# **BOY SCOUT TROOP** SPONSORS PLAN REORGANIZATION

Extensive plans are under way by members of the Sanderson Rotary Club for the complete reorganization of the local Scouting program, John E. Carter, chairman of the committee, stated this week

New plans call for immediate formation of a Court of Honor which will function properly, adding dignity to the recognition of a Scout's accomplishments; the immediate formation of a board of review and council to work in advisory and educational capacity in merit awards for the Scouts; and also the long-range plans for educational talks and demonstrations for Scouts in their regular meetings which will lend interest to the movement as well as furnish aid in work toward achievement awards; camporees, summer camp and a planned program for over-

night camping intermittently. of nine months of school each year. It was on January 23, 1854, that a group of Texans converged on Austin for a mass meeting. "We in point of territory," they solemnly resolved, "but in the number and excellence of our schools of

learning." It was a bold boast from a young state—one which had been admitted to the Union less than nine years before. But just eight days later, the Common School Law was enacted. It established the free

public school system of Texas. Six periods of peak interest in school have been selected by the State Board of Education for the tennial, but local groups will decide for themselves if these are of the greatest interest locally, and will probably settle on the observance of the Texas Public School Week, the first week in March, as

the primary major observance. Different communities will observe different dates, significant to the public schools in different ways during the centennial year. But they will all be trying to accomplish the same purpose; to will give 1,600,000 youngsters in

our schools a better education. More details of the observance will be worked out by school officials concerning the observance of Texas Public Schools Week and announcements will be made later concerning the plans.

All school patrons and parents of students are urged to keep the dates in mind.

### April 15 Deadline Before Arrests Begin On Inspection Law

Captain Glen Warner, commanding officer of District 7, of the Texas Highway Patrol, with headquarters at Pecos, has announced that highway patrolmen would issue tickets to persons who operate an auto on the streets and highways after April 15 without a current inspection sticker.

The patrol captain said that the men in his command have all received orders to that effect as the result of a directive issued at Austin by Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Capt. Warner also pointed out that local and county police officers are empowered to enforce the inspection law.

According to the patrol commander, only about 20 per cent of the cars in the 16-county area have been inspected to date. This means, he said, that car owners who have not yet had their vehicles checked will run the risk of being caught in a last-minute rush at the inspection stations if they delay longer in complying with

Austin, Texas - What will happen at a special session of the Texas Legislature, to convene about March 15, depends upon action - or inaction - by the U. S. Supreme Court on this state's long observance will be during gas gathering tax.

There are three possibilities: 1. That the high court will not hand down its decision before or during the session. In that event, a new tax bill must be passed if the teachers are going to receive their pay increase.

2. That the court will declare the tax invalid. Under those circumstances, the Legislature could rewrite the bill so as to remove the court's objections.

3. That the court will approve the tax. If this is the ruling, Texas will have sufficeint funds on hand and in sight to grant the teachers their salary hike.

In announcing that he would call the legislators to Austin for a 30day meeting around mid-March. Governor Shivers said that if the gas gathering tax is ruled out by the court, "it probably will result

in increasing some existing taxes House Speaker Reuben Senterfitt disagreed with the governor on several points. Primarily, Senterfitt reasoned that the Legislature should not be called until the Supreme Court's ruling on the gas tax is made

Money to pay the teachers should come from the gas gathering tax. the speaker argued, and it will be extremely difficult to pass any other kind of a tax bill during a 30-day session.

If the teacher pay problem is resolved before the special session's 30 days are ended, other subjects may be submitted to the Legislature for its consideration, Shivers






