## Plans Set For Start Of Little League Ball Here Immediately

At a meeting of men interested in the organization of pony and little league baseball here, plans were made for the organization of as many teams as necessary to contain all boys between the ages of 8-12 and 13-14 as are interested in learning more about the game of baseball.

Directors are O. T. Sudduth, R. V. Spears, Jack Turner, Greene Cooke, E. J. Hanson and W. W. Sudduth who were named to work out details as to sponsors, team division, length of season, number of games, and the ways and means of raising money to finance the endeavor, and further plans will be revealed as soon as completed by the directors.

L. H. Gilbreath was named as commissioner of the leagues.

Present plans are to finance the sport by contributions from business men and interested parents and purchase all equipment from a common treasury, rather than have two or three responsible for outfitting and keeping up the equipment for each team and no person, business or group of men will finance any one particular team. The sponsorship of a team is merely the designation of a responsible person or group to see that that team has managers and that the interest of the boys is maintained, as well as having a voice in the directors' meeting in behalf of a particular team.

The official pony and little league rules will govern the playing.

Parents and boys are informed that each team will be composed of a definite number of boys of each age, 8-12 in the little league, and likewise in the pony league, comprised of boys 13-14 years old. This will give every boy an opportunity to play the game and have an equal chance in obtaining a position on the team as an older boy and thus keep the interest of the boys of all included ages.

Full and complete equipment will be available for the catcher and batters will be furnished with plastic head protectors. Members of team will have a distinctive color cap and T-shirt furnished to wear with their own pants and tennis shoes or little league shoes with rubber cleats. The boys will also furnish their own gloves.

Practicing has already begun and the managers will divide the players into teams next week to permit team practices before the opening game. The league opener is set for Tuesday, May 26 and will begin at 5:30 in order to have time for a double-header. The first game will be between two of the little league teams, known as the Dodgers and the Phillies and the second game will be between the two pony league teams, the Giants and the Browns.

The names for the other two little league teams are Yankees and Red Sox.

Contributions to the fund to purchase the necessary equipment is being solicited by the organization. All contributions will be accepted by Hollis Haley at the Turner Hotel. Mr. Haley was elected secretary-treasurer at the group meeting Wednesday night at the high school building.

**HEALTH FOR ALL—**

**TB AFTER FORTY**

Don't fool yourself. You can get tuberculosis at any age. If you are in your forties, you may be tempted to say:

"But I've heard that TB is a young people's disease, particularly of young women. I'm sure I've read that TB kills more young people between the ages of 15 and 35 than any other disease."

The fact is that tuberculosis is a dangerous disease at any age. It is true that TB leads all diseases as a cause of death in the age group between 15 and 35. But it is also

true that tuberculosis kills more people of all ages than all other infectious diseases combined. There are no age limits.

In 1924, the median age of those who died from tuberculosis was 33. Now it is 48. Two-thirds of its 30,000 victims a year are men and women 45 years of age and more. A survey made in the District of Columbia showed that more than 40 per cent of the tuberculosis discovered was among persons 55 years of age and up, although this age group made up only 10 per cent of the total number examined.

Don't believe the fiction about young women either. The fact is that nearly twice as many men as

women die of tuberculosis.

The fact is that anybody can catch tuberculosis, because TB is caused by a germ. These germs are passed from person to person, from the sick to the well, often through coughs and sneezes of persons who don't know they are sick. Crowds and crowded living and working conditions help the germs spread. But even if you live and work in the crowded city, you can take precautions and probably avoid getting TB. Modern treatment of TB is effective, if started early. Prevention is obviously better.

What can you do about it? For one thing, you can get a physical examination by your doctor with an X-ray examination of your chest at least once a year. You can give your doctor an opportunity to keep you in good health. You can build up your own body resistance through good health habits, including balanced diet and plenty of sleep. You can stay out of crowds as much as possible. You can avoid unnecessary worry and strain. You can also help protect yourself by cooperating with community efforts to check the spread of tuberculosis. Remember that TB can be cured and can be prevented.

**Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL**

Austin — The Legislature seemed ready to boost teachers' pay last week. Already the Senate had voted a \$600 increase for the teachers. The House moved in the same direction.

Where is the money coming from? That's a good question — the one that kept the House from taking final action on the teacher pay increase.

On Second Reading, the House passed a \$600 per year pay raise for the teachers. Then heard Representative Lamar Zivley of Temple, sponsor of the measure, say, "Whoa, slow down. We've got to pass a Tax Bill."

The Legislators have passed a General Appropriations Bill, providing for the expenditures of the state for the next two years.

That Bill takes up all the money in sight. If the State is going to spend any more money, there will have to be new taxes to raise it.

The State now guarantees teachers' minimum pay of \$2,400 per year. The bill being considered by the Legislature would give them \$3,000.

To do that, there would have to be an additional state revenue of something like \$60-million to \$70-million for the next two years.

One prospect for getting the money was a tax on gathering natural gas. That tax was passed by the last session of the Legislature, but it was challenged by the gas companies, and is now being tested in the courts.

If the tax is found to be constitutional, the Treasury will get about \$45-million. That would be enough to start the program for increased teachers' pay.

The House passed and sent to the Senate a Bill giving greater power to the Texas Liquor Control Board.

Representative Obie Bristow of Big Spring is author of the bill, which gives the board specific authority to close down indecent taverns for a number of stated reasons such as lack of running water, contributions to political campaigns by the tavern owner, conditions contrary to the health, peace, morals and safety to the people, and so on.

The Liquor Board is empowered to police beer and liquor establishments, and its officers work along that line, with the co-operation of local law enforcement people.

A proposed constitutional amendment was passed by both Houses and signed by the Governor.

The Amendment, if voted by the people, would lengthen the terms of district, county and precinct elective officers to four years instead of the present two years.

That was the first proposed constitutional change to be passed during the present Legislative Session.
