# Dryden Last Thursday Three-Fourths Of Taxes Already Paid

Last week marked the last per iod for Terrell County taxpayers cent discount allowed for county and state taxes paid during Nov ember, Mrs. Ed Leatherwood, deputy tax collector, announced Mon-

During the month of December a one per cent discount is allowed on unpaid taxes. Both property and poll taxes may also be paid anytime during January, but no discount is allowed on poll taxes

After January 31, property taxes become delinquent and an eight per cent penalty plus a six per cent interest will be charged. January 31 is the deadline for the payment of poll taxes.

About three-fourths of the collectable taxes have been paid to date. The total tax was \$129,629.66 and of this amount \$93,137.50 has been collected, according to a report from the tax collector's office.


