Just think, for a moment, about the terrible power that a President might have exercised if four, instead of only two, judges had agreed with Mr. Truman's appointee, the Chief Justice. It makes a person shudder to realize what could happen - in the name of an "emergency." A President's mastery over the people - their lives, liberty and property - would be complete and total.
