AFBF To Join Fight For Braceros Pact

The American Farm Bureau Federation has urged Congress to approve legislation designed to clarify the authority of the Department of Labor to continue a program for temporary employquate numbers of domestic workers are not available

In a statement filed with the House Agricultural Committee. AFBF said that the need for early action "is emphasized by a recent ruling of the comptroller general that funds previously appropriated for the administration of a Mexican farm labor program pur ico cannot be used if no such agreement has been negotiated.'

An obstacle to the continuation of the Mexican farm labor program is the lack of unds for the program. When regular appropriations for the Labor Department were made last summer, funds for the program were provided only for six months because the U.S. Mexican agreement then existing expired December 31, 1953.

The Bureau of the Budget has recommended a \$550,000 appropriation to enable the Labor Department to continue a program. Action on this request is expected as soon as Congress approves the authorization.

"We have followed closely the Department and officials of the Mexican government with respect to the continuation of the bilateral program." the Farm Bureau statement said, "and as we understand it the major point of disagreement has been the fact that the Mexican government has insisted upon a procedure which inations from candidates to drink volved the fixing of farm wages in the United States by action of the Mexican and U.S. governments."

"We believe that the Labor. State and Justice Departments are to be commended on their firm stand on this matter and for the institution of a unilateral program designed to meet the labor needs of the South and Southwest areas until such time as a satisfactory program can be worked out in cooperation with the Mexican government," AFBF said.

SPRING BRINGS HEALTH HAZARDS

Spring arrives officially on March 21, and that's not many days off. And what does the advent of spring signify other than love, Easter and things bustin' out all over?

It means an increase in the fly hazard, obviously since each female fly lays some 120 eggs at a time, and since a new generation is produced every ten days at summer and spring temperatures.

Thus, the progeny of a single pair can run into several millions, if they all lived, feeding on filth and spreading disease to humans.

"That's why," State Health Officer George W. Cox points out, "whole colonies of flies are wiped out before they're hatched, everytime a householder kills a single

Spring also means greater roach activity in homes, making it necessary that thorough spraying of all cracks, crevasses, corners, and housewife's cleaning ritual.

Spring weather means rats will be ranging farther from their winter haunts, creating the possibility of plague, typhus fever, infectious jaundice, and trichinosis.

But homes can be ratproofed by removing rubbish and garbage accumulations and closing avenues of serious rat problems exist.

Spring means increased mosquito breeding in the stagnant watings, etc, that are strewn around on lots and in alleys. By merely getting rid of those discarded odds and ends the householder can reduce the mosquito nuisance this Calf Scramble At




