T&NO Receives Safety Award

J. O. Little, Jr., local agent for the Southern Pacific, has received word that the railroad's Texas & Louisiana lines have won one of the six safety awards given by the National Safety Council.

Mr. Little said the Southern Pacific award was for winning first place last year in the 20,000,000 to 50,000,000 man-hour group. The railroad's ratio of injuries per million man-hours for 1952, he said, was 3.78 as compared with 5.95 for all railroads in this category.

The safety record established by the Southern Pacific in Texas and Louisiana, was substantially better than the national average, statistics compiled by the council show. The six Class I roads to receive the safety awards finished the year with a 4.07 ratio, as compared with a 7.31 ratio for all railroads in the group. Class I railroads are those whose operating revenues exceed \$1,000,000 annually.

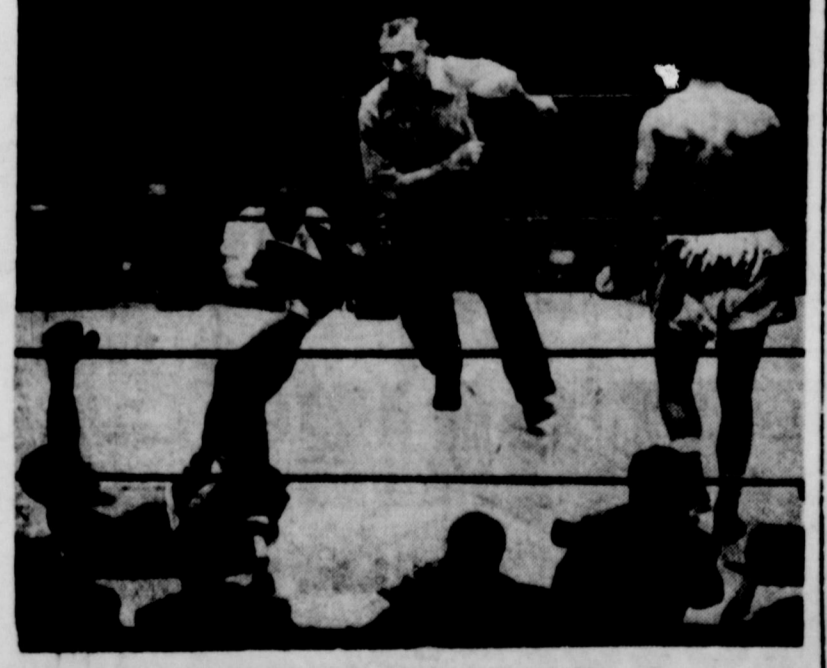

'Too Much Faith Put In Bug Killing Vaporizers,' Cox Says

Austin — Don't put too much stock in advertised claims for the bug-killing properties of so-called "vaporizers," State Health Officer George W. Cox cautioned Texans this week.

He said "indiscriminate use" of the gadgets in homes or sleeping quarters could make the fumes more toxic to humans than to insects.

Widely advertised and sold for "killing bugs the easy way," one brand comes complete with an 8-months supply of chemicals, and makes claims of being "non-toxic and odorless, guaranteed positive extermination of flies, roaches, mosquitoes, all insects. . . Meets all the state and federal requirements."

Dr. Cox called these claims "completely misleading," and pointed out a March 27 statement

released by the federal Interdepartmental Committee on Pest Control to back him up. The statement said:

"Because of the health hazards inherent in the misuse of insecticide vaporizers used as fumigators, (the committee) recommends against their use in living quarters."

The health officers conceded that the vaporizers might have some beneficial use in commercial or industrial establishments where human exposure will not be continuous and food contamination will not occur.

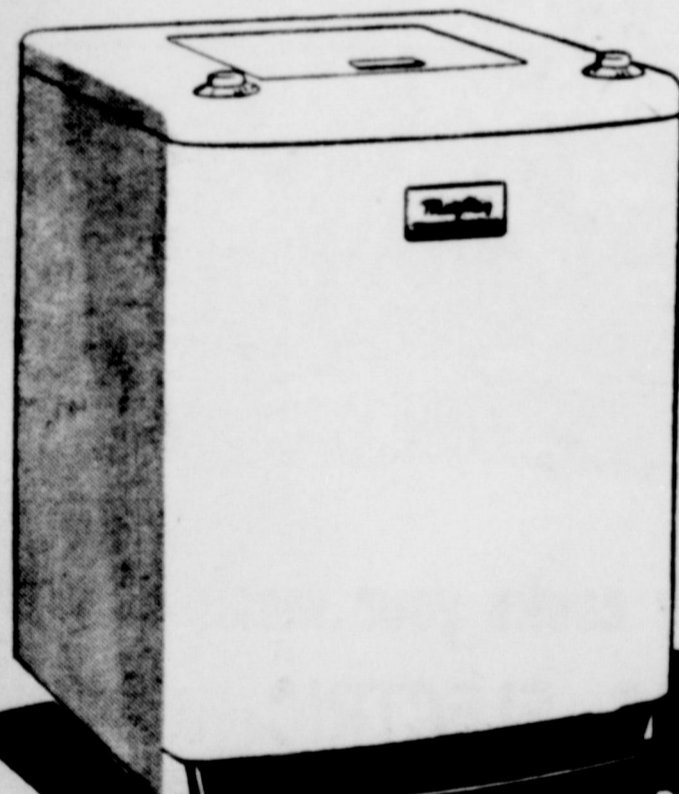
