The Sanderson Eagles battled the Van Horn Eagles to a 7-7 tie in the last home game of the season. The game counts as a half-game won and half-game lost for both teams, according to a previous conference decision.

The Eagles broke out into the front in the scoring column in the second quarter when Tommy Mansfield, Sanderson tailback, went for a 17-yard score and converted the extra point on a placement kick.

During the first half it appeared to be Sanderson's ball game, even though there was just one score. Sanderson racked up 9 first downs in the first half for 2 for Van Horn.

When the second half opened Van Horn received the opening kickoff and marched to repeated first down against the local lads scoring a touchdown from the 17-yard line on a pass from Slaughter to Cortez. The extra point was made on a running play.

Van Horn made 8 first downs in the second half compared with 4 for Sanderson.

The local fans got a real thrill out of the entire game, since it was pretty much of a nip and tuck battle in the second half.

Sanderson plays Rankin there this week in the final game of the season and stand a possibility to end up tied for second place by defeating Rankin. Grandfalls has a cinch with district honors since they are unbeaten in conference games and have played all of their conference games of this season.

## Billings Recovers Car Stolen Here Thursday Night

Sheriff Lee Billings reported this week the apprehension of A. A. Worden, Jr., 26, of Columbus, Ohio, and Thurston Kelton, 37, of Old Hickory, Tenn., in Alpine Friday following the theft of a car here Thursday night. The two men admitted the theft according to Billings.

Kelton and Worden related to Billings that they had stolen a car in Miami, Fla., and drove it to near Comstock where they ran out of gas. They hitch-hiked back to Del Rio and caught a ride on a freight from there to Sanderson on Thursday. Thursday night, they admitted taking a car from in front of the McKnight Motel and drove it to Marathon where they ran out of gas. When they tried to sell a spare tire in that town, a station operator told them they would have to get a clearance from the deputy sheriff there and they abandoned the car and caught a freight train to Alpine, according to their confession. The deputy sheriff in Marathon called Billings about the car and men and Billings went immediately to Marathon and called the Alpine officers to apprehend the two suspects for questioning.

The men and car were returned to Sanderson and held in the local jail until Wednesday when federal authorities transferred them to Del Rio where they are being held on charges of transporting stolen property over a state line.

Billings stated that the federal charges grew out of their admission to stealing the car in Florida and driving it to near Comstock, Texas.

## POSTAL RULES FOR CHRISTMAS SEASON TOLD FOR PATRONS

Post office patrons who have not mailed packages for Christmas overseas to boys in the service are warned that parcels that are mailed now have no assurance of reaching their destination before Christmas unless they are mailed air parcel post before November 25.

Air parcel post is limited in size to 30 inches in length and girth combined and 2 pounds in weight. Senders are cautioned not to delay the mailing of parcels until December on the assumption that timely delivery will be assured through the use of air service. After an air parcel arrives overseas, in many cases, final delivery must be made through the use of such surface transportation facilities as are afforded.

Boxes for overseas transmission must necessarily be of strong construction on account of the great distance these parcels must be transported and the handling and storage they must undergo. Each box should be strongly tied and an address and return address inside the box also to insure delivery in case the container is damaged or the address becomes illegible or is destroyed.

Sealed parcels of fourth class matter should, of course, carry the inscription, "Contents, merchandise — May be opened for postal inspection."

Greeting cards for armed forces personnel overseas may be mailed at any time, but patrons should deposit such cards prepaid at the first class rate if they are to expect delivery. These cards should be mailed before December 1.

## TOUGH SCHEDULE NAMED FOR '54 FOOTBALL TEAM

Supt. Matt Bader and Coaches Fred Hickman and Carlton Smith went to Pecos Sunday to meet officials of other schools to outline a football schedule for the 1954 season.

By virtue of the increase in the average daily attendance of the Sanderson High School last year, the football team was advanced into Class A and will be in district 5A next year along with Marfa, Iraan, Big Lake, Wink, Fort Stockton, McCamey and Fabens. Fort Stockton, who is playing in Class AA this year, had a decrease in average daily attendance which demoted them into Class A football for next year.

The schedule is incomplete as yet, but the conference games will be as follows:

October 8 — Marfa here.  
October 15 — Iraan there.  
October 22 — Big Lake here.  
October 29 — Wink there.  
November 5 — Fort Stockton there.  
November 12 — McCamey here.  
November 19 — Fabens there.

Alpine and Sanderson have an unfinished agreement and Sanderson will play Alpine there in the opener on September 10.

The dates of September 17, 24 and October 1 are now open on the schedule, but it is thought that little trouble will be had in filling these dates.

Supt. Bader stated that he was going to try and match games with Brackettville, Grandfalls and Rankin to fill out the schedule and would make every effort to get the games here, since the Eagles met those teams on their home fields this year.

