LISTEN TO LUKE

BE SURE TO VOTE

DON'T GIVE ME SERENITY
To accept those things which cannot be changed;
STRENGTH to change those that should be changed;
AND WISDOM to distinguish between the two.

In our minds, the above is a good and timely prayer for each American citizen to offer for his guidance when he steps into the voting booth on November 4 to select his choice of candidates to lead this nation during the coming years.

Let us dwell for a minute on a strictly non-partisan subject; but get connected with politics; that subject is the importance of voting, of being heard in what truly is an inherent right of each citizen when it comes to the selection of a candidate for public office.

The failure to exercise this power of privilege is a vote for the wrong man, regardless of who the would-be voter might select as his choice. Each officer named to any position should be the choice of the majority and not just the choice of the majority of the voters. Whoever is elected as president will be the president of all of the people of the United States including those who voted against him and those who failed to vote.

This year, let the citizens of Terrell County voice their opinion 100 per cent in naming their choice of the candidates. Then we can, even in humility, feel secure in our democratic manner of voting to the will of the majority. The entire nation is expected to turn out its biggest votes ever this year; let's hold up Terrell County's end of this expectation.

The little dash you see above, means that there should be a change of the subject below it, and since we were non-partisan in the above, it means that we can be partisan now!

According to a news release by prominent daily newspaper—at least one—we have only a few more issues in which to voice our opinion freely; that is if the wishes of a certain Democratic Congressman are fulfilled. He stated that there should be legislation passed to prohibit newspapers and magazines from publishing articles which opposed or were against DEMOCRATIC PARTY administration.

I have only this to say: If you are in agreement with the party's administration and you want to say something about it, it will be because one of those men in the little black satchel has come around and convinced us that it would be to our best interest to cease the publication of such matters.

HEAVY ABSENTEE BALLOT EXPECTED

Beginning last Wednesday Ruel Adams, County Clerk, started mailing out absentee ballots and a check Wednesday of this week revealed 21 ballots mailed out to voters while 18 persons had cast their absentee ballots in the clerk's office.

To those who wish to vote absentee by mail, Mr. Adams reminds voters that they have until October 31 to vote their absentee ballot and the return must be postmarked not later than October 31, if the vote is to be counted. Also, those wishing to vote in person may vote in his office any day until October 31, if the voter plans to be out of town or away from his precinct on election day, November 4.

In order to vote in the general election in Texas on November 4, the law says that if you are 60 years of age before January 1, 1952, you are entitled to a free vote and, in Terrell County, without an exemption certificate. Otherwise, you must have paid a poll tax on or before January 1, 1952, for the current year. Anyone who became 21 years of age after Jan. 1, 1952, and who secured an exemption before January 31, 1952, may also vote in the general election.

The local Juniors won their game by a score of 19-0 and remain unscathed upon this year after their defeat of the Fort Stockton team.

The first TD was made on a hand-off from Carroll Eggleston to Popo Flores from punt formation. The second tally was on a pass from Darrell Cox to Joe Borrego. The final score was a hand-off from Gary Harrell to Flores who ran 45 yards. The only conversion for the extra point was following the first TD and was a pass from Cox to Claudio Villegas. The scoring was all in the first half of the ball game and all of the players on the Junior team saw plenty of action during the game. The next game will be October 29, when the Juniors and Peewees will play in Del Rio.

This plan will give the student a full year's coverage of school activities whereby the old plan only covered four and one-half months of school activities.

Regan To Support 'Ike' For President

Midland, Oct. 21 — "I am not supporting the presidential nomination of the Democratic party," U. S. Representative Ken Regan said here today.

Regan, who is unopposed for reelection to Congress from the 16th District, said his main reason for opposing Stevenson and Sparkman was their respective attitudes toward the Texas Tidelands issue.

In addition to the Tidelands, Regan said he did not agree with the Democratic nominees' views on national and world matters.

"I have opposed and voted against the National Democratic Party's socialist program during the six years I have represented the people of West Texas," Regan added, "and I do not consider their program to be in the interest of our state and the nation as a whole."

Eagles Taken By Bracket 13-7; Clint Forfeits This Week's Tilt

The Bracketville Tigers, non-conference opponents of the Sanderson Eagles in last Friday's grid fray here, took the local boys by a score of 13-7, scoring both of their touchdowns in the fourth period.

The Eagles started out with a bang early in the first quarter by scoring against the favored Tigers on a pass from Juan Olivares to Ruben Ochoa that was good for 28 yards and a touchdown. Roman Zepeda kicked the extra point.

