The first orders are for a 30 tay supply only.

"Eligible livestock are cattle sheep and goats, only your foundation livestock," stated Miss Green 'Mules, horses will not qualify."

"The cotton seed cake is reported to be a slow mover, as it has to be processed and will take longer Other feeds such as the meal, corn oats and wheat are reported to be ready to move immediately," she continued.

"The first few cars that come in will be divided, in order that everyone will get some feed immediately. You will eventually cation get your order filled, but the first few cars will have to be divided," Miss Green continued.

All cars will be sent to Sanderson, as other places such as Dryden, Pumpville, Longfellow and Mofeta do not have the facilities for weighing or unloading.

Minimum and maximum weights of the cars are as follows: cotton seed meal and pellets, 20 tons; corn. 20 tons to 60 tons; oats, 20 tons to 40 tons; wheat, 30 tons to 60 tons. These weights are taken from the information received from the state office in College

Polio Foundation Gives Information On Gamma Globulin

The National Foundation for Inbe discussed at the meeting of the fantile Paralysis is sending out an important summer message to parents concerning gamma globulin, the part of human blood that contains disease-fighting antibodies.

Gamma globulin is in extremely short supply, and will probably be used in areas where the greatest number of cases occur. There will be only about one million doses of ber. Most likely public health officers working with private physicians will administer the GG.

It has been used for many years to combat measles and infectious hepatitis (jaundice). In 1952 March of Dimes scientists proved it to be an effective but tempor-

The Office of Defense Mobilization, a government agency, is solely responsible for the distribution of the nation's supply of GG through the state and territorial health officers. You should not be able to buy it anywhere. See your DRYDEN BUILDINGS doctor. If it is possible for your child to have GG, it will be allocated to him through the health officer. There will be no charge for this GG.

Dr. Edgar's tentative decision on complaints of segregation in the Sanderson schools followed a five-hour hearing which was the result of a petition filed more than a year ago by five patrons of the school district who charged school ofifcials with segregating Anglo-American students and those of Mexican descent.

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Accuracy Urged In SS Reporting

Employers and self-employed persons can stretch their social security tax dollar and save book work by being fully aware of the procedures of correctly reporting wages and income under the Social Security Act, says Jack Calvert manager of the Odessa office of the Social Security Administra-

Most employers in this area insure against delinquent or incorrect reporting by following an orderly procedure in which they take an employee's name and number directly from the account-number card at the time of hiring, record such information in a permanent section of their bookkeeping system, and establish a quarterly date line for completion of the reports well in advance of the due date.

Calvert points out that the quar terly return covering employees wages are due during the months of July and October 1953. The common error, when no re port is made on one or more per sons, usually results in costly investigation and delay at the time claim for social security bene only in inconvenience to the employer, but in undue hardship to the family of the person on whose account the claim is being filed.

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

The germs of lockjaw are commonly found in soil - especially manured soil. They enter through a skin break and emit a deadly toxin which causes jaw and neck muscles to constrict so severely that jaws involuntarily close, vicelike.

Slowly, the muscle construction spreads to other body muscles, until the victim is bent like a bow. A fatal case of the disease has been traced to a scratch from a rose thorn

Lockjaw germs are spore-formers, which means they can live for years outside an animal body. Its life processes lie dormant in tiny seed-like pod, shifting about on the ground until finally, perhaps through a sliver or nail scratch, it gets back into live tis-

The wound may heal, but inside, protected as it is from the air, the spore will begin revegetating" and emitting deadly toxin.

Farmers and ranchmen are especially vulnerable to lockjaw. Dr. Cox cautioned, because the primary source of lockjaw germs is the intestinal tract of animals. They're passed onto the ground in animal dejecta, easily available for re-entry into a human body when that body is cut or scratched or otherwise wounded.


