Funeral services were held in San Angelo Monday afternoon for Mrs. W. L. Slaughter, 73, who died in that city Saturday morning. Although she was in delicate health, her death was unexpected.

Mrs. Slaughter was the widow of W. L. Lon Slaughter, a partner in Blackstone and Slaughter, one of the big ranching operations in West Texas during the World War I era.

Mr. Slaughter died in 1925. Blackstone and Slaughter's bustness was closed out some two or three years later but the extensive ranch holdings and mineral rights of the two families still are held jointly. # From School Census

The Terrell County school cen sus was taken in January to meet the requirements of the new law and final figures have been made available on the returns this week.

There were 671 scholastics on the approved list last year. This year found 138 new scholastics in the county with 153 to be deleted from the list. Thus, the 1954 census shows 656 scholastics for the county. There are 324 boys and

The largest number of new names to be added to the census comes from the six-year-olds -71. The smallest group is the ninevear-olds - 38.

According to the new law, any transfers to another school district must be made by June 1 in-



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
