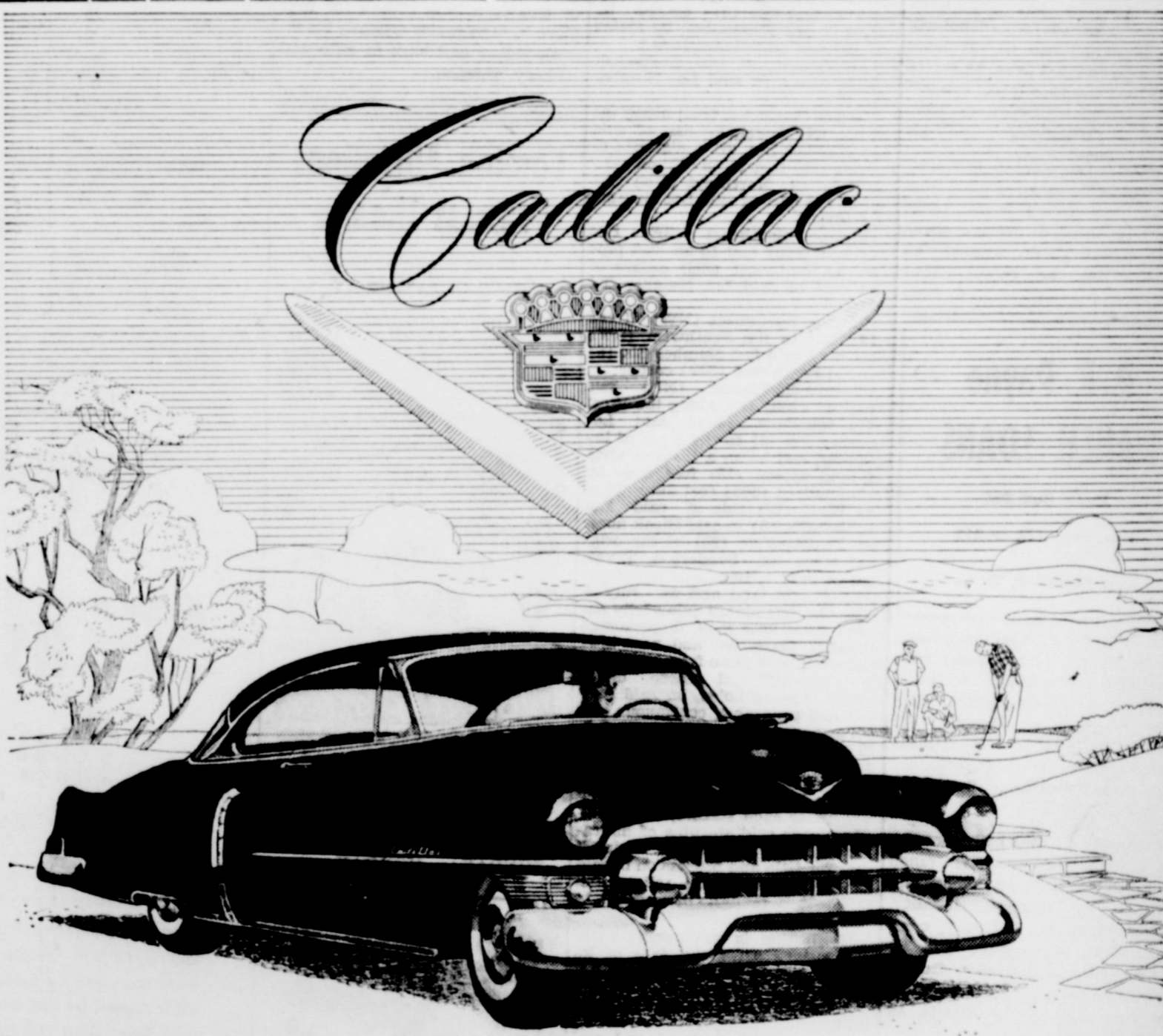

 Thence Northwest (NW) fifteen (15) feet to the Southwest (SW) corner of said Lot Number Six (6) for the Southwest (SW) corner;

A gift of lingerie was presented to Mrs. J. W. Pate by the guests.


