This can't continue without more serious personal injuries coming sooner or later. You know the odds are against safety when cars are torn up. This column is not informed on facts as to the cause of these wrecks — we only know they have been occurring too frequently for safety. As we have mentioned before, we still insist there should be driving classes in high school. Of course, it is old-fashioned to suggest it, but more good might be accomplished by self-driving courses than by all the high school football in the country.

Yes, football is fine for the spectators, but it's tough on the players who may come out crippled for life. Driving a car may be fun, too, but it's also tough to be crippled as a result of careless driving.

## KECK OIL COMPANY STAKES SITE FOR WELL IN TERRELL

E. F. Pierson, vice president of the Keck Oil Co., Long Beach, California, arrived in Sanderson early this week to start preparations for drilling of the company's holdings near Dryden. The holdings include the John Harrison land.

Pierson is making headquarters in Sanderson and has begun the work of getting the location staked and surveyed and a road built to the location. Application to drill has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas, he stated.

J. C. Lewis of Monahan's will be the drilling contractor and field superintendent for the Keck Co.'s operations. Drilling is expected to start about December 25 when Lewis will erect a cable-tool rig for spudding in the well.

The well is located 330 feet west and south of the northeast corner of section 22, Block D-4, MK&TE RR Co.

The oil company has large interests in this area, particularly in the Dryden section, Pierson stated. Information, as the drilling progresses, will be available for publication, and this wildcat operation will be followed with great interest by interested leaseholders in this section.

## Inauguration Dance Opens V. F. W. Hall Last Sunday Night

The rebuilt and redecorated Veterans of Foreign Wars hall was dedicated with an inauguration dance Sunday night. About 300 Latin-Americans paid admission to the big dance which was the first to be held in the new hall.

The veterans have gone to a great expense in fixing the large hall with all the decorations and lighting fixtures to make it one of the most modern in this part of the country.

Walls of the hall have been painted a pale green and the ceiling is painted cream. Indirect lighting fixtures have been installed and gas heaters add to the comfort of the building.

The north end of the hall has a stage for the orchestra and the stage is flanked on the west side by a concession booth. Ladies' and gentlemen's lounges will be constructed on the east of the platform in the near future, according to plans by the veterans.

The American Legion has acquired the use of the hall for a Christmas dance on December 24 and a New Year dance on December 31.

Rudy Gutierrez and his "Music of Two Continents" orchestra will furnish music for both dances.

## SANTA CLAUS TO VISIT SANDERSON ON DECEMBER 19

Jars have been placed in most of the business houses of town to solicit funds for paying for the bags of goodies given away and to help defray the cost of the project. ## Mrs. Edith Lane Dies In Marfa Wednesday, Burial in El Paso

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Thursday morning from the First Baptist Church in Marfa for Mrs. Edith Lane and the body was taken to El Paso for burial beside her late husband.

Mrs. Lane died Wednesday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. W. DeVolin in Marfa. She suffered a paralytic stroke almost two weeks ago, the night after going to Marfa to visit with her daughter and family, and her condition has been considered serious since that time. Her daughter, Mrs. Austin Nance, has been at her bedside since she was stricken.

Besides the daughters, Beth DeVolin and Vannah Jo Nance, granddaughters, and a sister, Mrs. J. L. Barnes, of Del Rio, also survive.

Until ill health forced her retirement from an active life, she had a dress shop here for several years and had formerly resided in Del Rio and El Paso. She came to Sanderson about 16 years ago to make her home with her daughter, Mrs. Nance. She had been in failing health for the past six years after having a severe paralytic stroke.

## Eagles To Play Bi-District Game With Hermleigh At Snyder Fri.

Friday night the Sanderson Eagles will test the mettle of the last-year bi-district foes, Hermleigh, in another bi-district tilt to be played in Snyder this year.

The Hermleigh team has the same district standing as the Eagles and are rated to be a little stronger team than played here last year; but then the Eagles have a different football team, too.

The Eagles took a few days off from practice two weeks ago and then got down to serious business at hand in working out some of the rough spots that had been accumulated in their style of play by the week of rest. Over the holidays many of the Eagles took very strenuous exercises to build up their wind in climbing some of the surrounding mountains in their quest for deer and others took advantage of the holidays to take employment that was offered them in an effort to keep their muscles active during that time off from actual football practice. The boys really got down to serious business when school was resumed Monday and scrimmage has been fast and hard for the three days remaining prior to the game.

In the bi-district game the Sanderson team will have available the services of Eugene Hibbard, ineligible from conference play because of a transfer last year to this school. Hibbard will probably see plenty of action at the full-back spot and will aid the backfield in its speed plays. He is very fast foot.

Most of all of the minor injuries that have been plaguing the team since the Fort Hancock game, had a chance to heal completely during the three weeks the Eagles were off and they expect to go onto the gridiron at Snyder in tip-top shape.

The ball game will get under way at 7:30 sharp. All fans who possibly can be away from their work are urged to make the 254-mile trek to the oil city to support the Eagles in their attempt to match last year's wins. They promise a good ball game with a full display of enthusiasm to add another win to their string of victories this year.

## Youths Admit Theft Of Three Cars In One Night To Officers

Terry Cummings, 15, and Loy Brown, 16, of Fort Stockton, were apprehended in Del Rio last Sunday night after Charles Baker of Dryden had reported the theft of his Mercury from that town. The boys were brought to Sanderson for questioning and later turned over to authorities in Fort Stockton.

