The Public Health Nurse In TB Control

Nursing care of the sick dates back to early recorded history when women cleaned and dressed wounds to the best of their ability and prepared primitive "medicines" from herbs and plants for those who were ill. But skillful, invaluable nursing service as we know it today goes back only to the 1850's.

The founder of modern nursing. Florence Nightingale, born on May 12, 1820, devoted her entire life to the development and improvement of the nursing profession, hospital care, and public health. Her anniversary this week focuses attention on the unselfish work of the modern nurse who is dedicated to preventing as well as easing the sufferings of her fellow-man.

As medical science has progressed through the years, the duties and responsibilities of the nurse have grown more numerous the Methodist Sunday School and complex. Working closely with the doctor, the nurse is today concerned with all aspects of health and illness, including the prevention and control of communicable

of public health. In the course of her visits to homes, schools, industries, and clinics, she explains facts about tuberculosis which will help the people protect themselves against the disease. Often she works with public health officers and the local lly. tuberculosis association in seeking out those suspected of having TB and in helping sick persons take the proper steps to get immediate treatment. Where a tuberculosis patient is at home, waiting for admission to a tuberculosis hospital, the nurse give instruction to the patient's family for his care and for the preven-

tion of the spread of his disease. When a diagnosis of tuberculossis is made, the nurse works with the patient's doctor to help the sick person "accept" his illness and to help him understand that the best place for him to gain his health is in a tuberculosis hospital. Where a patient's illness means social and financial problems for the patient and his family, the nurse often works with the tuberculosis association, welfare departments, and other community agencies to ease the situation. The nurse also assists with the rehabilitation of the patient and preparations to help him become a bread winner again, once he is well and it is safe for him to do

Briefly, the nurse's responsibilities in the field of TB control alone require superior intelligence. tact, understanding, and imagination over and above her technical
