Everyone had wet and cold feet. Supper saved us, for we had a very delicious meal of chili that warmed us up in more ways than one.

After supper, Buck, Bill, Mr. Shaw and I went down to the lake, as the mist was settling. We admired the wondrous scenery of the park. Bill wagered that he could swim to an island about a half mile distant. Finally, in view of the low temperature of the water, he gave it up as a bad bet.

July 20 (fourth day) we camped in the Old Faithful camping grounds, Yellowstone Park, Wyoming. We saw Old Faithful "play" on time and then went back to camp in order to prepare our bunks and eat dinner. Jerry immediately spotted two girls and their families camping near us. We finally went over to introduce ourselves and ended up with dates to church that night. After lunch the next day we made a scenic drive through the lower loop of the park road, enjoying seeing the geysers, hot springs, mud volcanoes, lakes, water falls and forests. During the night the temperature dropped below freezing but we slept warm. While in the park we saw many different types of animals.

We traveled from Yellowstone National Park to Glacier National Park, Montana, near the Canadian border. There we went swimming in a stream that was fed by surrounding glaciers and snow-banks. To think of it now, I would even hesitate to drink water that cold! We have pictures to prove we went swimming, however. Once during our day's drive we drove almost above the timber line, 10,000 feet above sea level, and found the scenery magnificent. As we were eating supper, we could see the snow falling on the surrounding mountains. Quite a change from the "good old" Texas weather.

July 22, after passing through the customs office, we drove into Calgary, Alberta, Canada. After setting up camp near a rockpit, we went into the famed city of Calgary. Although we were a bit disappointed in that it wasn't the "trip-roarin'" type of town that we had read about, we found it to be very interesting. It was a very clean town. We found, during our window-shopping, that Canadian money was worth more than ours.

July 23 we made camp in Banff, Alberta, Canada. Soon after arriving, we went up on a 3,240 foot ski-lift, from the pinnacle of which we were afforded a stupendous view of mountains, glaciers, and lakes. We took pictures of a

Royal Canadian Mounted Policeman in full dress uniform. We found that he wears his full dress uniform only when appearing at trials, in parades, or in popular tourist centers. In Banff, we went swimming in a pool heated by hot springs to about 90 degrees. It rained during the night, but again we slept dry.

July 24 we camped at Lake Louise, Banff National Park, Canada. We went canoeing on the prettiest lake I have ever seen. Bill and Buck went up to the glacier that fed the lovely lake, Kenneth, Stanley, and Rev. Hogard saw a great land-slide. All of us heard the distant rumbling of snow and rock slides. The pool at the hotel was heated to 72 degrees. West Texans have a strange feeling when they look out and see glaciers and snow all around them. That afternoon we played miniature golf on the hotel lawn. As I wrote the notes in my diary that night, I could see snow falling on the lofty Canadian Rockies around us.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 29 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees, providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electorate, and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees, and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and villages, and the Legislature shall provide on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon for in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages, and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said classes on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

"Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 51a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine, providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of the State, providing certain restrictions and limitations, providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of the State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon for in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

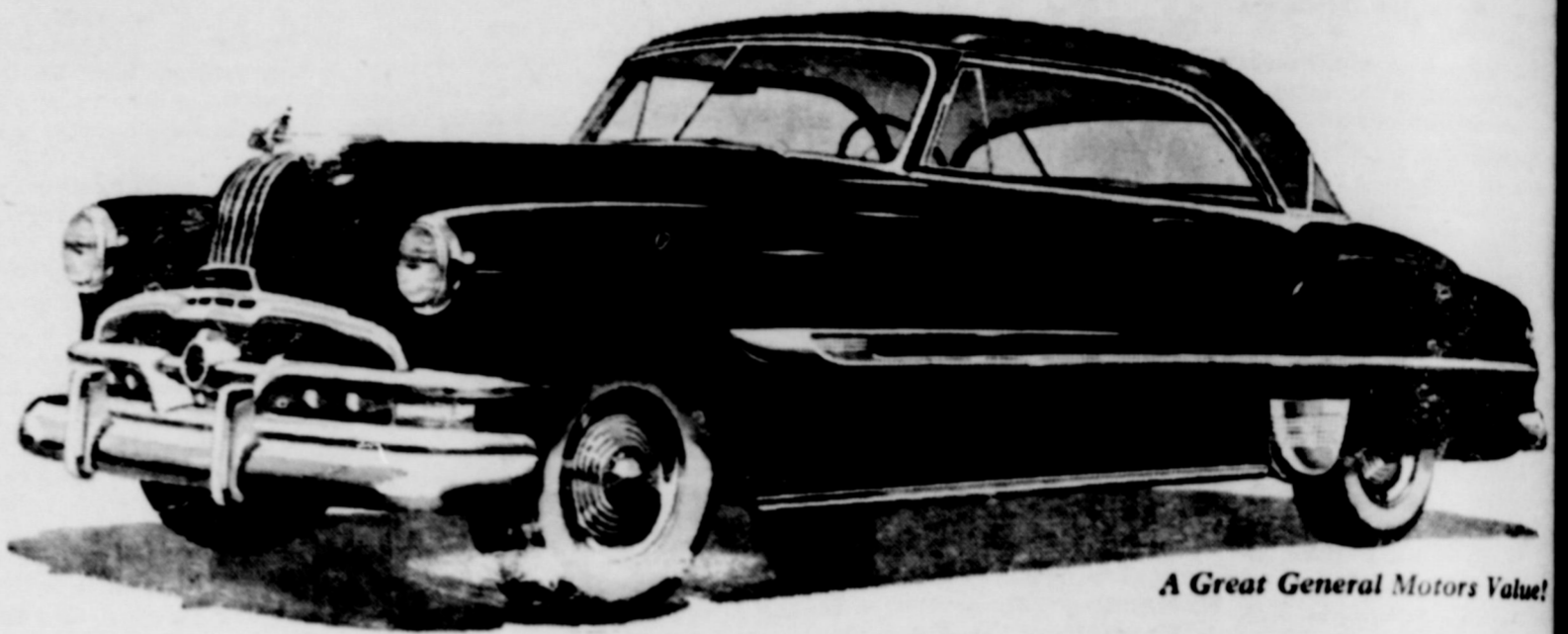
