## Taxes On Ranch On Steady Increase

College Station, May 27 - Taxas on Texas ranch property have been increasing for six consecutive years. Total levies by all units of government in 1952, on an acreage basis, were about 55 per cent higher than in 1946, and were approaching the 1931 record high of 29 cents an acre.

This upward movement established a new trend in the record of farm taxes dating back to 1890, culture economics and sociology, leased the findings of a study into

They point out that farm and formly in all counties during the postwar period with the trend being reflected in the economic conditions changes in population and other situations within the coun-

Taxes have increased since 1946 n each of the 18 major type-ofranching areas of the state varying from 14 to 107 per cent.

One important enactment was the assumption of a larger share of the fiscal responsibility for public education through the Gilmer-Aikin laws. In instances this legislation has resulted in higher taxes for individual ranch owners by with little or no tax levy to join other districts with higher tax rates. Adoption of a farm-to-market road program by the State government has reduced some pressure on local property taxes and the dropping of the property levy for general revenue purposes of the State government has also tended to lower property taxes.

About one-fourth of the counties in 1952 were levying the 30-cent rate for farm-to-market roads and flood control purposes as authorized by the State as a result of the legislation on property taxes for general revenue.

The school districts have accounted for a major portion of the postwar tax increases on rural property. Local school district levies last year accounted for 53 per cent of all ranch taxes as compared with 44 per cent in 1947. County and special road districts for 34 per cent as against 39 per cent in 1947; State levies dropped from 15 per cent to 9 per cent in the same period and junior colleges and other special districts increased from 2 to 4 per cent.



cle - that closest to the patient himself - is his immediate family. Tuberculosis places special reponsibilities on the family, and perhaps the heaviest is their duty to help the patient 'see it through' and go to the TB hospital and stay there until he is cured.


Leaving the hospital against medical advice, before the cure is complete, is one of the greatest problems in tuberculosis. A life of invalidism, even death itself may be the result for the sick person Meanwhile he may spread the germs of tuberculosis to everyone with whom he comes in contact.

On the surface it would seem that knowledge of these facts would be sufficient to convince a patient that he should stay in the hospital until he is well. To understand why it is not enough in many cases, it is necessary to realize the weight of the load placed on the patient by his disease and its power to upset him emotionally and mentally.

A recent survey showed that a large portion of patients who left the hospital against medical advice, were married men, and the reasons they gave were chiefly domestic problems, the worries of a family man about wife, children, and bills. The treatment of TB requires a relatively long stay in the hospital during which the patient sees his family's standard of living threatened. The doctor cannot tell him on the day he enters how long he will have to stay. Meanwhile, he is told to rest so that the injured tissues of his body will have a chance to heai. He feels "left out". He has leisure for brooding.


