This tax load is such that it makes it impossible to raise enough taxes to adequagtely oper ernments. Besides there is no pos sible chance to create a surplus for operating expenses in any kind of business or vocation.

We are waiting for President Eisenhower to go further in carrying out his announced desire to government. He stated in his address to Congress at the beginning of his administration that centralized government was a "major national problem."

This country needs to encourage more responsibility and more selfreliance in local communities and the state. We need to reduce pressure upon Congress exerted by