It would be most difficult now to prognosticate on the possibilities of the Eagles of next year, but with a little imagination, one could size up the district potentially very close competition. Marfa has one of the weakest teams this year they have had in many years and with losing many of their players from ineligibility and graduation, are not expected to attain the heights of glory as short-horn teams of the past. Iraan in losing its fleet backfield this year by graduation, and could have some difficulty in grooming a new set of toters because of the tough conference they are in this year. Big Lake has not been one of the strongest teams in their district for some time and if averages hold up, will not be the big contenders next year. Wink is always a threat to would-be champs because of their consistent power-house teams and players. Fort Stockton should be in her glory next year since the Panthers were demoted to Class A football and the hold-over of some of their players who have worried AA teams this year. McCamey is rumored to be losing a host of stellar players by graduation, as is Fabens.

The Eagles are accustomed to Class AA and Class A competition following this year's schedule and will retain all but two backfielders and about three linemen.

The Eagles have been butting their heads against very stiff competition this year and Coaches Hickman and Smith have been using green players throughout all the games in grooming them for the conference games of the season, the last two games, as well as for the season ahead.

The Eagle team, well-known over this area of Texas for their "stickability" and determination, will offer a well-known type of competition against their district foes next year, and even though they are the youngest team in the newly-formed district, they will be expected to give a good account of themselves.

in 1899, more than a million persons have died in traffic accidents, Garrison said in a speech here.

By putting into effect a relatively simple program of engineering, education, and enforcement, and with real public support of that program, the traffic death rate could be cut in half, Garrison declared.

This being the 50th anniversary of the commercial motor vehicle, Governor Shivers issued an official proclamation inviting Texans "to consider the great accomplishments and the bright future of the trucking industry and to salute the men and women who are associated with it, on the occasion of the Fiftieth Anniversary of motor freight transportation."

Texas, as the governor pointed out in his proclamation, has more commercial motor vehicles than any other state, with more than 600,000 such vehicles registered in Texas this year.

Delegates to the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, convening at Mineral Wells, voted against giving their advocacy to price support on cattle.

The convention asked instead

that the Secretary of Agriculture expand his government beef-purchasing program.

Fitting into the pattern of economic recovery for livestock producers in the U. S. Department of Agriculture school lunch program, which includes beef and gravy.

An Austin chili firm for example, shipped out seven carloads of this product to points in Texas and Louisiana in a single day.

More than 6,000 cattle have been removed from overgrazed and undergrazed lands of drought areas through fulfillment of government contracts by the Austin company.

W. W. Jackson of San Antonio, another board member, commented, "We're dealing here with something deeply fundamental. I

certainly hope that the time never comes when we descend to the level of thought control."

Vote to include the declaration in textbooks, and omit comment on it, was 12-3.

Maybe Texas will know, come spring, whether or not the natural gas gathering tax passed by the last legislature is valid.

About \$14 million per year is being collected under this tax law, and the money is being held in suspense until such time as the court test is completed.

Tentatively, the U. S. Supreme Court has decided to hear the case early in January. That means the final ruling will be due early in the spring.

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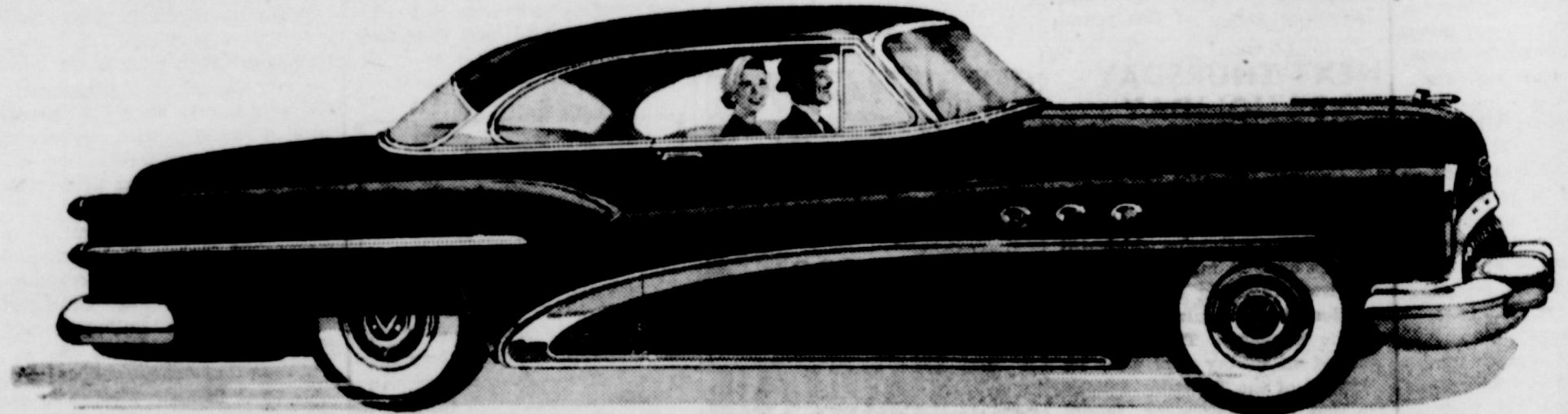

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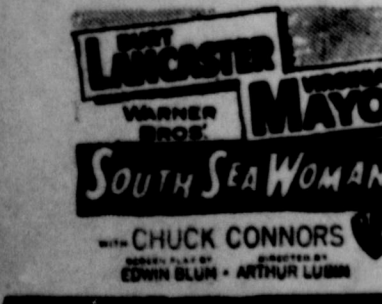
