## Boy Scouts Help In 'Get Out The Vote' Drive For Election

Between now and November 4, the local Boy Scout Troop will join the Boy Scouts of America in its nation-wide campaign when most of its two million members call on 30,000,000 homes throughout the United States and leave on the front door knobs a Liberty Bell cutout, urging all citizens to vote.

Our 2,000,000 boys will learn a great lesson of participating citizenship as they perform a significant service to our country."

## 'KING SIZE' BALLOT FOR ELECTION OF CANDIDATES NOV. 4

A "king size" ballot with eight columns will face the voters when they go to the polls on Tuesday, November 4, to cast their ballots. In good West Texas phraseology, the ballot is about the size of a saddle blanket.

Political parties listed on the ballot are Democratic, Republican, Prohibition, Progressive, Christian Nationalist, Constitutional and Independent. In addition, there is a "write-in" column for those who do not wish to vote in any other column.

District, county and precinct nominees are listed under the Democratic column only.

All state Democratic nominees, except Commissioner of Agriculture, also appear under the Republican column and the remainder of the offices under that heading are blank. There are no candidates for any office other than president and vice president under any of the other party headings and the independent and write-in heading have no candidates listed.

Voters may vote for the candidate of their choice by checking the square alongside the name of the candidate or by scratching out all names except the candidate of their choice for each particular office. Voters are cautioned to be sure that no name is unchecked, or that no name is left unscratched on the ballot except the name of the candidate of their choice.

Polling places will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. In Terrell County polls will be in the court house, the Methodist Church at Dryden, Sid Harkins ranch in precinct 3 and the T-5 ranch in precinct 4.

## Proposed Changes In Constitution To Be Voted November 4

In the interest of national politics on the national level, little or no interest has been in evidence on the part of the voters in the two proposed constitutional alterations scheduled for vote on November 4. These proposed changes appear on the bottom of the ballot in the general election.

The first listed amendment on the local ballot concerns the payment of Workmen's Compensation Insurance to city and town employees. The second proposed change would authorize scholarships, loans or grants to people who desire to study medicine.

The investigation of these proposed changes in the constitution is suggested to all voters, so that they may qualify themselves as an intelligent voter in these matters.

Concerning the first-listed proposal, the Constitution already provides for passage of laws to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance for such employees. The insurance is available from private insurance companies. Also, the language of the proposed alteration may be interpreted to make it mandatory upon cities to set up a Workmen's Compensation system, unlike a present law that makes such policy voluntary for counties and their employees.

It would further encroach upon the legal power and authority of cities, towns and villages, and is a step toward centralization of government.

Drawbacks of the proposed amendment to authorize scholarships, loans and grants to those who desire to study medicine are: Some few, possibly, who had no desire to practice medicine, could take advantage of the loan or grant merely to further their education or merely for a selfish or personal reason. The actual wording of the amendment change proposed, offers said loans, scholarships and grants to those who desire to study medicine who will practice in a rural area. The word "rural" is not defined as to location or population, neither is the time limit set for such practice.

It is also discriminating in that the loans, grants and scholarships are restricted to a limited group. It has been pointed out that all of the state's medical schools are now overcrowded and have long waiting lists of applicants. Thus, teachers and facilities for their education would have to be provided.

The term "medical" is not defined. It is left to the Legislature to determine whether the term would include dentists, veterinarians, nurses, technicians, chiropractors, and doctors of osteopathy as well as doctors of medicine.

There is also no limit upon the amount of money the legislature may appropriate to operate the proposed board and create the proposed funds.

## TURNER HOTEL DONATES \$24.50 TO FIREMEN'S FUND

Hollis Haley, manager of the Turner Hotel, turned over \$24.50 to W. J. Ferguson, Jr., treasurer of the Sanderson Fire Department, last week. The amount was contributed by Haley who donated all the money received from coffee sales on Wednesday of last week.

## 100 Absentee Ballots Issued By Clerk

To date one hundred absentee ballots have been issued by County Clerk Ruel Adams and eight-four of those have been returned or voted in person. All absentee ballots to be mailed in by voters must be postmarked not later than Friday, October 31, if they are to be counted. Friday is also the last day for persons to vote their absentee ballots in the clerk's office if they expect to be out of town or away from their precinct on election day.

## 2 Per Cent Discount Offered On Payment Of Taxes In November

Friday marks the last day for the three per cent discount offered to Terrell County taxpayers who pay their 1952 taxes during the month of October. To date, more than half of the total tax has been paid. Mrs. Ed Leatherwood, deputy tax collector, reported Tuesday that \$74,555.94 had been paid and the total tax is \$129,629.66.

Commencing November 1, a discount of two per cent will be offered during that month to tax payers.

Many persons are paying their poll taxes at the same time that they pay their personal and real property tax, although the tax may be paid any time before January 31. C. W. Burdett was the first local resident to purchase a poll tax for 1953 and Mrs. Leatherwood has already issued 158 poll tax receipts for 1953.

## L. D. BOOKER, JR., WOUNDED

Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Booker of Del Rio received word Monday that their son, Lt. L. D. Booker, Jr., received flesh wounds about the face and chest as a result of a mine explosion while attacking enemy forces.

Lt. Booker, serving with a tank corps, has been in Korea since December 5. He is a graduate of A&M College.

Lt. Booker was wounded on tank patrol near Chorwon, supporting the Ninth Republic of Korea Division. A tread was knocked off the tank when it ran over an anti-tank mine. The lieutenant got out to hitch a cable on the front to haul it out. His buddy started toward him to tell him something but stepped on another anti-tank mine within a few feet of Booker. The explosion killed the buddy and wounded Booker. He lost his front teeth, had fragment wounds in his face and shoulders.

