The transaction involving transfer of the exchange here to Southwestern Bell operation includes 21 South and West Texas towns. Johnson said. They have a total of more than 6,000 telephones.

This is disclosed by a survey study made by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

West Texas had 16.5 persons per square mile, according to the 1950 census. The state average was 29.4.

West Texas' net effective buying income, computed by the magazine sales management, totaled \$3,814,069,000 (b) in 1952. This was 20 per cent of the state total of\$19,260,388,000.

Average income per capita and per family was presented by counties in the magazine's annual Sur-

vey of Buying Power. The average per capita income for West Texas (132 counties) was \$1,381, while that for all of the state's 254 counties was \$1,077, and F. F. A. will leave Thursday for for all counties of the United Fort Worth with David Mitchell,

States, it was \$1,477. Average per family income of West Texas' 132 counties was \$4,-864; that is Texas' 254 counties \$3,864 and of entire country \$5.

Retail sales in West Texas per capita totaled \$1,275 in 1952. The Texas average was \$1,622 and the national average was \$1,041.

Population of West Texas has grown since the census was taken. The 1950 enumeration showed population was 2,364,088 in Texas: 7,111,194 for Texas.



And, too, last year more than 560 industries producing diversified carload traffic were established or expanded at locations

along our 13,500 miles of railroad line. Southern Pacific's ability to continue to handle efficiently the greatly increased demands of our shippers reflects the hundreds of millions of dollars spent for improvements in recent years. For example, since 1945, we've ordered or placed in operation 679 new diesel locomotives to advance our motive power program. We've ordered or placed in operation 40,000 new freight cars . . . installed radio communication in train and yard operations. We've installed a mechanized system for reporting day to day movement of freight cars, utilizing teletype and punch card machines, so that our shippers may be kept advised as to the exact location of their consignments. All these improvements and a multitude of others now in the planning stage fit into Southern Pacific's long-range plan to stay abreast of the development of our service area . . . and facilitate the defense effort . . . that's why SP stays as busy as the proverbial bee.
