L. M. WOOTEN TO BE BURIED IN DEL RIO FRIDAY

Funeral services will be held in the Sanderson Methodist Church Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Lewis M. Wooten with Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Sanderson, officiating. The body will be taken overland for burial in Del Rio.

Wooten, a T&NO brakeman, was found dead about 11:30 p. m. Tuesday about one mile west of Alpine. It is presumed that he fell from the west-bound freight. The train had passed through Alpine when he was missed by the train crew and a message was sent from Faisano back to Alpine for the crew to be on the lookout for the missing trainman. His body was found about one hour later by the second train crew and was later brought to Sanderson by an O. T. Sudduth Funeral Home coach.

Born in New Orleans, Louisiana, in 1912, Wooten came to Del Rio when a baby. He grew up in that city, attending school there and in 1934 was married to Miss Clara Rose. They moved to Sanderson in 1940. He had been employed by the T&NO for about 20 years, working first as a clerk.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two daughters, Donna and Sharon; three sisters, Mrs. O. N. Hess of Uvalde, Mrs. C. H. Timmons, Jr., of De Leon, and Mrs. Lillian Kelly of Del Rio; one brother, Lee Wooten, of Norwalk, California.

An interesting and encouraging report of the highway committee from the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce highlighted the regular monthly meeting at the courthouse Monday evening.

Reporting for the group was committee chairman Greene Cooke who stated that an interesting discussion on the progress of the Travel US 90 Association proved that gains were being made and that the association's El Paso meeting last Sunday showed growing interest. Chairman Cooke, together with E. F. Pierson, Ray Hodgkins and W. G. Downie, represented Sanderson at the regular bi-monthly meet. Delegates from the western end of the proposed designated all-weather, ice free, scenic transcontinental highway were present to add their support to the efforts of the area group. Many items of interest on the visible results of the highway efforts were cited in the committee's report.

In reporting the election of officers, Mr. Cooke stated that Mr. Pierson of Sanderson was honored by being named vice-president of the association. Dr. C. L. Baskett of Del Rio was re-elected president and Ralph De Solo of Del Rio was re-elected secretary. Lon Garrison, superintendent of the Big Bend National Park, was re-elected honorary director, as was W. J. Ellison of Tucson, Ariz.

The local Chamber of Commerce announced six new members and greatly-increased interest in the various projects now being undertaken.

'Crusade for Cancer' Drive Starts Here

Tuesday afternoon a "Crusade" meeting for the American Cancer Society was held at the Turner Hotel. Mrs. Tom Hurd of Brackettville, lay woman director of the 5th District of the society presided. Mrs. Joe Kerr, Jr., was elected county chairman; Mrs. Jack Hayre, treasurer.

After some discussion it was decided to form a Terrell County Unit Executive Committee and the following were elected:

Mrs. Ruel Adams, chairman; Mrs. Ed Lacy, vice chairman; Mrs. Russell Dyer, secretary; Mrs. K. H. Stutes, treasurer; Mrs. J. F. Keyes, chairman of the nurses and service committee and Mrs. Sanchez, chairman of the Latin-American committee.

It was revealed that the goal for Texas is \$700,000 which will be used in research, education and service.

Any final answer about the cause and complete means of control of cancer will come from scientific research, to which the Society has devoted about \$29,500,000 since 1945. Some 1800 scientists, including many in Texas, are at work on the problem and their work has already made cancer cures possible that were not possible ten years ago.

The seven danger signals for cancer were listed as: Any sore that does not heal; a lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere; unusual bleeding or discharge; any change in a wart or mole; persistent indigestion or difficulty in swallowing; persistent hoarseness or cough; any change in normal bowel habits.

It was pointed out that those signs may not mean cancer, but they should be checked by a physician to make sure.

Mrs. Hurd specified that sixty percent of the money contributed to the Cancer Crusade stays in Texas to carry on a year-round program of education and service. At least twenty-five per cent is used for the national research institutions. The remainder, 15 per cent or less, goes to the national organization to carry out its program.

Local Committee Protests Drouth Feed Program Stoppage

The Terrell County Drouth Committee received a telegram Wednesday which caused a cessation of the continuance of the emergency drouth feed program.