HEALTH FOR ALL—

The Housewife Comes Home From the TB Hospital

The doctor can say "cured", but it is a family responsibility to make sure that a woman with a household to watch over stays well when she leaves the tuberculosis hospital and returns to her home. Naturally, the patient must guard her own well-being, but her entire family should help her

keep well for her sake — and, incidentally, for their own.

First of all, through acquiring a knowledge of the disease, family members can appreciate more clearly why a housewife who appears well and whose illness is arrested, cannot immediately go back to assuming heavy responsibilities. Conservation of her energies is a "must" and a friendly, family discussion of her daily jobs usually will reveal some surprising, energy-wasting flaws in the household routine. For example, all tasks should be analyzed and questions like these asked:

Is the job necessary? Does the result justify the time and energy used? Where should it be done? In the kitchen? The cellar? Or could an outside source, such as a laundry, help?

When should it be done? For instance, could the children's lunch be prepared while dinner is cooking and save the next morning rush? Are there labor-saving methods and is it possible to utilize them?

By no means should the family look upon the housewife who has had TB as an invalid. It is essential for her to feel part of the close family group and to participate in all its activities. But conservation of her strength is vital. She must follow the doctor's advice and continue the regular rest periods, preferably in bed, which were such a major part of her hospital treatment. Family friction should be avoided. Wholesome, outside-the-

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, the man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. 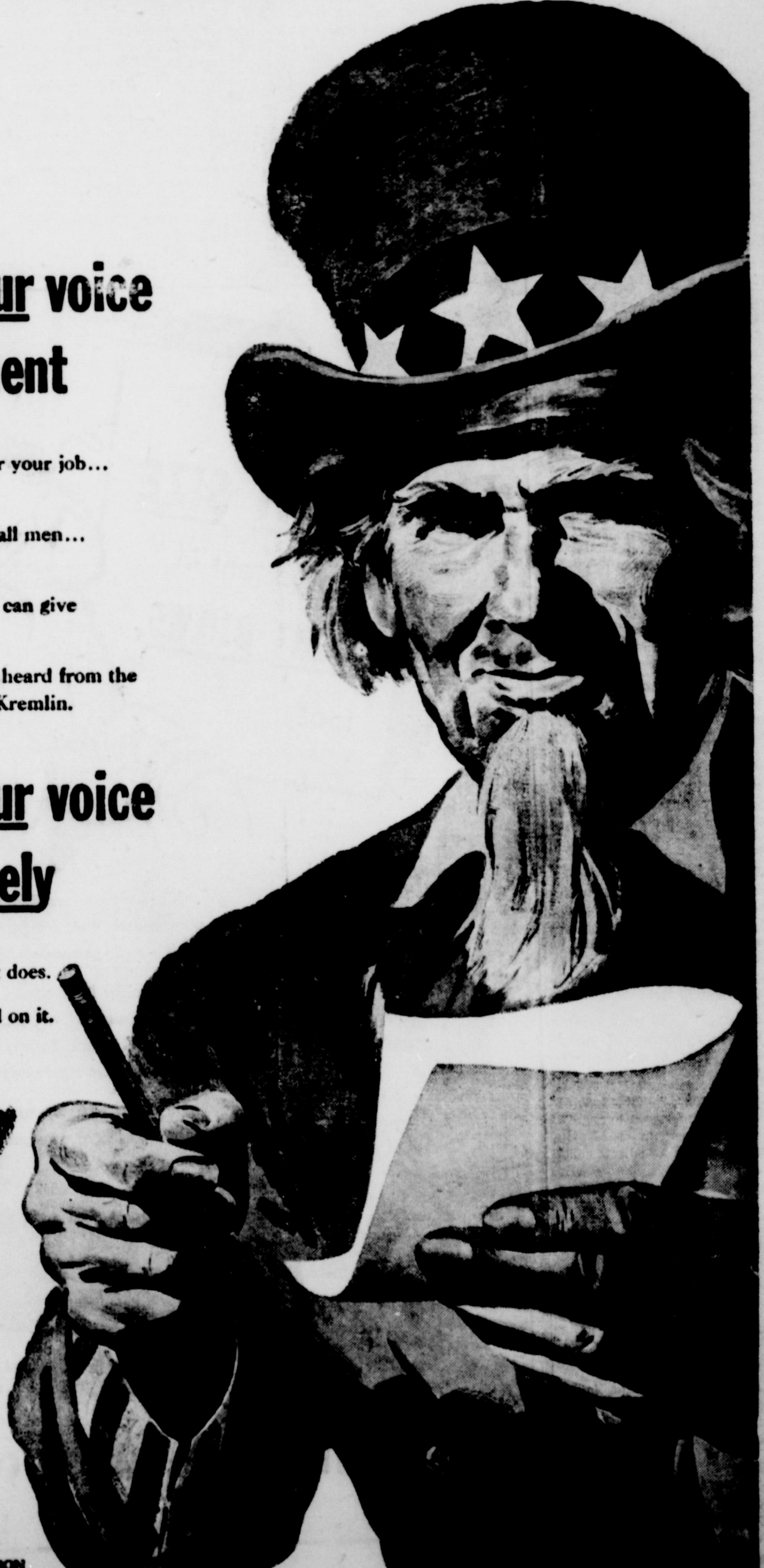
