More Than 500 Attend Red Cross Workers Barbecue Celebrating T&NO Safety Award

Between 550 and 600 Southern Pacific employees and their families attended the barbecue given by railroad officials at the V. F. W. Hall last Thursday night.

The celebration was given to the south lines of section 216 in commemorate the winning of the Block Y and is about 3-4 mile from Spence Safety Award by the San Antonio division employees in 1952. T. This is the first time that the San Antonio division has won first place since this award was inaugurated by Mr. Spence in 1945. For the year 1952, this division had 17 reportable injuries for the 7.504.-782 man hours as compared to one fatality and 41 reportable injuries for the previous year.

The San Antonio division is the largest of the road's five divisions in the two states, comprising 989 miles of lines extending from El Paso to Houston. It has more than 4.400 employees.

The daggers, often times growing to a height of 15 feet or more, are a rare variety of cacti which grow in profusion only in a locality of the Big Bend National Park known as Dagger Flats.

Park visitors and area citizens are advised that the plants this year will bloom in greater abundance than they have in several vears and are urged to visit at least that particular section of the park to enjoy one of the more magnificent views of the flora.

The blooming plants are some 8 miles east of the park road on a graded gravel road which is in good condition, Garrison stated.





Silage can be kept, if properly stored, for several seasons without loss in quality. If storage facilities are available, considerable savings can be made by putting up a supply of hay during the harvest season when prices are lowest. The same is true, says Bates, for either purchased or home-grown grains.

It all adds up, he says, to good business management when adequate facilities are provided on the farm or ranch to store the reserve feed supplies needed. 