Sheriff J. S. Nance related the following story as told by the lads: They drove a Studebaker pickup which they had stolen in Fort Stockton to Sanderson, abandoned the pickup and got into the pickup belonging to Roger Rose and drove it to Dryden where they abandoned it and got into Baker's Mercury which they drove to Del Rio.

It was reported that Baker saw the boys get into his car and leave and immediately called Sheriff Nance who relayed the pickup to authorities in Del Rio.

## Wrecks Hamper Holiday Fun For Area Residents

Wrecks last week end hampered week end enjoyment for many area and local people, with only one serious injury reported. All of the vehicles involved were demolished with the exception of the new Plymouth belonging to Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cargile with damage reported at \$500.

Mrs. Cargile and daughter, Miss Mary Lou Cargile were en route to Sabinal and the damage was only to the body of the car which overturned after hitting a soft muddy shoulder on the road.

Early Saturday morning six boys from Pecos were returning home after hunting deer in the lower country and ran off of the west side of the road on the south side of Big Hill, 9 miles north of Sanderson. The boys were taken to a Fort Stockton hospital where it was determined that one had a broken back. Other occupants of the pickup suffered only shock and minor cuts and bruises. The complete steering column and mechanism were ripped from the underside of the pickup in the accident.

Friday night Claude Hill, Jr., and Tommy Mansfield were returning from Langtry in the Hill car when it was completely demolished after the driver lost control of the vehicle when it left the highway. The accident occurred east of Lozier.

Mansfield was thrown from the car and received two broken ribs, cuts about the head and face with minor lacerations on the arms and legs. Hill was uninjured in the accident.

The boys were brought to Sanderson where Mansfield was treated for his injuries and is recuperating at his home.

Saturday morning two Latin-American men drove their pickup off the bluff on the north side of Big Hill, 9 miles north of Sanderson. Neither of the men were injured, but the pickup was demolished in almost the same manner as that driven by the boys from Pecos.

The heavy fog and excessive speeds under foggy conditions were blamed for the cause of all four of the wrecks which occurred last week end.

## Three-Fourths Of County And School Taxes Already Paid

Last week marked the last period for Terrell County taxpayers to take advantage of the two per cent discount allowed for county and state taxes paid during November. Mrs. Ed Leatherwood, deputy tax collector, announced Monday.

During the month of December, a one per cent discount is allowed on unpaid taxes. Both property and poll taxes may also be paid anytime during January, but no discount is allowed on poll taxes.

After January 31, property taxes become delinquent and an eight per cent penalty plus a six per cent interest will be charged. January 31 is the deadline for the payment of poll taxes.

About three-fourths of the collectable taxes have been paid to date. The total tax was \$129,629.66 and of this amount \$93,137.50 has been collected, according to a report from the tax collector's office.

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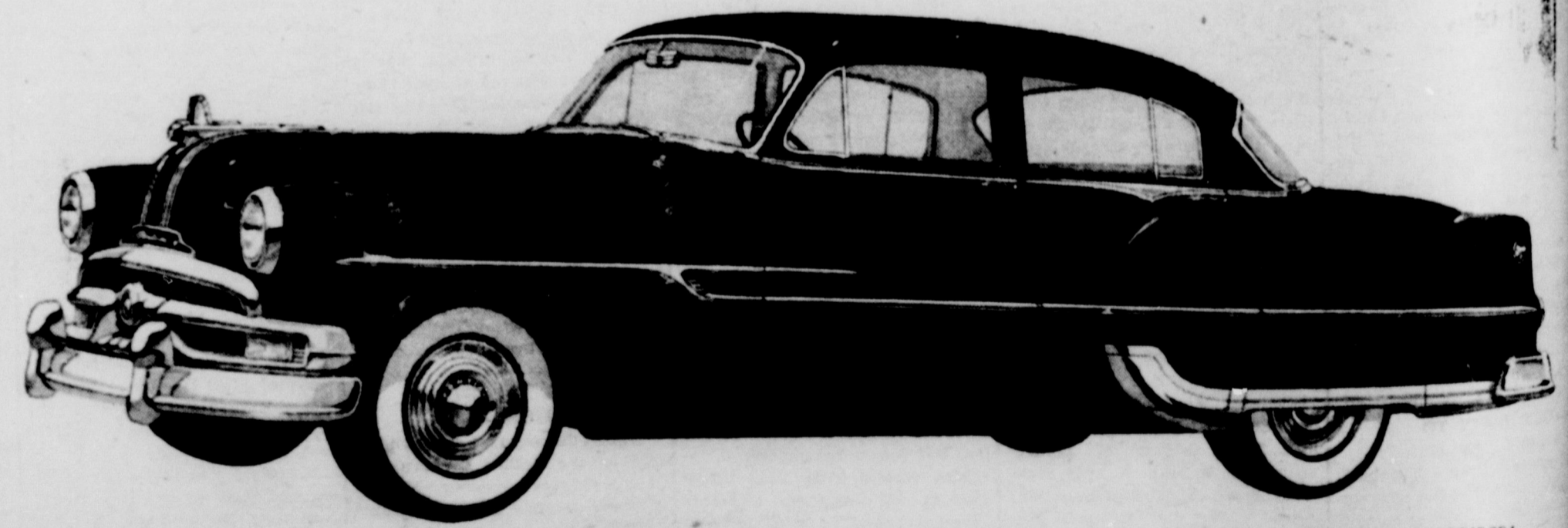
