Washington - Twenty years ago the Roosevelt administration recruited an intellectual "Brain Trust" from among the college professors of the nation. Smithsonian Institute Says Find of Fanlast Creatures Near Alpine Reveals Dim Past

Washington - The Smithsonian Institute reported that its geologists have unearthed some "fantastic creatures that lived 20 mirlion years ago in a sea of mud where the Glass Mountains of Texas now stand"

The geologists recovered the anrient skeletons and shells by dissolving about 330 tons of yelley brown limestone taken from the area. They washed the stonaway with hydrocloric acid that d.d not damage the creatures but ied in the rock.

"The job of dissolving these fossils out of the rocks, which has been in progress for 13 years, now is nearly completed," the institution reported. "The job of classiving remains to be done.
