T&NO Receives Safety Award

the Southern Pacific, has received word that the railroad's Texas & Louisiana lines have won one of the six safety awards given by the National Safety Council.

Mr. Little said the Southern Pacific award was for winning first place last year in the 20,000,-000 to 50,000,000 man-hour group. The railroad's ratio of injuries per nillion man-hours for 1952, he said. was 3.78 as compared with 5.95 for

all railroads in this category. The safety record established by the Southern Pacific in Texas and Louisiana, was substantially better than the national average, statistics compiled by the council show. The six Class I roads to recive the safety awards finished the year with a 4.07 ratio, as compared with 7.31 ratio for all railroads in the group. Class I railroads are those whose operating revenues exceed \$1,000,000 annually.


