

Appointments Open For AF Academy

In a letter received this week from Ken Regan, 16th Congressional Representative, he announced the probability of appointments to be made to the Air Force Academy which will be activated as soon as practicable. He stated that the first class of 300 cadets will enroll in July 1955.

"Initially, and for the first found years, the plan for accepting candidates will be somewhat different han the long established practice for entrance to West Point and Annapolis. The State of Texas will be allocated twelve vacancies for the first class and each member of Congress from our state will be authorized to nominate ten young men who shall be eligible to compete for enrollment. Appointments will be made from among the qualified candidates in order of merit based on competitive examinations," Regan stated.

He asked that The Times give notice of the above information so that aspirants for admission to the Academy may apply to their respective representatives in Congress for consideration.

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THOUGHT-STARTERS FOR CITIZENS

A businessman friend recently said to me: "I belong to severa! civic and fraternal organizations, but I feel that I'm not doing all I could do for the betterment of my community. What is the most important public service task T could undertake, on my own, in my town?" That's a wonderful at titude, and the question thus posed is challenging. What IS the most important public service that a citizen could undertake? It would depend somewhat on the circumstances in the community. But here are some thought-starters.

1. Mobilize the intelligent citizen leadership of the community to solve the local public school finance problem. It can be done. And yet this problem of school finance is chronic in 99 per cent of the school districts of America today. If al! the people of any community in America were suddenly transplanted onto an island in the Pacific, the first thing they'd do would be to develop a source of food, then provide for shelter. Very soon, they' build a church and a schoolhouse, and they would ultimately provide the kind of education they wanted their children to have. With inspired leadership and the same resourcefulness and determination it can be done in any American community today

2. Get the citizen leadership working with the teachers toward the development of a course in American citizenship education in the high school of your community. Very few schools are teaching the youngsters about how America was founded, how the U.S. A. was created, how our private enterprise system evolved, and what makes it tick. Most teachers and most parents want these things taught - but does your school have a course that teaches them? Chances are it doesn't.

Why doesn't the citizen leadership in each community take care of its own community welfare problems? Because some state and national politicians have pursuaded the communities that they need not bother. Communities can usually solve their welfare problems themselves. That is a challenging

4. One dedicated man can move a community to raise its health standards, its medical and hospital facilities to an adequate level. There are a number of examples of this fact, yet the records show that comparatively few towns and cites of America have adequate health facilities. To get them, one individual must take the lead and mobilize the citizen leadership.

5. Juvenile delinquency is problem found to some degree in most American communities. Some of our nation's foremost leaders, including such men as J. Edgar Hoover, FBI director, contend that juvenile delinquency is a major social vroblem. Yet, now many communities have any organization that does more than give lip serv ice to this problem locally? Unfortunately, not many. All that is required is constructive action in a direction that is clearly charter

6. Lift up the per capita income of your community. How? A single civic leader can accomplish this with a little intelligent work and a lot of enthusiasm and enterprise. Any community in America has the factors necessary, or can develop the factors, for establishment of a new industry. Industry creates new wealth. And new wealth in a community lifts the

Most of Governor Allan Shivers' program passed through the legislative session with the greatest of ease

There will be an increase of \$402 per year in public school teachers' pay; state employees will get a salary increase of \$120 per year; and \$10,687,500 will be spent for state buildings.

Not only did the Legislature make those appropriations, but it also passed a tax bill to raise the

To pay for the governor's program, the Legislature passed an increase in taxes on natural gas production, corporations and beer.

Largest amount will come from gas, the levy raised from 5.72 to 9 per cent of wellhead value, beginning next September 1. This will bring an estimated \$14-million per year. The tax will be reduced to 8 per cent the second year and per cent the third.

Increased from \$1.25 to \$2 per \$1,000 of capital value was the franchise tax on corporations. This hike is expected to produce \$8.6 nillion per year.

Beer taxes were raised from \$1.37 to \$2 per barrel and will bring in about \$3-milion more per year. -tpa-

Orders went out from Department of Public Safety headquarters to start enforcement of the automobile inspection law immedately after the April 15 deadline.

Many thousands of vehicles had not geen inspected as the deadline approached, and a last-minute rush vas anticipated. Auto owners missing the deadline are subject to a \$200 fine.


