A healthy range plant needs the food-producing top to insure a strong root system A range of starved grass plants is like a herd of starved cows or ewes - the 'percent grass crop' is too low for much profit.

The treatment of individua forage plants and ranges is more important immediately following than during the drouth itself. Plants should be grazed lightly following the 'one good rain' that breaks the drouth if they are to recover sufficiently to give them