The telegram reads as follows: "Due to improved conditions over drouth area it is the decision of the state drouth committee to suspend the drouth emergency

feed program in all counties effective May 11. County drouth committees shall not approve any additional applications or approve any certificates for drouth emergency mixed feed. Orders for corn and wheat received in state offices of May 11 will be processed. Feed dealers should be advised to not fill any mixed feed certificates dated after May 11."

Joe Kerr, Jr., chairman of the Terrell County Drouth Committee, stated that he had sent a telegram to Claude K. McCann, chairman of the State Drouth Committee, protesting the action due to the fact that this county had not received sufficient rainfall to be classified as relieved of the devastating drouth conditions, and that in the eyes of the committee members of this county, the drouth in Terrell County has not been broken.

No answer has been received from the state committee at this writing.

Mrs. Bartolo Villegas Buried Here Tuesday

Mrs. Vincenta Villegas, 69, died at her home in Fort Stockton Monday following a period of failing health for the past several years.

Her body was brought to Sanderson by O. T. Sudduth and interment was made in Santa Rita Cemetery, following services at the St. James Catholic Church on Tuesday morning.

The deceased was a resident of Sanderson for many years before moving to Fort Stockton about eight months ago.

She is survived by her husband, Bartolo Villegas; six sons, Bartola, Jr., Jose, Manuel, Claudio, Andres, and Francisco Villegas; four daughters, Juana, Romona, Magdalena and Maria.

Eagles Beat Ozona By 9-3 Margin Here; Lose To Alpine There

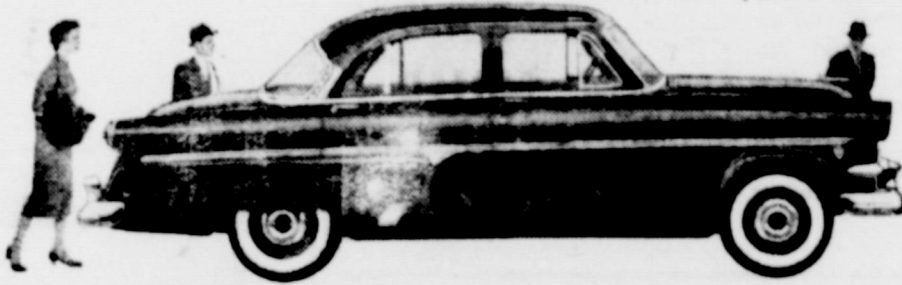

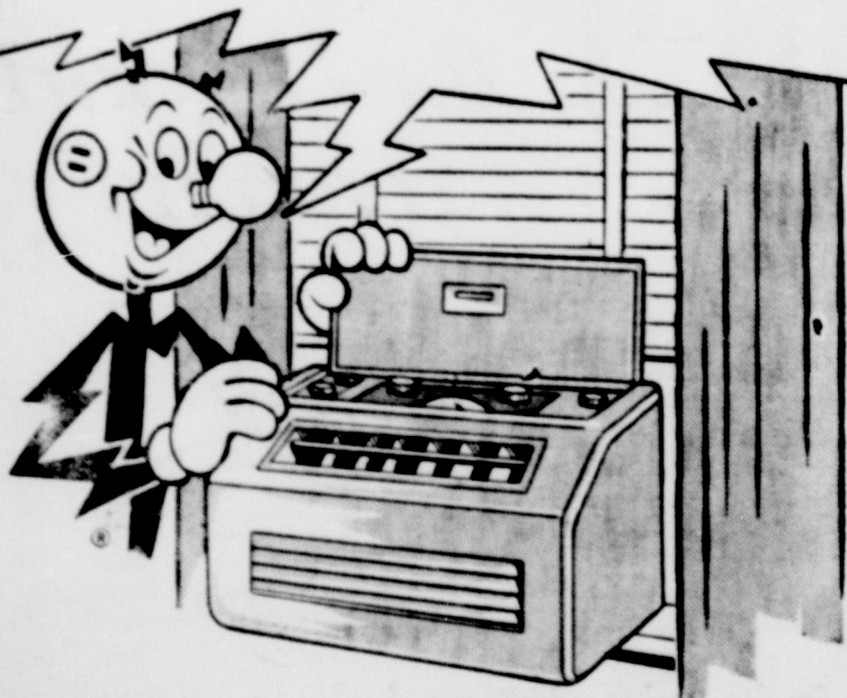
