## LISTEN TO LUKE

With the street work in progress in Sanderson, everything is topsy-turvy and noisy but we realize that it must get worse before it can be better. Work is progressing at a rapid rate of speed. Sidewalk engineers are overseeing the job during the work-day. Speculation as to what will be done here and there is heard on every side. This columnist has about decided to relinquish our position on the sidewalk and let the contractors and engineers finish the job the way they want to.

The commissioners of the county are due commendation and praise for their cooperation in making the town a thing the townspeople and county can be proud of and they are making every effort to see that property owners and business residents will have as good a better condition in front of their place than before.

All the local improvements will be very noticeable once the job is completed and we know that the commissioners and residents of the county will be proud of their efforts.

In a letter from Lyndon Johnson this week he answered some questions which I had asked him to answer in a way I knew he would have to answer. He said: "I have said that so long as prices of cattle are supported by the government, the cattleman, who has to sell his product in an open market, is at a decided disadvantage. That is as true as life, Senator. If feed is supported, cattle must also be supported; and if cattle are supported, then the packers must be supported; then the retailer, and back again to the consumer who is doing all the supporting in the first, second, third and fourth places. There is no end to Socialism, Senator. There is no half-way. We either have free trade or we have price supports or Socialism. Word it as you will, Senator Johnson admitted that much in his statement.

Reasoning we show that it is true, but we want supports on the things we sell, but keep it off the things we buy. That won't work. Thank you, Senator, for backing up my stand.

We had a few columns of words not too long ago on people showing their faith in the community.

Now we have some real evidence in the amount of expenditures on various improvements, alterations and such in the business part of town.

We can have a drouth, we can lose a payroll, we can lose a lot of things, but we just can't seem to lose our faith in our beliefs of the way things can and should be.

Enterprising and civic-minded men are daily doing things to express their faith in the fact that the people of Sanderson and Terrell County are being drawn closer together in all their relations.

Who knows, maybe some day the people of this area may realize their dependence upon the business men of this area, and the business men will realize their dependence upon the people. Then everything will be to the best advantage of all concerned.

Around town we noticed last week that nobody was around town... this week the jackhammer crews stopped working just outside our ears... and several expressions of a desire to try to hold one of those things down, but no offers when one of the crewmen stopped for a drink of water... a battle of wits with a level on the grade of our sidewalk... Jimmy Hanson, the happiest service station operator in town last week, and maybe this one too... one ranchman who expected the relief corn to come in tank cars.

## Border Trails Group Lays Plans For Work In Meeting Sunday

Outlined plans for work in the immediate future were passed upon and the wheels started into action by members and directors of the Border Trails Association, a division of Travel U. S. 90 Association, at a meeting of the group in Sanderson Sunday afternoon.

This was the first monthly meeting of the group since the re-organization meeting in Marfa last month.

The assembly, with representatives from Marfa, Alpine, Marathon, Sanderson, the Big Bend National Park, Del Rio and Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, adopted a publicity plan which will include a broadside poster to be placed in hotels, motels, filling stations and cafes where touring visitors may easily come in contact with the message of welcome to them as our guests; and the purchase of stickers or decals to be placed on the cars.

The route of the highway extends from Jacksonville, Florida, through New Orleans, Houston, San Antonio, Del Rio, Sanderson, Marathon, Alpine and Marfa to the junction with Highway 80 at Van Horn.

Plans were made to lend our support to the western division of Travel U. S. 90 Association with headquarters in Tucson, Ariz., to get official designation of Highway 90 from Van Horn to San Diego, California. Ways and means of cooperation with the western branch were discussed at Sunday's meeting.

The meeting Sunday was presided over by Dr. C. L. Baskett of Del Rio, president of the association, with Ralph De Sola, also of Del Rio, secretary-treasurer. W. J. Ferguson, Jr., is director for the local unit of the organization.

Special guests at the meeting were Lon Garrison, superintendent of the Big Bend National Park, his brother, A. F. Garrison of Moscow, Idaho; W. Leon Evans, assistant superintendent of the park; H. S. Sanborn, Mammoth Cave, Ky., general manager of the National Parks Concessions, Inc.; and L. L. Lewis, manager of the Big Bend Park Concessions.

Mr. and Mrs. Gustavo Valdes, Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, were also present. Valdes is president of the Acuna Chamber of Commerce.

The next meeting of the association will be in Alpine on August 9, and the September meeting will be in the Big Bend National Park on September 12.

After the business session in the county court room at the courthouse, the visitors were treated to iced watermelon on the courthouse lawn.

## Janell Littleton Reports on Girls' State Activities in Austin Meet

The following is a report of the activities of Girls State by Janell Littleton, Sanderson's representative to the Austin meeting, and sponsored by the Auxiliary of the American Legion. She is visiting relatives in Taylor and will not return home for several weeks.

I arrived at the school for the Deaf in Austin, where Girls' State was held, at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, June 15. I was in a long line of girls waiting to register and by the time we had gotten to the desk, we had made friends with all the girls next to us. At the desk, we were assigned to our quarters, political party, and whether or not we would be in the House of Representatives or Senate. We were issued tags that had all this information and our names and addresses on them and we wore these tags all the time. Next we went to quarters, unpacked and dressed for dinner. After dinner, we had our first assembly which was held for the purpose of introducing staff and counselors. Commander Brown also gave a short talk on the American Legion and its auxiliary.