Sanderson remained on the upper side of the playing all during the first half, with the ball changing hands often because of the lack of necessary yardage for a first down. Sanderson was using mostly crossbucks and passes to gain yardage or attempt to gain yardage, during the first half while Bracketville was relying on the speed and power of their fullback, E. Jaso and the deception of the fake handoffs by Hernandez.

The first touchdown by Bracketville was on a 47 yard run by Jaso with the conversion of the extra point by Jaso on a running play. They made the second TD on a 4-yard run by Hernandez but the extra point try, another running play, was no good.

Sanderson had one touchdown called back because of a clipping penalty against the Eagles. The play was a 67-yard run by Roman Zepeda. Sanderson was threatened to score in the final minutes of the ball game and their final play of the game was a fourth-down attempt that failed to put the ball over the goal line.

Bracketville did not attempt any passes throughout the ball game, relying on running plays for their total yardage.

Two of the Eagle regulars, David Mitchell, fullback, and Charles Stegall, center, were missing from the line-up Friday night because they were on their way home from an F. F. A. convention in Kansas City.

The Clint team forfeited to the Sanderson Eagles the coming fray Friday night because of the lack of players. They also announced they would forfeit the balance of their conference games this year.

This leaves Sanderson on top of the district line-up with no losses in district play with Fabens, Fort Hancock and Grandfalls yet to be played. The Eagles will enjoy a rest this week in preparation for meeting the Fabens Wildcats on Eagle Field on October 31.

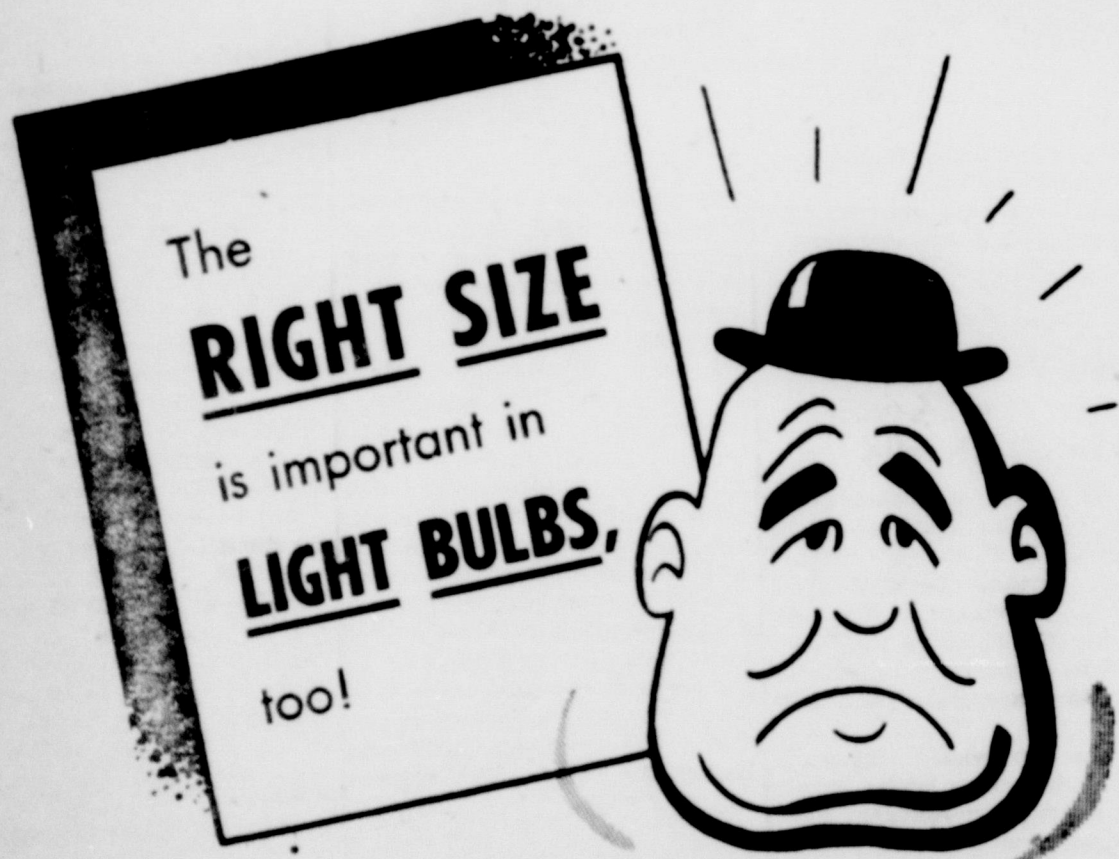