Next we organized our House and Senate. There were many puzzled faces as we walked to our quarters after this organization.

Most of us, those who hadn't had civics or some type of government, were very mixed up; however, by the end of the week this was all straightened out.

We had some very wonderful speakers who would give their talk and let us ask questions about the subject. They were very patient in answering questions.

Trueman O'Quinn, former city attorney at Austin, explained the four kinds of local government and the advantages and disadvantages of each. Reed Granberry, assistant to the chancellor of the University of Texas and parliamentarian for the House of Representatives, told of parliamentary law. He explained the English system of government and how it was transferred to our country. He strongly urged us to attempt to master simple forms of parliamentary law. Mrs. R. Max Brooks, member of the advisory committee on women in the service, spoke on "Women in the Armed Forces. She brought out the fact that the Women's Armed Forces are being completely revised since World War II, and that women would be drafted if there should be a need for them. Les Proctor, Travis County Attorney, talked about city government.

We were next organized into cities and counties and put into practice what we had learned and heard from the speakers. This also helped us to better understand the things they were talking about.

On Wednesday we had party meetings and the House and Senate convened. We had a very heated debate on whether women should serve on juries. All of this was carried on as regular House and Senate procedure. I was deeply impressed by the ability of the girls to get up, and without a single note, make an excellent debate for or against a bill. We voted in our Girls' State, that women should serve on juries. We had to go through the procedure of buying a poll tax and hold an election.

On Thursday morning we left the school in chartered buses and with a police escort for a tour of Austin. We were given precedence in traffic and all of this made one feel very proud to be a Texan and an American and live in a land that was free. We visited the governor's mansion, the state capitol, where we assembled in the respective rooms for the Senate and Representatives to hear talks, went to a museum and then returned to the school.

Back at the school we heard our own candidates for the run-off elections and then held the elections in which Jean Manning of Hamilton was elected governor. The banquet which was in honor

of the newly-elected officers, was at the Tower. John Ben Shepperd, attorney general of the state of Texas, was guest speaker and entertainment was furnished by the junior counselors.

Friday, Dr. Chauncey Leake, executive director of the University of Texas, gave a speech on the health resources of the state in which he pointed out that health was our greatest resource. His views on the use of alcoholic beverages were summed up with the statement: "Keep your home environment right, and you will not have to worry about alcohol." Another speaker on Friday was William Magill, coordinator, Texas Civil Defense; Rev. William Arms, Fort Worth, who spoke on the evils of Communism; and Mrs. Marjorie Bledan, the auxiliary department president, who gave a book review on "Key to Peace." (Continued to Page 4)

## Oak Street Receives Major Alterations

The main street of Sanderson, Oak Street, and U. S. Highway 90, through Sanderson is undergoing major alterations with the reconstruction project well under way. All of the old surface has been torn up and grading is complete from the Sanderson Gulf Station in the west end of town to the bridge across Sanderson Canyon in the east end of town. All the curbing has been poured and forms removed and preliminary work is now going on to fill in the sidewalk sections to the present curb location.

The changes in the grade of the street have necessitated several alterations in the fronts of businesses along Oak Street, with some steps being built from the curb to the sidewalk level. The James Word Service Station is in the process of lowering the drives and approaches to the station to correspond with the street level to make for a neater appearance and also more convenience for his customers.

All along the south side of the street the sidewalk will be extended to the curb line in the business part of town, with the step sections being built on the north side of the street.

North-south streets intersecting Oak Street have been graded on the approaches into the highway and dirt excavated from the old highway has been used to fill in the block-long streets south of the highway and the street parallel to the railroad prior to surfacing. Work is expected to start immediately on the grading of streets in the north part of town prior to surfacing also.

Business and residents along Oak Street have undergone hardships due to the lack of traffic through town during the construction work, and noise and dust has aided in the discomfort, but work has progressed sufficiently to assure the people of the town and county a very attractive main street when the project is completed.

Very few blocks of Sanderson streets will be left unpaved west of the bridge and the proportionate amount of paved streets will compare favorably with that of any town in the state probably.

## Survey Work On FM 1217 Extension Moving Rapidly

Survey crews are progressing rapidly on the location of the proposed extension of FM1217 from Dryden to Sheffield and plans and specifications are expected to be submitted this fall for the extension of the reconstruction from the north end of the present finished surface to very near the ranch headquarters of Mrs. Doc Turk.

Present plans are for the highway to go up onto the divide and continue to what has been designated Turk Hill, about 1 1/2 miles from the ranch home of Mrs. Turk where it will proceed along the route of the present dirt road beyond the Independence Creek crossing.

The new site of the road will offer a much better condition for highway construction owing to the elimination of creek and arroya crossings as well as the elimination of many curves necessary to follow the present location. The proposed site will also be much more scenic for those who travel the road as tourists and visitors.

The allocation of funds for the completion of the project now in the planning stage by the Texas Highway Department's Sanderson office will leave approximately 20 miles of unpaved road in Terrell County between Dryden and Sheffield and it is hoped that allocations for the completion of that portion will be available within the next two or three years.
